

From Father Rich

Depending upon your ancestry, this week might contain a major Feast Day for you. Today, March 17th is the feast of St. Patrick, and Tuesday, March 19th is the feast of St. Joseph. Both of these celebrations offer special events, special foods, and delicious bakery treats. Enjoy the heritage that makes these days special by sharing your celebration with family and friends. And, especially in the tradition of the St. Joseph Table, remember to share your good fortune with those who are lacking in basic necessities, who are struggling to put food on the table every day.

Next weekend is the Spring Play. Be sure to plan on joining in the fun on Friday or Saturday nights as fellow parishioners share



their talents, voices, and good humor! I hope to see you next weekend at the play in the Social Hall.

This weekend, the women and men who are in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) will be sent from the 5:00 pm Mass on Saturday, March 16 in preparation for celebrating the Rite of Election at Holy Name Cathedral with one of the Archdiocesan bishops. At this special ceremony, they will be recognized in their faith journey leading them towards membership in the Catholic faith community. This special ceremony publicly recognizes their journey and begins their final "retreat" preparation for entrance into the Church at the Holy Saturday Easter Vigil Mass. Over the next three Sundays, they will be at different weekend masses at which they will celebrate the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Scrutinies. These Scrutinies are a ritual celebration of examining their lives in order to root out sin and fully embrace the life of faith in Christ Jesus. Please keep them in your prayers during these important weeks. As they celebrate the Scrutinies, we are invited to do the same in our own lives, seeking out whatever blocks us from fully accepting God's will in our lives.

A reminder for those preparing for infant baptisms. Baptismal preparation class for parents (sponsors are always welcome!) is on the first Monday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Rectory. Please call the office to sign up for the class you wish to attend. Baptisms are celebrated three times each month: after the 11:30 am Sunday Mass (at about 12:30 pm) on the second and fourth Sundays of the month (except during Lent.) An additional time for baptisms is at one of the weekend Masses and rotates from month to month. So one month we celebrate baptisms at the Saturday 5:00 pm Mass, then the next month at the Sunday 8:00 am Mass, etc. This allows families more options, and also makes it possible for the parish congregations to participate in this important sacrament a few times in the course of the year. All those wishing to have their child(ren) baptized are asked to call the Rectory office at 773.764.3621 to schedule the baptism and provide the necessary information so we can have the appropriate certificates prepared in advance of the baptismal celebration. Please feel free to call the office with any questions.

One final reminder—this time about our arrangement with Starbucks. We don't celebrate Mass at the Starbucks stores. And we ask everyone to please **not** bring your cup or thermos of coffee, tea, etc. into church.

Growing in Faith

In March, we venerate two very special saints: St. Joseph and St. Patrick. What did they have in common? Life-changing dreams.

Patrick, while studying for the priesthood, had recurrent dreams. They were the Irish voices of those who had kidnapped him and brought him to Ireland as a slave in his youth. The voices beseeched him to return to Ireland. Patrick did return to Ireland after he became a bishop. He spent the next thirty years of his life establishing the Church, baptizing thousands of pagans and ordaining hundreds of priests.

In a dream, St. Joseph had an Angel of God explain the reason for Mary's condition. Joseph may not have understood the magnitude of this message, but Joseph accepted the fact that he would act as the father of the child, Jesus.

Both St. Joseph and St. Patrick turned their faithfilled lives over to the Will of God. We also need to be open to God's will through listening in contemplative prayer or in the stillness of meditation.

Lent 2019: Our Invitation to a Second Chance Week II

The Second Sunday of Lent offers us a peek into our salvation. In the Gospel story of the Transfiguration, we see the promise of God's covenant realized in Jesus. This story is a precursor to the actual Resurrection of Jesus, a taste of the full reality that will come on Easter.

One way of considering the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving is that these serve as a warm -up to the more difficult moments in our lives. I may find the discipline of these practices a little difficult, challenging me in my daily schedule and self-focus. But they also have the ability to begin to steel us for the more challenging, often very dark moments in our lives. They prepare us for real encounters of powerlessness, helplessness, those times when our hope is greatly challenged.

The Transfiguration is hope. God always delivers upon the promises made! Before his Passion and Death, Jesus brings comfort to the disciples when they share this experience of him as Lord and Son of God. Even if the disciples did not understand fully what this meant, in time they would realize the Lord's loving concern was always present, preparing them for the most difficult times yet to come.

Ten days into Lent is a good time to "take the temperature" of this Lent. How am I feeling about the invitation to a second chance? What are some of the past experiences I still carry around within me because I have yet to fully accept forgiveness. What do I need to bring before the Lord, asking Him to enable and allow me to move beyond yesterday's sins and failures? Isn't that, in fact, what the Transfiguration and Resurrection are all about -- the transformation of what was only darkness and death into new life and light?

God always wants what is best for us. That love is lived out in the constant forgiveness of our sins which we can accept, whenever we are ready. Wouldn't today be a good day to begin turning whatever we are holding onto from yesterday to the Lord -- so that we might let go of what drags us down and then live in the freedom of the present moment, with all its promise?

