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TIP OF THE MONTH: SCAMMERS DO USE VIDEO CHAT!

Video chats are common amongst friends and family. We like to visually see how the person is doing, watch their facial reactions, and have a warmer way to communicate rather than through text or email. But what if the video is just a creation, not a real person, no real expressions, emotions. This is what our technology has come to. Not only have scammers picked up on how to make fraudulent videos, but they also make "how to" videos; teaching one another their deceitful ways and publicly post the instructions to sites such as YouTube (see below).

Scammers are known to create fake videos, and off course, we are now hearing more about Artificial Intellegence (AI). AI's ability to make a computer-generated person act and look as real as a live human, for example same mannerisms, facial expressions, and physical movements,

all on demand, is astounding. What is there to prove to a victim of a scam that these videos are not real? That the person doesn't exist. No heartbeat. No real emotion. The psychological effects these encounters can devastating, if not destructive to a victim's life.

It is so important people are made aware that video chats by someone they have never met in person, also cannot be trusted. Years prior, this was a "tell all". Scammers would often say "I can't video chat because the connection isn't good" or "I am on a secret mission and not allowed to chat by video". Today however, we are fighting the good fight against a type of technology that can fool the trained eye. We simply must continue educating on the up-andcoming scammer tactics, and hope the word is shared amongst all online users.

On October 3, in commemoration of World Romance Scam Prevention Day, AARS was given the privilege to introduce the "Staying Safe from Romance Fraud" informational booklet to the United States including U.S. resources. This booklet was launched by the UK's Thames Valley Police, and developed with Criminologist and Forensic Linguist Professor Elsabeth Carter, Carter & Day Consultancy. The book explains many of the red flags and tactics of a romance scammer along with great examples of how a fraudster communicates with a victim.

LIBRARY OF IDENTITY THEFT VICTIMS



On the AARS website you can find a large library of identity theft victims whose photographs were stolen by scammers and used to conduct online romance scams. These images, often times, provide closure to a scam for a defrauded victim.

AARS strongly advises not to reach out to the real person in the photos. They too are victims and are having to emotionally comprehend the negative impact their pictures are having individuals.

Each picture is strategically marked to prevent scammers from re-using the images posted by the AARS site.



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
