Mass of Remembrance

This weekend at the 10:30 am Mass in church, we will celebrate our annual Mass of Remembrance. Each year around the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls, as we begin the month of November, we celebrate the lives of all those parishioners and relatives and friends who have died this past year. In a simple ritual after the homily, the names of all those who have died will be read and a candle with their name will be lit.

Another part of our remembrance is the Ofrenda Table in front of Mary's Shrine. Everyone is invited to bring a small, framed photo or other item of remembrance and place it on the Ofrenda Table for the month of November - the Month of Remembrance. Positioned nearby the Ofrenda Table is the Book of the Dead in which are written the names of all those parishioners, relatives and friends who have died. Please feel free to add any names that have not already been written into the Book of the Dead.

All Saints and All Souls' Days

Because All Saints is on Monday this year, the obligation to attend Mass is lifted. Or, as we might say in English, there is no Holy Day for All Saints this year because the feast falls on a Monday. Tuesday is All Souls' Day as we commemorate all those who have died. Mass on both Monday and Tuesday is at 7:30 am.

Commemorating Cardinal Joseph Bernardin on the 25th Anniversary of his Death

Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, beloved and esteemed Archbishop of Chicago, died on November 14, 1996. He had arrived in Chicago in August 1982 and served here for 14 years. During his time as Archbishop, he left an enduring mark on the Catholic Church in Chicago as well as on the civic community. He also had significant impact and influence on the nation and the world at

large.

The Archdiocese of Chicago is preparing to remember Cardinal Bernardin in two events at the beginning of November. On Monday, November 1 at Holy Name Cathedral (750 N. State Street) at 7:00 pm, there will be a commemoration of Cardinal Bernardin's contribution to the Church and to our civic life. The evening is entitled "Now More Than Ever: The Enduring Prophetic Voice and Legacy of Cardinal Joseph Bernardin 25 Years after His Death." Five speakers will briefly address aspects of his legacy and its continuing relevance in today's world.

On the following day, Tuesday, November 2, again at Holy Name Cathedral, the annual memorial Mass for deceased bishops and priests of the Archdiocese of Chicago will be celebrated at noon. At that Mass, Cardinal Bernardin will be specially remembered.

Who Should Receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick?

At all the Masses on our parish Feast Day weekend, November 13 - 14, we will celebrate the Anointing of the Sick. To help everyone self-determine if they would like to be anointed, here is a brief article explaining the "rules" for this sacrament.

According to the Roman ritual, anyone among the faithful "whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age" not only may, but should, receive the sacrament. Some examples include:

- A person who is considered in danger of death.
- A person who has a serious disease or medical condition (e.g. cancer, heart disease, mental illness, diabetes). The sacrament may be repeated if the person's condition becomes more serious.
- A person preparing for surgery, if a serious illness is the reason for the surgery.

- An elderly person if they have become notably weakened by age, even if there is no particular serious illness present.
- A seriously sick child.



Heart to Heart Month

Heart to Heart is a ministry grown at St. Gertrude that serves some of our most vulnerable residents in Edgewater—our senior citizens. The outreach program's mission is to help seniors who need minimal assistance to enable them to remain independent in their home. Heart to Heart staff complete assessments and connect our seniors in need to community services and agencies that can assist them with financial and home care functions. Additionally, the program offers a medical lending closet. Items available include walkers, with and without wheels, crutches, wheelchairs, and portable commodes.


Equally as important as tending to basic needs is the human connection that Heart to Heart provides - especially those isolated during the pandemic. Social services at St. Gertrude are about showing love and care through a listening ear, a smile, a kind word, or a helping hand. It's about putting faith

into action by loving our neighbors and tending to their needs.

This ministry is traditionally funded by two major events, Father Mike participating in the Chicago Marathon and our annual Heart to Heart play or cabaret. Unfortunately, Father Mike injured his back and was unable to run the marathon this year and COVID protocols prevented any performances.

Domestic Violence Information & Resources

Domestic violence is common, affecting millions of people in the United States each year. Data from CDC's National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (NISVS) indicate:

- About 1 in 4 women and nearly 1 in 10 men have experienced sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner during their lifetime and reported some form of IPV-related impact.
- Over 43 million women and 38 million men have experienced psychological aggression by an intimate partner in their lifetime.

Common signs of abusive behavior in a partner include:

- Telling you that you never do anything right.
- Showing extreme jealousy of your friends or time spent away from them.
- Preventing or discouraging you from spending time with friends, family members, or peers.
- Insulting, demeaning, or shaming you, especially in front of other people.
- Preventing you from making your own decisions, including about working or attending school.
- Controlling finances in the household without discussion, including taking your money or refusing to provide money for necessary expenses.
- Pressuring you to have sex or perform sexual acts you're not comfortable with.
- Pressuring you to use drugs or alcohol.
- Intimidating you through threatening looks or actions.
- Insulting your parenting or threatening to harm or take away your children or pets.

- Intimidating you with weapons like guns, knives, bats, or mace.
- Destroying your belongings or your home.

If this is happening to you, please know help is available. There are places you can safely and/or anonymously speak with to ask questions and create a safety plan.

Growing in Faith

Remembrance Sunday

This weekend, we remember those we have lost this year and, oh my, who among us hasn't had a loss or felt lost of late! Perhaps you've reflected on over 700,000 Americans lost to COVID. Or maybe it's closer to home. I lost someone very dear just a few months ago. It'll take time to regain some semblance of normalcy. Sorrowful, bewildered, alone, the world seems to have lost its color.

The psalmist felt this too. The entrance antiphon, "Make haste and come to my help, O Lord..." and the psalm, "My God, my rock of refuge, my shield..." are cries of someone who knows they cannot bear this alone. Through the fog and confusion there is one constant call from Deuteronomy, "Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength."

Observant Jews place a small container, a mezuzah, at their home entrance holding a scroll with those words. It's a constant reminder of God's presence. Jesus knew this too, adding that the way to truly experience God's presence is through our love for each other. God may seem far away

during times of pain, but to grieve deeply is to honor a deep, abiding love for the person we've lost.

Jesus wants us to know that this is a two-way street: that we, too, are loved by those around us and by God who is with us, whether we're aware or not.
