DAVE'S CONSERVATORY: A TRIUMPH HE DOESN'T DESERVE?

Questions Remain as Glass Structure Appears Without Proper Feline Consultation

Why Humans Continue to Measure Time Incorrectly

Yet none of these puzzles compare to humanity's enduring enthusiasm for deadlines.

Observe the modern office worker for any length of time and you will inevitably hear alarming references to specific times.

9:07.

11:00.

Close of Play.

The numbers are spoken with the seriousness normally reserved for weather warnings, ancient prophecies, or instructions concerning the opening of tins.

Humans organise entire days around these arbitrary moments. Meetings are attended. Emails are dispatched. Alarms are set. Great anxiety is generated over whether a task has been completed three minutes



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sooner or later than an invisible line on a clock face.

This newspaper has reviewed the evidence and can only conclude that the entire arrangement is fundamentally flawed.

The trouble begins with the assumption that time can be properly measured by clocks.

Clocks know nothing.
