From Father Rich

Happy Mother's Day! As we give thanks to God for all our mothers, let us also be sure to thank them for their love and care. And let us treat them as well every day of the year!

On this Mother's Day, we also celebrate the Blessed Mother with our May Crowning celebration at the conclusion of the 10:30 am Mass. We are especially happy to welcome the girls and boys who celebrated their First Holy Communion yesterday and are with us in their First Communion finery!

Congratulations to all the girls and boys who celebrated their First Communion! We are so proud of you and so happy to welcome you as we share in the Body and Blood of Christ at the table of the Lord!



It seems particularly appropriate that as all these celebration come together, we also celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday. The 4th Sunday of Easter always brings to our attention this wonderful image of Our Lord. The image/icon of the Good Shepherd is one of the oldest, and most beloved of all Christian images. It portrays the actual relationship of each of us with God, who seeks out what is lost; who lifts us up and carries us on his shoulders when we are too weak to keep up; who knows us each by name. Another word for the Good Shepherd is mercy! Let us practice mercy in how we treat one another.

Recently, the area pastors and the local bishop, Bishop Bartosic, began a discussion about providing adult education in the area. The overriding purpose of the adult education is so that we might better form our children in the ways of faith. The perceived need comes from a common experience in many parishes today. There is often a huge disconnect between parents sending their children to a Catholic schools or Religious Education program, and the practice of their Catholicism on Sundays and throughout the year. Many parents consider the local Catholic school simply a "private" opportunity that allows them to avoid an area public school, and also avoid the much higher tuition of the actual "private" schools available.

At the conclusion of the Rite of Baptism, there is a blessing that includes these words: "Parents are the first teachers of their children in the ways of faith. May they be also the best of teachers, bearing witness to the faith by what they say and do." Sometimes it seems as if some parents have "farmed out" that faith responsibility to the school or Religious Education program. This meeting is a starting point to see what, if anything, can be done to restore the connection between our faith and our educational enterprises.

Of this much I am certain, we do not have Catholic schools in order to avoid participation in the local public school system, nor do we consider our schools private. Catholic schools are part of the parish mission. We operate them to spread the faith by forming our children in the Catholic faith. At least a few times a year at the sacramental meetings for parents of children preparing for the reception of the sacraments, I stress the importance of not raising "spiritually schizophrenic" children -- by which I mean telling the children it is important for them to come to church -- but then the family not practicing their faith together. Over time, what this teaches the children is that it is okay to say one thing and do something altogether different. Not a good idea for the long-term formation and moral development of the children. As they have done from time immemorial, children will always mimic what their parents are actually doing, no matter what they happen to be saying. As this endeavor moves forward, I will keep you informed.

Through this we show love not as just an emotion but an action, and not just to our children but to all children. Just as Mary was mother to all, we know how important it is to mother to all. Through this demonstration of love, we pass on a tradition of love, and when we do that we know in our hearts that even if we don't fit the modern societal model of the perfect mom, that we have given our children the essential, a mother's love. And that love in the midst of all the chaos of our daily lives, is what we hope will endure.
