Next week, we again hear from John and on the fourth Sunday in Advent, our focus shifts to Mary as the final preparations for the Lord's birth grabs our attention.

Christmas Giving Tree

The Christmas Giving Tree is here! Because of the pandemic, the need is greater than ever, but coordination more difficult. The solution is in gift cards! Further down in this newsletter and on the parish website is the list of what is needed by our neighbors using Care for Real and for the refugees sponsored through our parish Refugee Committee. The information sheet also gives explanations of how this year's Giving Tree works. Gift cards need to be turned in at church before or after Mass at the Giving Tree table or by dropping them/mailing them to the Rectory **no later than December 16**.

Rite of Welcoming

This Sunday, December 6 at the 10:30 am Mass, we recognize two members of our community who are seeking entrance into the Catholic Church through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA.) At this Mass, we will celebrate the Rite of Welcoming, officially recognizing them as a candidate (someone who is already baptized in another Christian denomination, now seeking reception into the Catholic Church through their Profession of Faith, Confirmation, and First Communion) or a catechumen (someone who is seeking Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion.)

We are pleased to recognize and accompany Corina Cleja and Jessica Navarro as they make this next step in their faith journey!

First Communions and Confirmation in 2021

As we all anticipate the availability of a COVID vaccine in the coming months, we are also beginning to plan for the sacraments of First Communion and Confirmation.

We recently were notified by the Archdiocese that Confirmations planned in the spring of 2021 will once again be celebrated by pastors. Preparations for First Reconciliation, First Communion, and Confirmation are already underway, and Kevin Chears, our Pastoral Associate, will be in touch with families preparing for these sacraments after the first of the year.

As these celebrations draw closer, we will figure out whether or not a class celebration is possible or if will we need to schedule multiple celebrations with the candidates broken into smaller groups. Parent meetings will be held in January and we hope to have a little more clarity by that time.

Renew My Church

Thanks to the Renew My Church Parish team and all those who attended last Sunday's parish meeting about Renew My Church. The final document outlining our grouping's recommendations is available <u>HERE</u>, the scenarios the report references can be found <u>HERE</u>, and a video recording of the meeting can be watched <u>HERE</u>.

On Tuesday representatives from the parish teams met with our local bishop, Bishop Bartosic, the Superintendent of Schools, and the Chief Operating Officer of the Archdiocese, to present our recommendations. This completes the work of the Renew My Church team. I am so grateful to them for all their exceptional work!

The recommendations now go to a Committee at the Archdiocese who reviews the materials and makes a recommendation to the Cardinal, who then makes the final decision. We hope to hear that decision by Christmas.

Growing in Faith

Prepare the way of the Lord... a familiar call in a not so familiar time when uncertainty and confusion abound. We might respond with the question, "How can I prepare the way when I don't have a clear sense of where I'm supposed to go?" Not unlike Mary's response to being told that she was to conceive and bear a son who would be called Son of the Most High, "How can this be since I have no relations with a man?"

It was no ordinary time for Mary, nor for Elizabeth, who conceived in her old age. It is no ordinary way we are called to prepare for. But that's always the case. We often live under the illusion of things being ordinary, even when we are not overwhelmed by the major upheavals of our times—the devastating consequences of COVID-19, racial tensions, political polarization, food insecurity, economic collapse in many sectors, and so on.

Both Mary and Elizabeth let go of their uncertainty and confusion, embracing the mystery of the child growing in each of their wombs. Elizabeth felt the child leap in her womb as she heard Mary's greeting.

Hopefully, this unsettling time will lead each of us to moments of stillness, of emptiness, when our eyes are opened to see, and our ears are opened to hear—moments when the Spirit overshadows us, moments when we feel something leap inside of us, moving us beyond our uncertainties and

confusion, to a deep sense of the way before us.


<u>The Feast of the Immaculate</u> <u>Conception - Tuesday, December 8</u>

Readings for Sunday, December 6

Reading 1: Is 40:1-5, 9-11

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is expiated; indeed, she has received from the hand of the LORD double for all her sins.

A voice cries out:

In the desert prepare the way of the LORD!

Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God!

Every valley shall be filled in,
every mountain and hill shall be made low;
the rugged land shall be made a plain,
the rough country, a broad valley.

Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed,
and all people shall see it together;
for the mouth of the LORD has spoken.

Go up on to a high mountain, Zion, herald of glad tidings; cry out at the top of your voice, Jerusalem, herald of good news! Fear not to cry out and say to the cities of Judah: Here is your God! Here comes with power the Lord GOD, who rules by his strong arm; here is his reward with him. his recompense before him. Like a shepherd he feeds his flock; in his arms he gathers the lambs, carrying them in his bosom, and leading the ewes with care.

Reading 2: 2 Pt 3:8-14

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years and a thousand years like one day.

The Lord does not delay his promise, as some regard "delay,"

but he is patient with you,
not wishing that any should perish
but that all should come to repentance.
But the day of the Lord will come like a thief,
and then the heavens will pass away with a mighty roar
and the elements will be dissolved by fire,
and the earth and everything done on it will be found out.

Since everything is to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be, conducting yourselves in holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be dissolved in flames and the elements melted by fire.

But according to his promise we await new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells.

Therefore, beloved, since you await these things, be eager to be found without spot or blemish before him, at peace.

Gospel: Mk 1:1-8

The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God.

As it is written in Isaiah the prophet: Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way. A voice of one crying out in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. People of the whole Judean countryside and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins. John was clothed in camel's hair. with a leather belt around his waist. He fed on locusts and wild honey.

And this is what he proclaimed:

"One mightier than I is coming after me.

I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals.

I have baptized you with water;

he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

<u>Loom</u>, a Catholic Charities ministry, is a community of refugee women living in Chicago who weave together their creativity and cultural traditions to make and sell beautiful handmade products. These women have fled their country of origin because of a credible fear of persecution on account of their race, religion, political opinion, national origin, or social group.

Loom provides an opportunity, at a weekly workshop, to collaborate, develop new skills, earn extra income, and be part of a community of creative, enterprising women. Through the encouragement of the group and skills learned, many women secure part or full-time employment in and outside of the fashion industry.

Loom artisans collaborate with local designers to produce a beautiful selection of handmade products such as jewelry, bags, and home décor. Artisans use a variety of techniques including indigo dye, crocheting, knitting, sewing, embroidery, and weaving inspired by their cultural traditions.

We still need other volunteers to fill teams for greeting/set-up and clean-up. For safety reasons, volunteers should be between 18-64 years of age and not have conditions that would put them at risk for negative outcomes from COVID-19 infection (immunosuppressive therapy, heart or lung disease, cancer, etc.)
