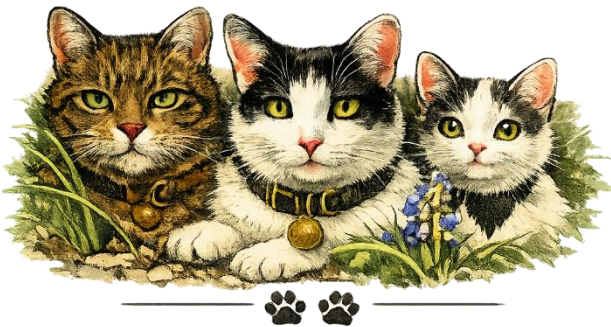

MANAGEMENT ACCOUNTS AND THE NEW WORLD ORDER

“The fox winked at me. I consider this a threat.”

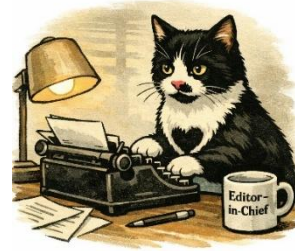
Editor: Logged.
