What to Expect and Do When Coming Back to Church

Donald Trump is President of the United States today because in 2016 he won the Catholic vote. And even though this time he is running against a life-long Catholic, Vice-President Joseph Biden, expectations are still high that Trump will likely again capture the Catholic vote again.

Rarely have two presidential candidates better captured the conflict and

conversation going on in the Catholic Church today. If someone is a "singleissue" voter, that usually means the person claims s/he is against abortion and that person will vote for whichever candidate claims to be against abortion. This pattern has developed over the years as the so-called antiabortion forces and many right-wing supporting bishops and politicians have triumphed in making this the only issue they even consider in elections. I have to agree with a woman religious leader who recently pointed out most of the so-called "pro-life" advocates aren't really "pro-life", they are simply anti-abortion. But when it comes to protecting immigrants at the border, including infants and children; when it comes to protecting the environment and caring for our earthly home; when it comes to providing universal health care; when it comes to working for peace and justice; when it comes to protecting the rights of minorities and women; when it comes to economic justice; these same people are deafeningly silent. They really only want to protect life in the womb, demonstrably unconcerned about the condition of the world and persons once they are born.

Those who truly embrace the much broader-based Catholic social teaching understand that abortion is wrong, and there is also a whole menu of other issues we need to be paying attention to and having our candidates address. The Catholic Church is not a single-issue Church -- no matter what some right-wing laity, priests, or bishops claim. Our teachings do not begin and end with one issue.

I believe Pope Francis has made it exceedingly clear that every believer is responsible for the much broader range of issues affecting humanity. His summons for every believer to reach out to the peripheries is a perfect example of the broader social teaching of the church. In fact, he regularly triggers strong reactions when he addresses issues that some continue to pretend are resolved forever and written in stone. Just last week was another example of his pastoral outreach when he greeted a group of LGBTQ parents from Italy, after a general audience, and told them all parents need to "love their children as they are." He went on to explain, this is, in fact, the way God loves each and every one of us. Regardless of your views on the range of LGBTQ issues, no one is born, lives, or dies without sins, failings, errors, etc. We all come up short of the mark. But that is no reason to treat anyone as anything less than a child of God, equally deserving of the same dignity and respect as any other person.

Which is probably a good place for any Catholic to start in their

consideration of which candidate they should vote for. And that means doing the "homework" necessary -- researching candidate's positions on the important issues facing us today.

The other part of a frequently debated hot topic is whether or not Catholic candidates can receive Communion if they disagree with the Church on a specific teaching. Some bishops have refused Communion to certain candidates. Yet this is contrary to Catholic teaching which insists that the state of any individual's soul is between that person and God. It might also be worth noting that when Communion is refused, it is usually around either the abortion issue or some sexual morality item. It has amazed me for years that no one ever seems to deny anyone Communion for excessive greed or damage to other human beings or the planet. Which had led me to suspect it is usually an act of intolerance -- not morality, that is happening. Neither priests nor ministers of communion are ever meant to be "Communion Police."

We are better than that! As a Church and as individual Catholics. So don't be cowed by extremists announcing they alone know how you should vote. That is nonsense! On the other hand, also don't presume voting is anything less than a sacred duty of citizenship. This means we have to do our homework, know where candidates stand, and vote for the candidates we feel will do the most good and the least harm when in office.

Update on First Communion & Confirmation Catch-Ups - Part II

We have been following up on the departure of our Coordinator of Religious Education a few weeks ago. We are back on track to begin the postponed celebrations of First Communions and Confirmations starting next weekend. Our first group of First Communion candidates will be at the 5:00 pm Mass next Saturday, October 3. The first group of Confirmation candidates will be at the 10:30 am Mass on Sunday, October 4.

Special thanks to Kevin Chears for gathering up all the schedules and contacts with families to get this moving again. And thanks to all the families for their patience and understanding.

If there is a First Communion at a weekend mass, the candidates and their families will sit together in the front section of church -- one pew per family which will be marked with "reserved" signs.

At Communion time, the ushers will hold off on letting anyone else out of

their pews to receive Communion until the First Communicants and their families have received Communion.

