

Our world continues wrestling with the COVID-19 pandemic. No one is untouched by it as it delivers sickness and death to so many. At the same

time, its effects have exposed a different level of suffering throughout the world. Observers have used the language of pandemic to describe the terrible damage other evils have inflicted upon the world. The sins of racism and inequality, the sins of inadequate health care for all citizens, the sins of employment denied or undervalued because of the ones doing the work or the jobs in which they are working. COVID-19 has exposed fractures in our society. If we thought racism was only an American sin, it is now clear from demonstrations around the world it is a universal sin. Those who first labeled it our "Original Sin" were spot on!

With all this exposure, these revelations have become visible in large part because the whole world had to stop for this brief moment. And in that stopping, we finally have become able to recognize what was wrong and that we have been given an opportunity to address these wrongs.

As Christians, we are all united as brothers and sisters in Lord. And not only that, we are now his Body and Blood! We have been saved because of Him. But unlike the Christ, we are not yet perfected. So we still grapple with our sinfulness. But that can never overcome us if we keep turning towards the Lord.

Each time we gather for the Eucharist, the prayers of consecration make not only the bread and wine holy, they are also changing us. While it is true the bread and wine become Christ's body and blood – perhaps more importantly we do also! We become what we consume. And in so doing, we are inextricably united with Him now and always.

So we need to reconsider what this pandemic has wrought. Is it not like Good Friday? Are we not shocked by the evil and the damage and the hatred that has been exposed? Are not the viruses ripping apart our society an even greater evil? And does it not become clearer every day that this pandemic was perhaps the only kind of global wake-up call that could finally, hopefully, bring us to confront what we have feared and covered over for too many years?

I do not pretend to imply this new awareness and what has to follow will be painless and not cause its own suffering. But that is redemptive suffering! That is the suffering that leads us to new life in which all people are recognized for their true value as daughters and sons of a loving God. That is the suffering which leads all people to be responsible for one another.

Holy Thursday and Good Friday and Easter Sunday are not only historic events, they are also the shorthand that tells us where we are, where we are going and how we will get there. And this should be no surprise to any Christian, or any human being of any faith – we get there when we love one another and never let that love and the care that it necessitates become second in importance to anything else.

God has given us another chance. We can fix things between and among ourselves. We can even fix the world of nature, which now teeters on the brink of collapse. We can live in the hope that this is not the end but only a new beginning.

# Readings for Sunday, June 14

## Reading 1: Dt 8:2–3, 14b–16a

Moses said to the people: "Remember how for forty years now the LORD, your God, has directed all your journeying in the desert, so as to test you by affliction and find out whether or not it was your intention to keep his commandments. He therefore let you be afflicted with hunger, and then fed you with manna, a food unknown to you and your fathers, in order to show you that not by bread alone does one live, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of the LORD.

"Do not forget the LORD, your God, who brought you out of the land of

Egypt, that place of slavery; who guided you through the vast and terrible desert with its saraph serpents and scorpions, its parched and waterless ground; who brought forth water for you from the flinty rock and fed you in the desert with manna, a food unknown to your fathers."

### Reading 2: 1 Cor 10:16-17

Brothers and sisters: The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ? Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf.

### Gospel: Jn 6:51-58

Jesus said to the Jewish crowds: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I

in him. Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever."



Growing in Faith

Every loved one leaves behind a gift in death, it is said. It may not be immediately evident, but the bereaved must be patient and the gift will appear.

When my sister was receiving chemotherapy for a particularly aggressive cancer, I brought her communion before each of her treatments. Having no pyx with which to transport the consecrated hosts, I used a tiny brass and mother-of-pearl ladies' compact with an even tinier indentation inside, the perfect size for the two hosts I would bring. In the dim, yellow light of her small kitchen, my sister and I held hands in prayer and then partook of the Body of Christ. We were two women living in this sacred moment and, for only this moment, undisturbed by fears and concerns about what the future might hold.

Sometimes we were silent afterward. Sometimes we spoke softly. Always we were aware that a profound and transformative experience had occurred in this very mundane space.

Now, in this time of uncertainty, when Church is a spare room with a computer screen and receiving the Eucharist is not possible, I find myself

recalling those moments that my sister and I shared. I have come to realize that this must serve as my Eucharist. The memory of a tiny Oak Park kitchen has become my cathedral and an antique ladies' compact my ciborium.

I only now recognize that this is the gift for which I had been searching. Thank you, my dear sister.

# Reopening Information - Sign Up to Pray in Church

On Monday, June 8, we received word that we have been certified to reopen church! Church is now open Monday through Saturday from 9:30-11:30 am for private prayer.

