A <u>Romance Scam</u> is...

A criminal hiding behind a fake identity to lure victims into a romantic relationship with the intention of emotionally and psychologically influencing victims into giving the scammer what they want, such as personal information, means of moving money (money laundering), and

money.

HOW TO SPOT A FAKE ACCOUNT

- Does the URL match the account name?
- Is the account new?
- <u>Do they only have friends that are of a</u> <u>particular gender?</u>
- Are they not tagged in photos by other friends?



RED FLAGS

- They reach out first
- They want to move the conversation
- They ask for money/gift cards
- <u>They ask you to open a bank</u>
 <u>account/crypto account</u>
- Does the account have two first names?
- Is there a lack of content/information in the profile?
- Do the interactions/engagements in comments lack personable substance?
- Is the following ratio much higher than followers?

- <u>They use terms of endearment</u>
- <u>They work from a faraway location</u>

- They want to send you a package
- Money requests are typically an urgent matter. Everything to be done quickly

STAY SAFE ONLINE

- Educate yourself on platform safety
- Set your social media accounts to "private"
- Familiarize yourself with scammer tactics
- Do not talk to strangers
- Never give out personal information
- Do not send personal photos online



The IC3 is the cybercrime reporting site for the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). All information is reviewed and kept for current and future cases.