If there is a Confirmation at a weekend Mass, the Confirmation will take place immediately after the homily. The candidates and their sponsors will be called forward. I will celebrate the Confirmation and afterward, the newly confirmed will return to their pews and Mass will continue as usual. The candidates and their families will each have one pew in the front section of church which will be marked with "reserved" signs.

Chesterton said, "Gratitude is happiness doubled by wonder." What a wonder, what a privilege, to live in a time when each of us can contribute to tangible change for the better!

St. Gertrude Refugee and Immigrant Ministry: Kadidja Finds Grace and Refuge

"We were able to start a new life here by the grace of God," Kadidja says. A devout Muslim, Kadidja puts her full faith in God, and is very thankful for the hard work and generosity of many Catholics who have positively impacted her family since their arrival in Chicago more than a year ago.

Her Islamic faith has served her well through many tragedies and upheavals in her life. Kadidja, her husband, and daughter fled civil war in their homeland of Central African Republic, seeking refuge in Chad. They lived in Chad for five years, during which time another younger daughter was born and her husband died suddenly of a heart attack.

Although she speaks fluent French and has many family members in France, when the family left Chad in April 2019, they were assigned to live in Chicago, where her stepmother had moved three years earlier.

Catholic Charities coordinated the move with U.S. Immigration and furnished an apartment for Kadidja and her daughters Falmata, 8, and Fatma, 5, in Rogers Park.

That's where we came in! The parish's Refugee and Migrant Committee, with funding from generous St. Gertrude Church parishioners, brought everything the family needed (linens, household products, cleaning supplies, etc.) to start their new lives in a new home. In one night, the committee pulled everything together to make the apartment welcoming upon their arrival.

The biggest changes in their lives moving to Chicago were the cold weather (of course!) and getting used to riding CTA trains (Africa mass transit only has buses), according to Kadidja.

Another surprise was the ongoing generosity of Catholic Charities and St. Gertrude parish - particularly Catrine, a member of the Refugee Committee who speaks fluent French and has provided invaluable support to Kadidja as she learns English. The committee paid the security deposit and rent for several months on the apartment while Kadidja started a new life.

As the family acclimated, Catholic Charities also coordinated with Chicago Public Schools to enroll the girls in school and helped with practical things for Kadidja, such as establishing medical care and helping her create a resume.

Kadidja landed a role at a hotel housekeeping. Then the pandemic hit and she was out of a job. A skilled seamstress, she began sewing about 30 masks a week that were sold by members of the Refugee Committee to family, friends, and acquaintances. For the first time since she arrived in the U.S., she was able to buy new clothes for herself with the money she made from mask sales.

When she arrived in Chicago, she had requested to be in Evanston close to her stepmom and younger siblings. Instead, the family was sent to Rogers Park. She had no one to watch the girls once she started a new job.

The Refugee Committee once again came to the rescue! A committee member heard about a vacant apartment in Kadidja's extended family's building in Evanston. Committee members and others helped them move the day the governor called for a quarantine.

Life continues to improve for the family. Both girls love school (Fatma says

she wants to be a teacher and Falmata wants to be a doctor!) and Kadidja continues to learn English. She recently landed a new job cleaning operating rooms at a hospital.

She is happy for the work but doesn't have many opportunities to build her English skills. She hopes to go to school herself once the kids are back in the classroom.

"I hope my children thrive in school," she says. "I want to become more independent, start school myself, and continue to learn English."

Fr. Mike Bradley will run 26.2 miles through the streets of Edgewater for Heart to Heart on Sunday, October 11! Beginning at 6:00 am, Fr. Mike will start his endeavor at Glenwood and Granville.

Leg 1

- Starting point the church corner of Granville and Glenwood
- West to Clark
- North on Clark to Highland
- East on Highland to Glenwood

- South on Glenwood back to the church
- Back to the church

Leg 2

- · East on Granville to Sheridan Road
- South on Sheridan Road to Glenlake
- · West on Glenlake to Glenwood
- North on Glenwood to Granville
- Back to the church

Leg 3

- West on Granville to Greenview
- South on Greenview to Elmdale
- East on Elmdale to Broadway
- North on Broadway to Glenlake
- East on Glenlake to Sheridan
- North on Sheridan to Granville
- · West on Granville to Glenwood
- · Back to the church

Leg 4

- North on Glenwood to Rosemont
- East on Rosemont to Broadway
- South on Broadway to Granville
- · West on Granville to Glenwood
- · Back to the church

