Letter from Cardinal Cupich: Catholic Campaign for Human Development

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In his message for the Fifth World Day of the Poor, Pope Francis observes that the COVID-19 crisis, "continues to affect millions of people and, even when it does not bring suffering and death, it is nonetheless a portent of poverty." Yet, he continues, "poverty is not the result of fate; it is the result of selfishness. It is critical, therefore, to generate development processes in which the abilities of all are valued, so that complementarity of skills and diversity of roles can lead to a common resource of mutual participation."

For the past 50 years since the inception of the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), organizations funded by CCHD lead the call

for all of us to stand in solidarity with those who have been marginalized in their communities and to act against injustice. For example, the main purpose of the Coalition for Spiritual and Public Leadership (CSPL), whose membership includes parishes, institutions and communities, is to address injustice in the vision of the Gospel. In its promotion of economic justice, CSPL builds and incubates worker-owned cooperatives. One such co-op involves the worker-owners of Living La Fiesta, who shifted during the Coronavirus pandemic from preparing food to making masks for the public.

The Archdiocese of Chicago is proud that CCHD has its roots in the efforts of a Chicago priest (and later Bishop) Michael Dempsey, during the years he served as pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish on the West Side. By emphasizing self-help, participation and solidarity, CCHD continues the initiatives of Bishop Dempsey as it works to support resilient communities during the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond. Refugee & Immigrant Ministry Online Event Planned for Thursday, November 18

The Refugee and Immigrant Ministry is hosting an online event on Thursday, November 18 at 7:00 pm featuring Kathy Kelly. Reflecting on an Afghan phrase, her talk is entitled, "Blood does not wash away: finding new ways forward as we seek to abolish war." The Zoom link is below.

For those who don't know of Kathy Kelly's work, she is a peace activist who has been nominated three times for the Nobel Peace Prize since 2000. In 1996, she helped to found Voices in the Wilderness, a group which bears witness to the suffering which the U.S./U.N.-imposed sanctions have visited upon the people—especially the children—of Iraq. She has traveled to Afghanistan dozens of times and coordinates the Ban Killer Drones campaign, reminding us that it will be important to keep international focus on the people of Afghanistan.

Second Collection for Refugee & Immigrant Ministry Next Weekend

As the Syrian refugee crisis unfolded in the fall of 2015, our parish stepped up in partnership with Catholic Charities to start the Refugee and Immigrant

Ministry. Since then, we have officially sponsored nine families, helping with rent support, housewares, and accompaniment. Most recently, this fall, we assisted a Syrian family, a single mom with three kids. That's a total of 18 adults and 17 children with an opportunity at a new life. We have also been able to help four more households who have benefited from the ministry with interim rent support and/or friendship. Your generosity has made all this happen.

We've been privileged to sponsor speakers, links to others in the community working with refugees, and opportunities for broader partnership to amplify this ministry.

Thank you for your support! We can only do this work because of the support of this loving community. We also need your continued help to continue to provide rent and resettlement support.

Next weekend, November 27-28, there will be a second collection at each of the Masses to help fund the work of this ministry for the coming year. Donations made by check should be written to St. Gertrude with 'Refugee Ministry' in the memo line. Donations can also be dropped off at the Rectory or made electronically via <u>GiveCentral</u>.

Over the past six years, we've seen crisis and conflict throughout the world, most recently with events in Afghanistan. In our small corner, the St. Gertrude community has been and is a source of blessing and a light of healing. Thank you for your generosity and your prayers.

Growing in Faith

Walking into our worship space at St. Gertrude, my eyes have often been drawn to the depiction of Christ the King in our beautiful stained-glass windows in the sanctuary. At times, reflecting on the image of Christ being literally "on top" of everything has brought me comfort; at other times, that image has seemed so distant and far removed from my everyday life.

Who is this Christ the King for you? I'm drawn to the One who reveals God's unconditional love, as advocate for all who are broken, marginalized, or excluded. This Servant-King's reign embodies the truth which makes our hearts sing – that all of creation is unconditionally loved by God.

These days, the truth seems to have taken a beating. Pilate's question to Jesus reverberates in our political and religious communities. Malcom Gladwell writes: "The holy fool is a truth-teller because he is an outcast." Jesus, the "holy fool", is one to whom we can give our hearts, precisely because his truth is found not in power, prestige, or possessions, but in the invitation that compels us to pour out our lives in service and in love, holding tight and giving witness to the belief that death does not have the last word.

As we come to the close of this year of grace, this is my song: "In the morning when I rise, in the morning when I rise, in the morning when I rise give me Jesus. Give me Jesus. You can take all this world, give me Jesus."

The Season is Over for our Resurrection Compost Garden!


