Advent Begins Today

year, we might take some wisdom from what has happened in the year we just finished. A year ago, who could have guessed what havoc a virus could cause throughout the world, or even the turmoil that would overwhelm our nation as we went through an election year? It is always fair to say we have no idea what might be coming our way!

Advent invites us to take a step back and "be watchful," "for we know not the day nor the hour." Yet we are also believers in Jesus Christ which means we always know the end of the story! God loves us and we have been saved! So then, how do we live in this present moment? The Advent response is always reminding us to live in hope, confident God is with us, patiently waiting for the return of Our Lord. It is from that lens we carry on our work -- which doesn't mean where we are employed, but the far more inclusive and important work of caring and loving one another, reaching out especially to those who are suffering in any way.

Just as the announcements of the coming vaccines help us get through the many restrictions and changes to our daily lives, so this time of preparation for the celebration of Our Lord's birth raises our spirits and focuses us on what is truly important. In all things, our faith and this season remind us that God never abandons us. But each of us must make the conscious decision to turn to God at all times and in all seasons.

Renew My Church Parish Meeting

Everyone is invited to a final presentation from the Renew My Church Team on Sunday, November 29, shortly after the 10:30 am Mass in church. It will be live-streamed on <u>our parish's Facebook page</u> at approximately 11:30 am.

The grouping (St. Jerome, St. Ignatius, and St. Gertrude) completed their work, and after a meeting with our local bishop and his staff, the recommendation from the grouping will be sent downtown for consideration by the Archdiocesan Committee which reviews the submission and then passes it on with their own thoughts to Cardinal Cupich for a final decision.

We hope to hear from the Cardinal before Christmas. This parish meeting will afford any parishioners the opportunity to ask questions of the Parish

Christmas Giving Tree

The Christmas Giving Tree is here! Because of the pandemic, the need is greater than ever and coordination more difficult. The solution is in gift cards! Below in this newsletter, and on the parish webpage, is the list of what is needed by our neighbors using Care for Real and for the refugees sponsored through our parish's Refugee Committee. The information sheet also gives explanations of how this year's Giving Tree works. Gift cards may be dropped off in church by the Giving Tree table or by dropping them off/mailing them to the Rectory **no later than December 16**.

Some Wonderful Feasts Coming Up

Early-to-mid-December provides some great feasts to celebrate our faith and share that faith in some creative and engaging ways with our children. Next Sunday, December 6th, is the feast of St. Nicholas. Tradition tells us Nicholas secretly and anonymously provided the dowry for one or more poor young girls who otherwise would never have been able to marry. Some people remember and honor his generosity by leaving their shoes outside their doors before they go to sleep on December 5th and wake to find some candies and other treats filling those shoes.

Tuesday, December 8th is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of Our Blessed Mother. This is a Holy Day of Obligation and is also the patronal feast of the United States.

On Saturday, December 12th is the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Patroness of the Americas. This is now the largest single religious feast in the western hemisphere! The story of the Mexican farmer, Juan Diego, revealing the image of the Virgin of Guadalupe reminds us once again to reach out to the marginalized in which our own faith can be made stronger.

Finally, the feast of St. Lucy is on December 13th. Lucy died for her faith when her eyes were removed from her head during a period of persecution. Lucy, whose name means light, is honored in certain parts of the world with young girls dressing in simple gowns and wearing crowns of lit candles.

All of these feasts direct our attention to the great feast we are preparing for, the birthday of Our Savior on December 25th.



Growing in Faith

It's the first Sunday of Advent and the new liturgical year. Advent is a special season celebrating a kind of threshold: a place of longing and hope; of being "on alert" awaiting the arrival of the Lord.

For me, it's been an "Advent kind of" eight months. In 2020, more than any year I can remember, I've sought out and watched for the divine in my daily life. Maybe that's because of such election chaos, political division, and overarching social media. Maybe it's the pandemic, which has brought such suffering to this world; while, simultaneously, we witness revelations of hatred and systemic racism that's unacceptable and deeply disturbing.

