

seminary collection can be placed in the (taller) brown box on the sign-in table in the front of church or <u>online</u>. Thank you.


Renew My Church

Readings for Sunday, September 20

Reading 1: Is 55:6-9

Seek the LORD while he may be found, call him while he is near.

Let the scoundrel forsake his way, and the wicked his thoughts; let him turn to the LORD for mercy; to our God, who is generous in forgiving. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts.

Reading 2: Phil 1:20c-24, 27a

Brothers and sisters: Christ will be magnified in my body, whether by life or by death. For to me life is Christ, and death is gain. If I go on living in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me. And I do not know which I shall choose. I am caught between the two. I long to depart this life and be with Christ, for that is far better. Yet that I remain in the flesh is more necessary for your benefit.

Gospel: Mt 20:1–16a

Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out at dawn to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with them for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard.

Going out about nine o'clock, the landowner saw others standing idle in the

marketplace, and he said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard, and I will give you what is just.' So they went off. And he went out again around noon, and around three o'clock, and did likewise. Going out about five o'clock, the landowner found others standing around, and said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They answered, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard.'

When it was evening the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Summon the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and ending with the first.' When those who had started about five o'clock came, each received the usual daily wage. So when the first came, they thought that they would receive more, but each of them also got the usual wage.

And on receiving it they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last ones worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us, who bore the day's burden and the heat.' He said to one of them in reply, 'My friend, I am not cheating you. Did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what is yours and go. What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? Are you envious because I am generous?' Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last."



Renew My Church: A Call to Humility, Trust, Hope, and Charity

As our grouping team continues the strenuous task of prayerfully discerning and thoughtfully discussing the strengths and weaknesses of the various scenarios presented a few weeks ago, we would do well to keep a few scriptural passages in mind:

"Then an argument broke out among them about which of them should be regarded as the greatest. He said to them, "The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them and those in authority over them are addressed as 'Benefactors'; but among you it shall not be so. Rather, let the greatest among you be as the youngest and the leader as the servant. For who is greater: the one seated at table or the one who serves? Is it not the one seated at table? I am among you as the one who serves. (Luke 22: 23-27)

I encourage all of us to meditate on this passage and its impact on our own lives and, in a special way, our thoughts as to what might be best for the future of our parish and our place in the renewal of the Church for the entire Chicagoland area. We are called to serve one another.

The Renew My Church prayer that we shared at the beginning of this process and that is prayed by our Grouping Team at every meeting offers these intentions:

Pour out the gift of your Holy Spirit upon us, and so enable us

to hear you clearly

to listen to each other attentively

to imagine our future boldly

to discern your direction wisely

to persevere in your holy will courageously

to stay together in charity

to surrender our own plans readily

to embrace the greater good

to hand on your gifts to future generations.

Let us continue to make these intentions our own as a daily expression of our love for and hope in Jesus Christ, His Church, and our entire Archdiocesan faith community.

Growing in Faith

"The Kingdom of God is at HAND!"

In my work as an occupational therapist, I restore arm and hand function, and I teach people neck exercises – look to the left, look to the right. I

always start with a little heart exercise, because the heart pumps the blood that feeds the muscles of the neck, arm, and hand.


In the gospel today, Jesus tells us that God invites us all to the kingdom. It doesn't matter when you decide to come, but when you enter the kingdom, you will feel God's reward through the labor you choose to do. Your hands become the hands of God. When you use them for good, God's intention becomes magnified and amplified.

The first reading and psalm tell us God is near! All we have to do is seek the Lord! Look to the left. Look to the right. Get your heart working first. What do you feel passionate about? Perhaps your neck exercises should include looking down in meditation and prayer in order to discover that passion. It's the passion of your heart that will feed the action of your body and your hands.

Look to the left. Look to the right. What do you see? Perhaps you see a homeless person on a park bench in need of something to eat, an anxious patient who has no family to provide consolation and support, a mom or dad who could use a little help with their kids, a student who is preoccupied with problems of homelessness or gangs, a sibling with cancer, a Black Lives Matter march, first responders in need of COVID-19 masks, or a forest that has been devastated by fire or industry. Use your arms and hands. Take action.

You are invited to the kingdom. Get your heart working first. Do your neck exercises. Look to the left. Look to the right. Every person you see will be the face of God.

ECRA Community Drive Supporting Care for Real on Saturday, October 3 Volunteers Needed

ECRA will host a collection drive for household and personal hygiene items on Saturday, October 3 from 12:00-3:00 pm at the Ismaili Jamatkhana, 6259 N. Broadway. St. Gertrude an active participant of the Edgewater Community Religious Association and back in early June, ECRA was able to collect about 3.5 tons of items for Care for Real.

