From Father Rich

Today's readings focus our attention on God always providing for us with enough of what we need -- especially food. Our central image for our faith-gatherings is the Eucharist.

This meal reminds us every time we come together that God always provides enough. It is up to us to be sure we are doing what is necessary to share the gifts we have received -- especially ensuring those who have so little always have enough.

Today's Epistle, from St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, reminds us to live in such a way that our actions make clear we are worthy of the call we have received. St. Paul lists some of the traits that make this possible: "humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one spirit..." What a great source for a daily examination of conscience! With so much of our political world filled with divisiveness and the rise of so much ugly nationalism, setting one nation against another, St. Paul calls us back to what God asks of each of us.

Last week, Pope Francis released some new instructions on how the Latin Mass may be celebrated. This clarification came about, as he explained because it had become clear many people have weaponized (my word, not Pope Francis') the liturgy. This isn't just the U.S. bishops trying to mandate who can and cannot receive Holy Communion, it is happening all over the world with people using the Latin Mass and other church experiences to cause divisions.

It is worth remembering whenever we are working to divide instead of to unite, that we are not following the work God has entrusted to us. Or, to make it even clearer -- there is enough food in the world to feed every living man, woman, and child. That there is still hunger and starvation is not because of a lack of resources, but how they are shared. Perhaps the vaccine situation is an even more recent example. Wealthy nations have it. Poor nations do not. How can we better reflect the generosity of God?

Summer Mission Appeal - August 7-8: Helping Children


Each year in summer, every parish in the Archdiocese of Chicago celebrates a Summer Mission Appeal weekend. In past years, we have welcomed speakers from various

That day, the Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola will be St. Ignatius' final weekend Mass. Please continue to keep the parishioners of St. Ignatius in your prayers and welcome all those who are seeking a new parish home in the coming weeks.



As I mentioned in some previous columns, with the closing of St. Ignatius parish, the boundaries of both St. Jerome and St, Gertrude have been extended to include the geographic boundaries of the former St. Ignatius. And the campus of St. Ignatius Parish is now part of St. Gertrude parish. There may be some special Masses/services at St. Ignatius in the coming months - especially services such as funerals.

In the next twelve months, discussion will continue about the possibility of a Mission Center hosted jointly by St. Jerome and St. Gertrude parishes. Recently, in a meeting with Bishop Bartosic, representatives of St. Ignatius parish, and Loyola University clarified that, at this time, the University will not be able to be partnering in this possible venture. What will happen to the campus of the former parish has yet to be determined.

There's a way of understanding the gospel of the loaves and fishes that goes like this:

Jesus didn't magically make more food appear; rather, he awakened the generosity in the heart of each person there, leading them to share the food, which they'd already brought with them (and were hiding, hoarding, hesitant to share). Led by a child, they began sharing with





So it is with COVID-19 vaccines right now. We're in this moment – we are among the 5,000 in the crowd. We (the wealthier nations of the world) have the vaccine - have more than enough to vaccinate all, with plenty leftover - and yet, we're hiding, hoarding – hesitant to share from our bounty (our surplus) with our neighbors in need on this planet. (About 50% of Americans are vaccinated, with surpluses estimated at one billion doses, even once all are vaccinated; by comparison, about 2% of Africans are vaccinated, lacking a vaccine supply.)

"The hand of the Lord feeds us," we repeat in the responsorial psalm – but I hear St. Teresa: "Christ has no hands on earth but yours." The story of the loaves and fishes is one of the few miracles that all four evangelists record in the gospel - but I say: may we see this miracle for ourselves, in our time!

Urge the President to share our vaccine doses with those in need globally, and may our example help to unleash the generosity of the world.


St. Gertrude's Connection to Care for Real
