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From Father Rich

Thanks to the Renew My Church Team: Many thanks to the Parish Renew My Church Team for their leadership and presentations at Sunday's Parish Session I. They did a great job outlining the Renew My Church initiative and the dynamics here in our Rogers Park/Edgewater Grouping. If you were unable to attend either in person or via the live-stream, you can access the recorded version HERE.

Please mark your calendars and plan on attending Parish Session II on Sunday, August 30, right after the 10:30 am Mass (about 11:30 am.) At that session, we will discuss the scenarios which have been crafted for us of the possible configurations for our grouping (St. Gertrude, St. Ignatius, and St. Jerome parishes) as we go forward in the Rogers Park/Edgewater communities. The meeting will be live-streamed,

but in a different stream than our 10:30 am Mass.

The presented scenarios are neither final nor exhaustive. This session is your opportunity to participate In the Renew My Church initiative and offer your own thoughts.

Some Notes from the Parish Staff Planning Days: On Monday, August 10 and Tuesday, August 11, the pastoral staff met, as we do each year, to plan for the upcoming year. Because of the pandemic and the Renew My Church initiative, this was less about a vision to be implemented than about making sure everything is functioning as best as it can during these days. Anticipating the re-opening of NCA, the re-launch of the Religious Education program and the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) requires a lot of attention once again to following the correct protocols to keep everyone safe and healthy.

In that same vein, we are working on getting the set-ups in place so we can begin to allow small meetings in the various spaces on the parish campus. We expect to be able to use the meeting spaces in the Ministry Center and in the Lower Hall of the Social Hall. But the gym is remaining closed. (For decisions on the use of the gym, we are following the protocols for any school usage -- and for right now, all athletic programs of any kind are canceled.) One of the expectations that will be part of any re-opening of meeting spaces is requiring those who use the spaces to follow the protocols for cleaning and sanitizing when their meeting is finished. Failure to do so will mean forfeiting access to those spaces by a group.

On finances, we have been fortunate that since the pandemic began we have continued to receive about 75% of our Sunday Offertory income. Like so many individuals and businesses, we know we have to make some cuts. Because there really isn't any "fat" in the parish budget, this will entail some cutbacks on some staff positions, and possibly even some hours the office is open. While we expect to develop new fund-raising options with the Development Committee and are considering some other actions, the longer this pandemic continues, the greater the loss of income will be for many people and businesses. So it seems prudent to begin planning for less instead of more, or even the same, than what we had been used to. We have made tentative plans for the fall and winter -- including the Parish Feast Day celebrations, Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas. We know

that events many have enjoyed in the past cannot happen this year -- such as the All Are Welcome Concert, the International Dinner, and the Christmas Bazaar. We hope to be able to have the Christmas trees and greenery sale again this year. Kids Word will be a regular event again as it had evolved before July -- that is -- by doing it virtually.

As I believe is true in most of your own homes and businesses, the pandemic causes us to carefully consider what is more important to us and how do we continue to do those things. And also what is not as important and what we may have to let go of for at least the near future. Any of these letting go times are difficult. It is a loss and it can cause not only a sense of loss but even depression. So I again want to encourage everyone to be gentle with themselves as we continue to move forward in this unchartered territory. Times of sadness and loss need to be honored. Everything is not going back to whatever we thought normal was just six months ago. It is very important we respect each other's dealing with their own losses and be supportive.

Would You Like To Take A Hymnal Home? Beginning this weekend, we will have the current hymnals (which also contain the scripture readings for Sundays and the outline of all the daily masses) available on tables in church for anyone who would like to take one home. That way you can use them if you are joining in the 10:30 am mass via live-stream, or wish to bring it with you when you come to church for mass. Hymnals can also be picked up at the rectory office during normal office hours. In a few weeks, we will have a program available for anyone who is interested in purchasing the next edition of the same book whose start date is the First Sunday in Advent (November 29). I apologize for the delay in doing this. When we had to remove all the printed materials from church, we never thought this would be going on for such a long time. Unfortunately, it now looks like there will not be any quick end to the pandemic. Therefore, we will continue to livestream the 10:30 am mass every Sunday morning until we are back to something that looks like the way we used to gather in church. Since we cannot have any paper of any kind kept in church (only one-time usage is allowed), the hymnal option allows anyone to have her/his own hymnal - as long as they carry it back and forth from home.

Volunteers: We are still needing more volunteers -- especially for the Saturday 5:00 pm and Sunday 8:00 am masses. We have the highest need for additional members of the Clean-Up Team which sanitizes the church

after every service. But additional set-up/greeters to help check people in, take their temperatures, sanitize their hands, and lead them to their seats are always welcome! If you are healthy and able, please consider helping out. Just a reminder -- there is no top age limit. If you are healthy, regardless of your age, you are able to be a volunteer. The only condition is for teens under 18 -- they require the permission of their parents/guardians. Thank you for your consideration.

New School Year: As I am writing this, the plan still is to have NCA opening up for the new school year on Monday, August 24. Welcome to all our students, faculty, and staff. Whether you are on-site or beginning the new school year virtually, everyone is praying for a great year, overcoming the unique obstacles of the COVID-19 pandemic. This Saturday, families with children in other local schools who attend Religious Education will be picking up their materials for the new year. Let us keep all our volunteer catechists and all those in the R.E. program in our prayers for another great year!

Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you lose on earth shall be lost in heaven." Then he strictly ordered his disciples to tell no one that he was the Christ.



Growing in Faith

"You are Peter, and on this rock, I will build my Church"

When I was in Peru, a Maryknoll priest told me that there was a leadership center set up in the mountains by a missionary society, to train deacons, since priests were very few. They had their own criteria for suitable candidates and had selected their group, but they also asked the people for any suggestions but were very skeptical of the men the people mentioned. Five years later, however, the missionaries discovered that the only deacons serving the people faithfully were the ones the people had chosen. They had read the hearts right.

God read Peter's heart, and saw that he had an unshakeable love for Jesus, the kind of love that would compel him to follow the arrested Jesus right into the terrible danger of the High Priest's courtyard, and later face his own crucifixion for love of him.

It always seems to come down to love, doesn't it? What a power love is on us! That's what made Simon, "the Rock", the one to whom Jesus could entrust the keys. And Peter calls to us today, to trust in the love of God for

us right now, in the midst of all our challenges, to have confidence, to be reassured, to be strong.

Let me close with this little story: I once asked my dear friend, the late Sister Rosary, who was 96 years old, for the one piece of advice she would give to anyone who might ask her, the one thing to always keep in mind. She said emphatically, looking directly into my eyes: "Sister, God will never let you down!"

Interested in Becoming Catholic?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. This free program begins in late September and meets until Pentecost.

Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are

initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.

This year, RCIA gatherings will be a mixture of Zoom meetings and inperson gatherings after Mass.

One Northside: Tenant Eviction Rights Information

Chances are you're behind on rent, know someone who is, or have heard about the coming eviction crisis. While opposition from the real estate lobby and others blocked <u>comprehensive responses</u> to the crisis, organizing across the state has produced a patchwork of new rights and programs. It's not enough, but when used together, tenants can give themselves real leverage to protect their homes.

Here are ways to help yourself or someone else:

Tenants who live in HUD, CHA, or most subsidized apartments can
use <u>bit.ly/hudchatenants</u> to enforce those programs' specific rights on
back rent/eviction.

- Tenants not in HUD, CHA, or subsidized apartments can fill out <u>bit.ly/letsorganize</u>.
- All tenants can text or voicemail 312.566.8385 if they can't use those links.

Every Tuesday at 6:30 pm, ONE Northside holds a <u>Tenants Rights & Organizing Session</u> with Northside Action for Justice & Northside Tenant Network. Email <u>nmoskowitz@onenorthside.org</u> or call 312-566-8385 for the link to join! We welcome anyone who's dealing with a housing problem, organizing their neighbors, or just wants to help.

Illinois' eviction moratorium was recently <u>extended until 8/22</u>. You can apply for rent help <u>from the City of Chicago until 8/10</u>, and from the <u>State of Illinois after that</u>. A new Chicago law <u>makes landlords negotiate</u> before starting the eviction court process if tenants ask in writing. Lastly, if courts do reopen before the threat of COVID-19 has passed, we can expect the <u>normal 3-8 month eviction court process</u> to last even longer.

The 2020 Census: Importance of the Data

Shape the future of our parish, neighborhood, and community by supporting the 2020 Census. The Census will provide a snapshot of our nation—who we are, where we live, and so much more.

The results of this once-a-decade count determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. They are also used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

Over the next decade, lawmakers, business owners, and many others will use 2020 Census data to make critical decisions. The results will show

where communities need new schools, new clinics, new roads, and more services for families, older adults, and children.

The results will also inform how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding are allocated to more than 100 programs, including Medicaid, Head Start, block grants for community mental health services, and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, also known as SNAP.

The results of the 2020 Census will inform decisions about allocating hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding to communities across the country—for hospitals, fire departments, school lunch programs, and other critical programs and services.

The 2020 Census will be valuable to businesses, as the results will provide a rich set of data on the communities they serve, including population trends and growth projections.

Business owners rely on census results to make decisions, such as where to open new stores, restaurants, factories, or offices, where to expand operations, where to recruit employees, and which products and services to offer.

Sign Up to Vote by Mail

Due to COVID-19, voters are encouraged to use *Vote By Mail* or *Early Voting* before Election Day on November 3, 2020.

Any Chicago voter may <u>apply online now to Vote By Mail</u> ahead of the November 3, 2020 Election. No reason or excuse is needed to Vote By Mail. Chicago voters who apply online between now and September 24 will be among the first to receive ballots. Ballot mailings will begin Sept. 24-Oct. 5.


Chicago voters who apply online to Vote By Mail will receive emails:

- In the days that follow their online application, to confirm that the online application has been received and processed;
- When the ballot is being mailed to the voter -- with a unique link to a system to track the ballot through the US Postal Service;
- When the Vote By Mail "Ballot Return Envelope" is received by the Election Board; and,
- When the Vote By Mail "Ballot Return Envelope" has been approved for counting -- or if there is a question or problem with your Ballot

Return Envelope.

If you are unable to apply online, the Election Board also will be sending Vote By Mail applications and postage-paid return envelopes in late July to all voters who have voted in any election(s) since Nov. 2018 and to any voters who have registered for the first time or updated their registrations since March 18, 2020.