Waiting for something better to arrive? Yes, I think we're all looking for that! But I suspect the "something better" isn't like a vaccine or a "cure". It's of the Spirit. Jesus said, "I say to all: Watch!". And just maybe he's pointing to the awakening of our spiritual seeker. The one in us who searches for what gives us hope and provides moments of gratitude.

Let's use this Advent and pandemic time to be "on alert" for God now! Not

just the one coming on December 25th, but The Spirit who's available to all who stop to focus and attend. Pat Reardon said it perfectly the other day: "Because I'm out walking more, instead of playing basketball, I'm not rushing around. I'm seeing the beauty of the world."

Or what Eileen Crowley urges us to do: take photos of what you are grateful for. Grab your cell phone and start looking around! It may be on the sideboard or the tree branch outside. Watch! Snap! Awaken!

Archdiocese: Information About Remaining Open

Last week, we received a memorandum from the Archdiocese explaining that, after they surveyed parishes and schools, we would mostly be staying open. Specifically, the memorandum explained:

Affirming the recent communication from our Vicar General, we will continue to stay the course on the current guidelines on Masses and sacramental celebrations.

Given the criticality of in-person learning to student growth and development, the majority of schools will maintain in-person learning until Christmas break. However, there are some schools that will be allowed to transition temporarily to some form of an adjusted schedule or remote learning leading up to the Christmas break. In most cases, these are schools in which the staff and families are aligned about transitioning because of shared concern around high infection rates in their communities and/or because of unique operational challenges at the school. We will contact these schools on a case-by-case basis in the next 24 hours to discuss options and next steps.

We know that virtual learning has been a significant source of stress in some schools. We will be working with designated schools to explore alternative options when warranted.

Here at St. Gertrude's, this means we will continue our regular schedule of daily and weekend masses and other services. I believe this also means we will continue to follow the original guidelines for funerals and weddings, which is the same as the number of people who can come to church for any mass. Our pre-pandemic capacity was 750. Our certified capacity is 15 - 20% of that. We estimate that is about 150 people, which allows for the six-

foot social distancing separation.

The NCA Principal has been in contact with all school families and she will continue to be in contact going forward.

Here is our regular schedule:

 - 4:15 4:45 pm Confessions
 - 5:00 pm Mass
 - Sunday
 - 8:00 am Mass
 - 10:30 am Mass (live-streamed)

Please always be aware of your own situation and any mitigating health concerns in determining whether or not to leave your home for church or any other activity. Until the vaccines are available for everyone, we must continue to wear our masks, wash our hands, and maintain social distancing.

And let us continue to pray for one another, to pray for all those who are caring for the Covid patients, to pray for all those who have lost loved ones to the virus.

May God continue to bless us and keep us healthy and safe.

Reading 1: Is 63:16b-17, 19b; 64:2-7

You, LORD, are our father, our redeemer you are named forever. Why do you let us wander, O LORD, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not? <u>Christmas is Coming - Handmade Gifts</u> <u>Available from Loom</u>

<u>Loom</u>, a Catholic Charities ministry, is a community of refugee women living in Chicago who weave together their creativity and cultural traditions to make and sell beautiful handmade products. These women have fled their country of origin because of a credible fear of persecution on account of their race, religion, political opinion, national origin, or social group.

Loom provides an opportunity, at a weekly workshop, to collaborate, develop new skills, earn extra income, and be part of a community of creative, enterprising women. Through the encouragement of the group and skills learned, many women secure part or full-time employment in and outside of the fashion industry.

Loom artisans collaborate with local designers to produce a beautiful selection of handmade products such as jewelry, bags, and home décor. Artisans use a variety of techniques including indigo dye, crocheting, knitting, sewing, embroidery, and weaving inspired by their cultural traditions.
