We immediately got to work on translating the new curriculum called Leadership Essentials, the follow up study to Discipleship Essentials used in our discipleship class. We figured out the budget, and started to work on a classroom and dorm project to house the new class.

In 2018 the classroom was finished, the curriculum was finished, the teachers were identified, and the dorms were well underway. Featured in Haitian Harvest: Selecto Roasters

On our recent board trip to Haiti I was able to visit Selecto Roasters who is the roaster of our Haitian Blue Bean coffee. I met with Douglas Weiner who is a third generation roaster and truly has a passion not only for producing a delicious coffee, but for Haiti as well. The beans are hand-picked from the mountainous regions of Jachmel and a small portion from the region of Jereme. The higher the elevation that the coffee is grown, the better the coffee. Did you know that coffee beans will take on flavor notes of other plants growing near them? In Jereme, they grow a lot of cocoa in the areas where coffee is planted so the coffee actually has hints of chocolate. Unfortunately the last hurricane that came through this area destroyed much the delicious coffee in this area and it will take ten

years for it to regrow. The beans are purchased from area farmers at a fair price and brought to Selecto Roasters in Port Au Prince. They are then handsorted by the women that work there. The inferior beans are set aside to be used for lower grades of coffee. The beans are then placed in a hopper that was made in the USA in the 1800's! This machine shakes and removes any stones and dirt from the beans. They are then placed in a machine from Germany, also made in the 1800's, that sorts the beans into different sizes before being brought into the roaster room. The roaster was a state-of-theart piece of equipment and it smelled wonderful in there! After the roasting process was done, the beans were sorted once again for quality control and packaging. I was able to observe the flavor room where flavors of vanilla, chocolate, caramel and hazelnut were added to make flavored coffees. They have recently launched a coffee infused with MCT oil. For those on the Keto diet you will understand the health benefits of this product. We will be ordering some of this coffee to try. I

have toured American roasting facilities who have the "state of the art?" equipment that does everything with a push of a button, but I can tell you, I was more impressed with Selecto Roasters. There is something to be said about a business that still makes coffee the old-fashioned way and provides jobs for the Haitian people instead of using machines. Haiti only exports about 10% of their coffee. In the 1940's Haiti was the 3rd largest nation to be producing and exporting coffee before natural disasters and government corruption made this come to an end. Selecto Roasters has been instrumental in helping Haiti rebuild this trade. They have provided farmers with seedlings and proper training in the care of these seedlings. This will bring substantial income to the farmer in the years to come and they will become self-sustaining and able to provide for their families. Help us continue the growth of this program by buying our coffee.
