Third Sunday of Easter

In today's Gospel passage, we continue to hear stories of the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus. Today's scene is an idyllic, pastoral scene with the disciples having returned to their previous profession -- fishing. And when they have an exchange with some guy on the shore, they do what he instructs and are suddenly overwhelmed with the catch of fish in their nets. He then invites them to bring some of the fish they have caught to join him for breakfast. When they get to land, Jesus has already built a fire for cooking and offers them some of the bread he has prepared along with some fish he had cooked.

What is extraordinary about this scene is that it is extraordinarily normal. There is an every-day-life-ness about it! It's just a bunch of friends getting together and having breakfast.

Two things stand out as unusual. The first is the count of fish. They caught

"153 large fish." Why such an exact number? Scripture scholars have determined that was the number of different types of fish people thought existed in the waters. In other words, the catch in the nets of those fisherman contained every type of fish imaginable. A great metaphor for the "types" of people that he would soon be sending his disciples out to so that all might all hear the Gospel. Salvation is for everyone! We don't get to restrict God's love reaching out to the ends of the earth.

The second unusual event is almost an addendum to the fishing/breakfast story. Jesus questions Simon about his love for him and instructs him to "feed my lambs." But he does this three times. The same number of times, just a few days earlier, Simon Peter had denied even knowing Jesus as He was in the midst of His Passion. At first reading, this might sound like a cruel thing to do to Simon Peter. Certainly, the scriptures make clear Simon was hurt by being asked three times if he loved the Lord.

But this seems on closer examination, not a moment of meanness on the part of Jesus, but a profound understanding of how we often accept being forgiven - but don't really take that pardon deeply into our hearts and souls in order to move away from the errors of the past. So, this is not a mean activity on the part of the Lord, but a truly salvific moment for Simon Peter. He is being forced to understand in his deepest heart that he is forgiven for his previous actions - and he needs to accept that forgiveness, that pardon, in order to go forth and accept his new challenge -- to proclaim the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

This week, why not spend a few minutes reviewing any old grudges, horrendous mistakes you've been holding on to, or moments of shame or embarrassment still lingering in your consciousness -- and ask the Lord to speak directly to your heart that you are forgiven, and you are loved. The

Lord wants nothing less than that you move forward, free from the burdens of yesterday's mistake.

March Lending Closet Report

Friends from Swedish Hospital called in March -- medical supplies for a field clinic in Ukraine were desperately needed. Could the Lending Closet help? Serving internally displaced refugees, the clinic needed basic items. The Lending Closet sent 12 boxes of donated first aid supplies (gauze bandages, alcohol wipes, aspirin, etc...), delivered directly by a Chicago delegation to the Ukrainian clinic that week.

Closer to home, a grateful mother stopped by to donate durable medical equipment, including "the Hog", pictured above. A folding Hemi Walker, the Hog, supported her 26 year-old son during his recovery from a motorcycle

accident. The mother said she'd spent hours in prayer at her son's bedside. The Hog, no doubt, has been amply blessed for whoever needs it next!

Married Couples Needed to Work with Engaged Couples

As part of our marriage preparation program, St. Gertrude offers a parish-based PreCana classes, as well as the premarital inventory tool, FOCCUS. The FOCCUS tool measures the level of agreement between the engaged couple in about 11 different areas they will encounter in their married life. Couples fill out this questionnaire through a link provided by a facilitator couple and each party answers a series of questions online. The two sets of responses are then matched and scored, then a print-out of the level of agreement/disagreement between the bride and groom is shared. The facilitator couple, who has been trained in how to read the results, then meets with the engaged couple to discuss the results.

Right now, we have only one couple doing this important ministry, and we are hoping to get one or two more couples involved to share the load. As is true with PreCana, the facilitator couple should be married for at least a few years, with or without children. Experience as a married couple is a

prerequisite, but couples of any age are welcome.

Please consider if this might be a good ministry for you! If you have any questions, I would be glad to speak with you, and/or connect you to our facilitator couple who could better explain exactly how FOCCUS works. Contact me at rprendergast@stgertrudechicago.org.

Care for Our Common Home: Get Back to Nature

This week's eco-friendly, sustainable tips bring us back to nature and they might surprise you. Try to integrate a few of these into your regular routine as you care for our common home:


- Instead of makeup remover, use coconut, jojoba or olive oil (depending on your skin type).