R.C.I.A. Reflection

At the Easter Vigil on Saturday, April 20, those in the R.C.I.A. (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) will become members of the Catholic Christian community or Received into Full Communion with the Catholic Church. We'll share their stories in the bulletin as Easter approaches. Please keep all of our Elect and Candidates in your prayer during these weeks of Lent.

Almoner's Program

We are once again incorporating the Almoner's Program as part of our Lenten opportunities. Named after the office in charge of almsgiving at the Vatican, this program is meant to help connect us with those on the periphery while we also pursue our works of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent.

Each Sunday during Lent we have a second collection exclusively for this program. The money from that collection will be used to purchase McDonald gift cards with \$5.00 pre-loaded on the card. Each Sunday during Lent a volunteer will be in the back of Church after Masses with the gift cards. Everyone is invited to take as many pre-loaded gift cards as they think they will likely use during the week to give to people in need that they encounter on their usual routine (maybe on the bus or el, or when you are stopped at certain intersections, etc.)

As part of this Lenten outreach, everyone is encouraged to use the moment of handing over the card as an opportunity to have a brief, humane, and



human conversation with the other person, affirming them and wishing them well. This interaction is often more important than the card itself.

Lenten Activities & Events

Stations of the Cross: Stations of the Cross will be prayed every Friday during Lent at 3:00 pm in Church. On Good Friday, April 19, there will be Living Stations of the Cross at 3:00 pm, featuring teens from the parish.

Simple Suppers: All are invited to participate in faith-focused reflections while sharing a meal of soup and bread. Various parish groups will host these meals in the Social Hall from 6:00-7:30 pm. Dinners will be held on:

- Wednesday, March 27, hosted by the Commonweal Conversation group
- Wednesday, April 3, hosted by the NCA Preschool
- Wednesday, April 10, hosted by the Parish Pastoral Council

Refugee Committee Postcard Event: A postcard writing event will be held on Sunday, April 7 after the 10:00 am, 10:30 am, and 11:30 am Masses, to encourage elected officials to treat refugees with fairness and compassion.

Lenten Reconciliation: A reconciliation service will be held Sunday, April 7 at 3:00 pm in Church. This is a quiet, reflective service which is a combination of music, scripture, and a guided reflection which serves as an examination of conscience.

Rice Bowls: Catholic Relief Services' rice bowls are available in the back of Church.

Lenten Liturgy

As we enter into this Lenten season, we also try to reflect in our Sunday liturgies a different pace and tone that reflects this season. The Penitential Rite focuses us on our need for forgiveness as we pray the Confiteor (I confess) and sing the *Lord, have Mercy*. Slightly longer pauses after the first and second readings, and again after Communion, offer us time for a little more silent reflection. We sing the same psalm (a seasonal psalm) throughout the forty days, *The Lord Is My Light and My Salvation*. The Gospel Acclamation is void of any "Alleluias"

until Easter and we sing a different Mass with a more somber tone. We will also chant the Lord's Prayer at all Masses, and we will use Sacred Silence as a meditation song frequently throughout the season

On the fifth Sunday of Lent, to reflect the more somber tone of what we used to call Passion Week—the week before Holy Week, we will simplify liturgy even more, with very "quiet" music—maybe one flute, e.g.

Refugee Committee

Rohingya Refugees: Many of the refugees welcomed by the St. Gertrude Refugee Committee have been Rohingya, practicing the Muslim faith in Myanmar (once called Burma.) The persecution by the Buddhist people and leaders there has been termed genocide. Although the Rohingya have lived on the coast since the eighth century, they are considered unwanted illegal immigrants in their country. According to one UN official, they are experiencing "ethnic cleansing" that includes rape, extra judicial killings, and razing of villages by the army. Those fleeing across the Bay of Bengal to Bangladesh suffer the fate of many people fleeing their homes, including dangers from traffickers.

The Rohingya families that we are assisting traveled to Malaysia, where they waited years (in one case, eight!) for admission to the United States.

Almoner's Collection Year to Date

Parish Council Minutes from February 28:

The group continued conversation around the four parish commissions begun in January, and aligned approximately half of the parish ministries to a commission. Dialogue on this topic will continue at the March meeting, and the PPC members will also be asked to join a commission.

Greg Pierce provided the PPC with an overview of one-on-ones—what they are (and are not), why they are important, and how to go about them.

There are three main reasons why one-on-ones are important:

- 1. They are grounded in the message offered by Jesus, "Come and see." This approach is the foundation of the Church and the key to driving future engagement.
- 2. They can help our democracy. Currently, both sides of the political spectrum tend to talk past each other. One-on-ones can help bridge the gap and get people to start finding common ground. American democracy is rooted in one-on-ones.
- 3. They can help break out of the social media/ Internet echo chamber, as one-on-ones are about in-person dialogue and relationship building. One -on-ones are a bigger investment in time and effort than simply clicking "Like."

Following establishing the final alignment of all parish ministries within commissions, PPC members will be holding one-on-ones with representatives from the various ministries.

The next meeting is Thursday, March 28 at 7:00 pm in the Ministry Center.