St. Gertrude Renew My Church Scenario Feedback Summary Report

From September 6-20, data was collected from 128 St. Gertrude parishioners about Renew My Church options through paper or electronic surveys, collecting both quantitative data on Renew My Church scenario rankings and qualitative data on supporting reasons for highest- and lowest-scenario rankings and related feedback. Based on this data, the major findings are:

Feedback Summary

- Two-parish scenarios were preferred among most, though not all, St. Gertrude respondents; a single worship center approach was not generally preferred.
- While St. Gertrude respondents preferred scenarios that favored maintenance of their parish and church, these respondents also preferred scenarios that maintained St. Jerome as a parish and church.
- Northside Catholic Academy was a frequently-identified reason to sustain
 St. Gertrude with important costs and risks associated with its move.
- Respondents noted the tension among Renew My Church principles, emphasis on data used in the decision-making process, and foundational spiritual and community development, which face critical challenges from major forces within the Church itself.

More detailed information from the data collected are reported below:

Quantitative Data

Most (75%) respondents had been parishioners for >10 years compared with respondents who had been parishioners for 10 years or less.

Among the top three ranking scenarios, there was no majority scenario identified:

- Scenario 4, 47%
- Scenario 5, 41%
- Scenario 1, 40%

Among the bottom 3 ranking scenarios, Scenario 9 was selected by most parishioners:

- Scenario 9, 52%
- Scenario 10, 41%

Results were generally consistent across parishioner groups, though Scenario 8 was among the bottom 3 scenarios among respondents who had been in the parish 10 years or less.

Qualitative Data

Extensive, wide-ranging comments were captured from parishioners and were analyzed and synthesized by the Renew My Church team.

1. Reasons supporting highest-ranking (n=104 respondents) and lowest-ranking (n=88 respondents) scenarios:

- Two parish scenarios were generally preferred, and single worship site scenarios were generally not preferred. A single parish scenario was noted to be "the defeatist option with little hope in the future" with challenges in pastoral care to provide "ministerial and spiritual needs" that are part of the Renew My Church objectives, including evangelization.
- Northside Catholic Academy was frequently mentioned in both highest-ranking and lowest-ranking scenarios as a central consideration and transition to another facility was thought to be "very costly". The positive influence of Northside Catholic Academy among young families, including "bringing back" parents to the Catholic Church was also noted.
- Recent capital investments and projected costs at St. Gertrude, which was identified as "our beautiful church", which long-term parishioners see as part of their own and their neighborhood's identities.
- St. Jerome's strong Mass attendance was frequently noted by respondents and as an important consideration.
- The Loyola Mission Center has the potential to be an important institution and was generally identified as a positive option, but the pandemic makes this option appear uncertain at best, and "pie in the sky" at worst. The Jesuit order's charism on education, rather than parish ministry, was also noted.
- Concerns about cultural and liturgical differences across parishes, including LGTBQ acceptance and inclusivity, and helping dispersed parishioners integrate into new faith homes.

2. Major implementation challenges (n=99 respondents) and additional feedback (n=60 respondents):

- Bridging the parish and neighborhood communities, including identifying a pastor and team with sufficient time, support, and language skills to provide leadership. Such demands may be "unrealistic" for clergy.
- Transportation, especially among older respondents, with greater difficulty expected based on closures at St. Gertrude and St. Jerome.

- The Covid-19 pandemic has made this process, which already felt rushed and difficult, even harder. The result of any decision will be painful for community members most closely affected.
- There was skepticism in decisions already having been made by the Archdiocese but also appreciation for the outreach from the parish team. Some respondents disliked the number and complexity of scenarios presented, and others disliked the survey presentation.
- Tension among declining attendance numbers, other key data across parishes, and potential for growth through reimagining the Catholic Church in Rogers Park/Edgewater through the Renew My Church process.
- Length of scenario consideration differed among respondents and inherent uncertainty in projecting the future of the neighborhoods over the next 10-20 years.
- Allocation of funds received from any sale or leasing of buildings was not clear in scenarios that reduce the number of buildings yet seems important in decision making.
- Larger forces driving down participation in the Catholic Church are being neglected in this process, including related to vocations, and the "downsizing in responsive to massive funding losses due to clergy abuse" will lead to "resentment".
- "Spiritual formation and community" have been ignored over "numbers and dollars", despite the importance of the former to influence the latter.
- RMC implementation planning with a "strong component of laity" was considered "very wise" at the current stage.