Here are some pointers everyone will need to be aware of as we return:

- For all church activities, including services/Masses, the only entrance will be the Granville (handicap access) door.
- Everyone will need a reservation for coming into church. You can make a reservation online <u>HERE</u>, or you can call the Rectory office at 773.764.3621.
- Registrations must be entered at least 24 hours in advance of the service/Mass you plan to attend.
- Only 50 people may be in the church at any given time. If others are waiting, your stay will be limited to 20 minutes.
- If your name does not appear on the registration list, you will be asked to wait outside. If fewer than 50 people are in attendance at the beginning of the service, you will be admitted.
- Everyone must wear a mask. If you do not have a mask when you arrive, one will be provided. (Only exceptions are for medical conditions.)
- Once you are admitted, your temperature will be taken with a non-touch electronic thermometer and you will have your hands sanitized.
  Then you will be checked in and an usher or greeter will take you to a seat. (Those living in the same households can sit together.)
   Everyone in church is expected to maintain safe-distancing protocols

by observing the markings on the floor and in the pews which give directions for spacing and traffic flow.

- Public masses return on Monday, June 22 at 7:30 am.
- Weekend Masses begin Saturday, June 27 and Sunday, June 28. We will have the Saturday 5:00 pm Mass and the 8:00 am and 10:30 am Masses on Sunday. On the first weekend, we are allowed to have 50 people in church. Once we are confident we have our protocols down and things are operating smoothly, we can have from 15-20% of our capacity at any Mass, 125-150 people.
- Even when public Masses start, we will continue to live-stream the 10:30 am Sunday Mass as we have been doing.
- If you are 65 or over, and/or have any health condition that leaves your health in any way compromised, please stay home! As Cardinal Cupich reminds us, during this pandemic time, missing Mass is not a sin!

We very much look forward to welcoming everyone back to church! Please feel free to contact the office or any member of the parish staff with any questions. We remember each of you in prayer every day! Please pray for St. Gertrude parish and all those who are suffering in any way.

As Chicago moves into its first phase of reopening, the Archdiocese has provided comprehensive guidelines for how parishes can move forward in once again celebrating mass together in church. We have volunteered to assist in coordinating our reopening efforts at St. Gertrude.

The protocols established by the Archdiocese are rooted in protecting the health and safety of our parish family. Assuring this safety is going to take the proverbial village.

We need volunteers to both prepare for opening and to manage each event (mass, baptism, funeral, reconciliation, marriage, private prayer, etc.) that will take place in the church. The safety protocols will likely be in place for an extended time.

As such, we are asking you to prayerfully consider joining our volunteer corps for this effort. Without the assistance of our parishioners, we cannot move forward with reopening our parish home to once again celebrate the sacraments together.

Please consider this additional opportunity to serve our parish. Without enough volunteers, we cannot be certified to reopen.

For safety reasons, volunteers should be between 18-64 years of age and not have conditions that would put them at risk for negative outcomes from COVID-19 infection (immunosuppressive therapy, heart or lung disease, cancer, etc.)

The St. Gertrude parish office is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 am-1:00 pm. Beginning Saturday, June 13, the Rectory will be open on Saturday from 9:00 am-1:00 pm.

We ask that all visitors follow these regulations:

- The office is open by appointment only. Appointments may be made by email to <u>stgertrude1420@stgertrudechicago.org</u> or by phoning 773.764.3621.
- We will accept only one appointment at a time so we can observe social distancing requirements of being six feet apart. There will be social distancing markings in the front hallway. If more than one person needs to be present for the appointment, please inform the office of the number of people so that appropriate social distancing procedures may be observed. We suggest a limit of four people.
- Visitors must not exhibit any signs of COVID-19 related illness (fever of 100.4 degrees or above, cough, shortness of breath, sore throat, chest tightness, extreme fatigue, loss of sense of taste or smell, diarrhea, muscle aches, or headaches) or had exposure to anyone with these symptoms.
- Visitors must wear masks or face coverings.
- Visitors must use hand sanitizer upon entering and exiting the building. Hand sanitizer will be provided.
- Requests such as new parish registrations, changes in parishioner address or phone numbers, Mass or prayer intentions, scheduling, etc. should be made by phone or email.
- Please make an appointment only if a face-to-face meeting is absolutely necessary. If you are dropping off checks or documents, please put through the mail slot at the Rectory door on the west side of the building between Granville Avenue and the alley. If what you are dropping off is too large to fit through the mail slot, please notify the Rectory to make further arrangements.


