THE PILLAR THAT ONLY REPORTS

Dear Gazette, Thank you for explaining the restructure in a way that made sense. My team was nervous. Your clarity helped.

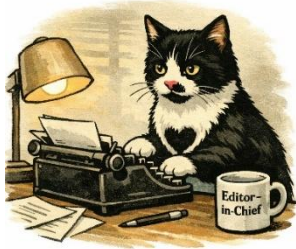
