The Feast of the Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)

This is the second of the "idea" feasts that transition our Sundays from the Easter season to Ordinary Time. While last week's Feast of the Most Holy Trinity is all about our relationship to God and how we relate to God, this feast is more about who we are as members of the Church -- the Body of Christ, and how we relate to each other as God's children.

The very idea of this feast is that we are not only a metaphor for who we are as God's children, we are also that reality for others in the world! As St. Teresa of Avila put it so well,

"Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which he looks with compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good.

Yours are the hands through which he blesses all the world.

Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are his

body.

Christ has no body now on earth but yours."

Just as we are nourished each time we come to His Table and are fed with His Body & Blood, we must then bring that same gift into the world in how we live and love and sacrifice for others.

Congratulations, Graduates

Congratulations to all our NCA graduates, and to all those parishioners graduating from grammar school, high school, college, or university! You have certainly finished this part of your education in a unique fashion -- during a pandemic! I know the entire parish joins me in congratulating you -- especially because of the difficulties of this past year and wish you well in all your future endeavors. Congratulations!

New COVID Protocols

As previously announced, we expect Governor Pritzker to announce on Friday, June 4 that Illinois is now moving into Phase 5 -- which is practically a full re-opening of everything in the state. If the City of Chicago goes along with those directions, we expect the Archdiocese will as well.

It is possible that by next weekend we will no longer be required to do all the things we have been doing for health and safety since we re-opened for masses in June of last year. When we get the "all-clear", we expect to be able to once again use all the entrances in church for entering and leaving; we expect to be able to take the directional tape off the floor and off the back of pews; we expect to be able to open all the pews.

It is still unclear if we will continue sanitizing hands upon entrance and before Communion, if we will again have Holy Water in the fonts, and if we will be able to bring the gifts of bread and wine forward at the Offertory time. And the question of masked/unmasked, vaccinated/unvaccinated will also need a clear direction. Once we know, we will send out an email to all those for whom we have email addresses, and we will make a detailed announcement in church.

As we move into our "new normal", I want to take this opportunity to thank again our extraordinary and generous corps of volunteers who have been so faithful for every service every day since we re-opened in June of 2020. And thanks to all of you for helping to keep order and keep everyone safe and healthy during this pandemic!

Bulletins/Newsletter & Hymnal Update

Since the pandemic closed our doors in March 2020, even after we reopened for services in June of that year, as part of the health and safety protocols, all paper was removed from church and any paper could only be used once and then disposed of. This led us to move our weekly bulletin to an electronic newsletter. As we prepare for our complete reopening, we thought it was a good idea to keep this new format and not return to a printed bulletin. This both allows us greater freedom in how we are able to communicate, by allowing us a later distribution date for the weekly newsletter, and it is environmentally better for our planet.

But we are also aware some people do not use a computer or do not use it in this way. We would like to propose we continue the electronic version of the newsletter, AND we will run off a small number of printed copies which will be available at the entrances of church for those who want to receive the information that way.

This is part of a broader conversation we are currently having about

developing our communication tools going forward. If you have any ideas about what you consider the best means of communicating information you would like to have from St. Gertrude, please send me an email and your ideas will become part of the planning conversation.

Currently, we are considering the *Breaking Bread* Hymnal we have been using for music and the parts of Mass, including the scripture readings. The new hymnals have a start date of the First Sunday of Advent (November 27-28). Because it would allow us to order fewer books, and save money, we are considering getting three "trolleys" that are basically bookshelves on wheels. That way, anyone coming into church picks up her/his hymnal on the way in and then returns it to the trolley as they leave church. The added benefit is that is makes for a cleaner-looking pew area! Until then, we will find a way to make do with our limited supply of hymnals. Once we are again allowed to sing, we may need to produce weekly copies of a song sheet with the lyrics of the hymns we are singing that weekend.

Growing in Faith

From the Scripture Scholars desk: "The Kingdom of God is like Mustard"

Many eyes would have popped open and surprised smiles would have appeared when Jesus' listeners heard him compare the Kingdom of God to mustard, instead of the conventional cedars of Lebanon. Mustard was considered wild and only grown for home use, like medicine, or for sprinkling on food. It was a homey plant, not dramatic or religiously formal. Everyone knew the one thing about mustard was that it sprang up almost instantly, and if you didn't watch where you planted it, it spread so fast it could take over your whole garden!

Let's listen to a scholar from Jesus' day, Pliny the Elder, writing about mustard: "Mustard ...is extremely beneficial for the health. It grows entirely wild, though it improves on being transplanted, but on the other hand, when it has once been sown it is scarcely possible to get the place free of it, as the seed when it falls, germinates at once." (Book 19.Ch. 54)

Jesus' parable speaks to the speedily grown-up bush/small tree, where the leafy branches provide shelter and shade to the birds of the sky. What would you say Jesus' choice of mustard for the Kingdom of God means for you? I wish I could hear what you would say, you and your family and friends when you talk it over.

For me, Jesus is saying that all we have to do is take advantage of any opportunity to plant a seed of God's love, and know that lively, irrepressible growth is underway, spreading outward in all directions, bringing God's Kingdom of love, and peace to touch the hearts of the world.

Resurrection Compost Program Gets Underway

Last Saturday morning, under the direction of our music director, Mary Clare Barker, a group of parishioners dug up and moved a large section of flowering plants from the back yard into the courtyard and near the entrance to the Ministry Center. Pictures can be found here. The space they cleared will become the vegetable garden part of the compost/garden project.

The next step is to plant the starter veggies this Saturday, June 5 from 9:30-11:30 am. If you can help with this project, contact Mary Clare at mcbarker@stgertrudechicago.org. Please bring a shovel and a pad for your knees if you have one and gather in front of the rectory.

Some parishioners already donated some compost from their own compost bins to provide the moved plants with a great start. In the coming weeks, as the compost breaks down, that nutrient-rich soil supplement will nourish the vegetables.

Thanks to all the volunteers for making this wonderful project possible! If you are interested in helping with this project on other dates this summer, there is more information at the entrances (tables) in church or you can email Mary Clare. Additional volunteers are always needed and welcomed to help water and weed the garden and for the proper care of the compost bins.


