Bulletin for the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Somehow, we have arrived at the near mid-point of summer! In many ways, students who are still on a school schedule are the luckiest because they know they get a vacation! But the importance of slowing down, relaxing, taking in the beauty of the season is vital for all of us.



I think I have mentioned before that the word, "recreation" is actually recreation -- just without the hyphen. But it is such a good reminder that, like the fundamental notion of sabbath, we all need to rest! There is a reason the Creation story in the Book of Genesis tells us that on the seventh day, having admired the work of Creation, God rested from all the work God had done. If God takes a break -- why do we think that we don't need a break? Be sure to find some time -- preferably some extended time -- this summer to rest and be re-created!

St. Ignatius

On July 1, St. Ignatius parish ended its long history. While the parish itself no longer exists, weekend masses will continue until the final Mass on Saturday, July 31 - the Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola. Bishop Bartosic will preside at the final liturgy. Please continue to keep the parishioners of St. Ignatius in your prayers and welcome all those who are seeking a new parish home in the coming weeks.

As I mentioned in some previous columns, with the closing of St. Ignatius parish, the boundaries of both St. Jerome and St, Gertrude have been extended to include the geographic boundaries of the former St. Ignatius. And the campus of St. Ignatius Parish is now part of St. Gertrude parish. There may be some special Masses/services at St. Ignatius in the coming

months - especially services such as funerals. In the next twelve months, discussions will continue about the possibility of a Mission Center hosted jointly by St. Jerome and St. Gertrude parishes. Last week, in a meeting with Bishop Bartosic, representatives of St. Ignatius Parish, and Loyola University clarified that, at this time, the University will not be able to be partnering in this possible venture. What will happen to the campus of the former parish has yet to be determined.

Evangelization

Although the word evangelization is not new, it does seem to be popping up more and more in parishes and dioceses around the world. We will soon be hearing it more often as we enter into the next phase of the *Renew My Church* initiative.

In today's gospel passage, we get the first definition of what it means when we hear, "Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over unclean spirits." Evangelization is simply going out and sharing the good news of the gospel. For many Catholics, this seems like a very non-Catholic way of doing things! Yet at every Mass, we celebrate we receive the exact same instruction when the presider dismisses the congregation immediately after the final blessing. In words such as these, "Our Mass is ended. Now go out to bring Christ's peace to the world," or any of the other variety of dismissals that are used. The important thing is that we do not get misled into thinking our faith is all about getting the treasure, holding it close and never letting go. Just the opposite! If we have truly received the Good News of Jesus Christ and are in a relationship with him, keeping it to ourselves would make no more sense than a couple in love never sharing their joy with others. Everything we have received from God and from His Son, Jesus Christ, is a gift. Once we have that gift, its value is only realized when we share it with others!



Growing in Faith

In my 20s, during a more intense "period of discernment", I was trying to figure out what to do with my life. I wrestled with Jesus' question of, "what do you desire?" and the notion of God having a *will for me*. I struggled: "What the heck does that mean?" What I desired/wanted was a CLEAR SIGN, a burning bush perhaps, because I had the notion that the divine was like a military commander giving clear orders.

Today's readings speak of God who has a will for us; and according to Ephesians, that is a favor, a mystery, and intention. Sometimes that "will for us", as with Amos, takes us from following the crowd, norm, or where we are most comfortable, and leads us on a different path.

I think about the many unaccompanied Latin American youth who have crossed our border after leaving their families. They have taken great risks, many arriving quite traumatized: all seek safety and a new life. I recently met some of them as they wait to be placed with relatives in the US. I imagine they too questioned what they were doing. I wonder if, along the way and since arriving, they feel *blessed, chosen, destined, redeemed, lavished, sealed, summoned, instructed*. Do they feel *sent* by divine purpose, grace, favor, wisdom, and spirit? If so, does that awareness give them what they need to keep going? By the light in some of those eyes and their gratitude, I would say: Yes!