We also welcome the donation of non-perishable food items, although the greater need at present is for household supplies (toilet paper, paper towels,

cleansers, disinfectants, face masks, gloves) and personal care products (soap, shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, feminine hygiene products, toothpaste, toothbrushes).

Items can be dropped off at the parking lot on the northeast corner of Broadway and Rosemont. (Entrance to the parking lot is on Broadway.) To maintain social distancing and limit personal contact, we request that when possible items for drop-off be placed in your vehicle's trunk. Volunteers equipped with face masks and gloves will remove items directly from your trunk. For those who walk to the drive, items may be dropped off on designated tables in the parking lot. In both circumstances, we ask that you follow social distancing protocols to limit personal contact.

With Care for Real serving the Rogers Park and Edgewater communities, we hope that the Edgewater and Rogers Park communities will come together to support this charity in its effort to provide these items to those most in need in our communities.

Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Retreat Offering

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

When the pandemic first began to affect our lives in the month of March, we told ourselves that it would probably be over by summer. But then, as summer drew near, more realistically, we began to hope that things would return to normal by the Fall. However, now Fall is upon us and it has become all too clear that the pandemic is likely to remain with us until next summer, taking a heavy toll on so many aspects of our everyday lives.

Naturally we can easily become discouraged by this new timeframe and begrudgingly accept the multiple constraints it imposes on our lives. But perhaps there is another way to approach this objectively difficult time: a way that allows us to transform this painful period of history into an opportunity for growth and grace. In that spirit, we would like to invite you to consider making the Spiritual Exercises of Ignatius Loyola.

The most traditional way of making the Spiritual Exercises is to stay at a retreat house for thirty days during which time the retreatant makes 5 or 6 "spiritual exercises" every day. Another way of making the very same

retreat, while remaining at one's own home, is to commit to making one "spiritual exercise" each day over a period of six months. Then, in addition to the personal daily prayer, once a week, there will be one hour-long, small group meeting (Zoom) briefly to share our experience of prayer.

Everyone who decides to make the Spiritual Exercises will receive the guidebook (which is available both in English and Spanish) that indicates the particular text assigned for prayer each day. While this may sound like a major undertaking, it promises to provide an effective way to create a sacred space in our lives during this difficult time. The fact is: none of us will be exactly the same after this pandemic. The question becomes: will we arrive at the end of this storm simply worn out and worn down or will we have come closer to becoming the persons and disciples God desires us to be?

Please consider this matter carefully. If you are unable or unwilling to carve out an hour for prayer each day, which is a serious commitment, maybe this is not for you. But if you feel that God might be drawing you into a deeper relationship at this time and inviting you to develop life-giving practices of prayer and reflection, please give this retreat some serious consideration.

We will be starting the retreat in the last week of September. Therefore, if you decide to make the retreat or simply wish to have further information, please contact us no later than September 15 so that we can have the materials available to you. Interested in Becoming Catholic?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. This free program begins in late September and meets until Pentecost.

Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.

This year, RCIA gatherings will be a mixture of Zoom meetings and inperson gatherings after Mass.


Sign Up to Vote by Mail

From October 14-November 3, secured drop boxes with date/time stamps available at every early voting site for vote by mail voters to submit their ballot return envelopes

Here's an option for people who feel unsafe about voting in person, but now fear the USPS will be unable to deliver a "mail-in" ballot in a timely fashion:

- Apply online now for a mail-in ballot at ChicagoElections.gov/votebymail.
- Starting October 14, there will be Secured Drop Boxes at all Early Voting locations.
- After you fill in your ballot, you should sign and seal the envelope.
- You can then bring it to the Early Voting site.
- If you applied online to Vote By Mail, you'll later get an email
 confirming your ballot has been received. At a later time, you will be
 informed that it has been accepted and notified if there are any
 problems.
- The ballots at Early Voting sites are transported (under chain of custody protocol) to the Board of Elections facility.
- List of locations and hours for Early Voting will be available in September at <u>ChicagoElections.gov/EarlyVoting</u>.

We have set up a "Text to Give" option through GiveCentral. Parishioners are welcome to text the word **Donate** to 1.773.741.9505 to make a donation via phone.

The Archdiocese has <u>an online giving option via the Archdiocesan website</u>. You simply click on the link and it takes you to the website. Once there, you determine if you want to contribute via a credit card or a checking account. You fill out the form, including selecting the parish to which the contribution is going, and the money will be electronically debited. The site offers options for amounts and the frequency of the contribution.