ECRA Community Drive Supporting Care for Real on Saturday, October 3 Volunteers Needed

ECRA will host a collection drive for household and personal hygiene items on Saturday, October 3 from 12:00-3:00 pm at the Ismaili Jamatkhana, 6259 N. Broadway. St. Gertrude an active participant of the Edgewater Community Religious Association and back in early June, ECRA was able to collect about 3.5 tons of items for Care for Real.

We also welcome the donation of non-perishable food items, although the

greater need at present is for household supplies (toilet paper, paper towels, cleansers, disinfectants, face masks, gloves) and personal care products (soap, shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, feminine hygiene products, toothpaste, toothbrushes).

Items can be dropped off at the parking lot on the northeast corner of Broadway and Rosemont. (Entrance to the parking lot is on Broadway.) To maintain social distancing and limit personal contact, we request that when possible items for drop-off be placed in your vehicle's trunk. Volunteers equipped with face masks and gloves will remove items directly from your trunk. For those who walk to the drive, items may be dropped off on designated tables in the parking lot. In both circumstances, we ask that you follow social distancing protocols to limit personal contact.

With Care for Real serving the Rogers Park and Edgewater communities, we hope that the Edgewater and Rogers Park communities will come together to support this charity in its effort to provide these items to those most in need in our communities.

Order a Breaking Bread Hymnal for 2021 for Personal Use

Due to COVID-19, we do not know when we will be able to put hymnals back in the pews for communal use. Parishioners are welcome to order their own personal copies of Breaking Bread 2021 for use at home or brought to/from church. The hymnals contain the scripture readings for Sundays and the music we use in church. The start date for using it is the First Sunday in Advent (November 29).

Missals are being sold at a discounted rate of \$7.00/hymnal. This includes tax and shipping. Your order, along with payment, must be received by Monday, October 26.

When the missals arrive, you will be contacted and can pick it up at the Rectory or at church when you come to Mass.

Purchases may be done two ways:

1. Online Purchase

A Message from Cardinal Cupich: Get the Flu Vaccine

Dear Archdiocese community,

We have faced unprecedented challenges this year as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Loved ones have sickened and, in some cases died. We have had to adjust to drastic changes in the way we live our lives. As Catholics committed to defending life, we are called to take responsibility for the welfare and safety of our community. This year, that means wearing a mask, washing our hands, and taking other precautions to prevent the spread of this deadly virus.

Archdiocese of Chicago personnel have worked hard these past few months to plan and execute preventive measures so we could open our churches and schools safely. All our hard work might have less impact though if we don't take one more step and get our influenza immunizations as soon as possible.

While it's known as the common flu, there's really nothing common about influenza in 2020. Without a doubt, this will be the most important flu shot you will ever receive. In the coming weeks, we will witness a convergence

of both viruses – influenza and COVID-19. Common flu symptoms such as fever, cough, sore throat, and extreme fatigue are similar to COVID-19 symptoms. Health care providers can become overwhelmed by patients mistaking one infection for the other.

Influenza can be, in itself a serious illness. More than 200,000 Americans are hospitalized each year with the flu. While most people recover completely in one to two weeks, some develop very serious and potentially life-threatening complications such as pneumonia. Over the past decade, influenza and pneumonia have been linked to an annual average of 3,500 deaths in Illinois, alone.

Nobody likes getting shots. I certainly don't, but I got mine this month. Getting a flu shot is easy and inexpensive and it is recommended for just about everyone, even children over the age of six months. It's available free through most insurance plans and public health clinics. You can find a vaccine provider near you by visiting <u>vaccinefinder.org</u>.

Let's roll up our sleeves and take this simple step. You may save a life. You will certainly help make this unprecedented year less deadly for our community.

My prayers are with all of you and particularly with those who have suffered illness and loss. And I ask that you pray for me.

Interested in Becoming Catholic?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. This free program begins in late September and meets until Pentecost.

Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.

This year, RCIA gatherings will be a mixture of Zoom meetings and inperson gatherings after Mass.


