Washington, D.C. Civil Rights Legend Rep. John Lewis "Good Trouble" Voter Awareness March and Motorcade

WASHINGTON, DC — Tuesday, October 27th, The Washington Bar Association, WBA Young Lawyers Division, Transformative Justice Coalition, National Bar Association, Greater Washington Area Chapter, Women's Lawyer Division - NBA, The Cochran Firm, Sigma Delta Tau Legal Fraternity, National Conference of Black Lawyers — D.C., NBA Young Lawyers Division, Bar Association of the District of Columbia, Filipino American Lawyers Association of Washington DC, Asian Pacific American Bar Association, Rainbow PUSH Coalition and District of Columbia community leaders, will sponsor the John Lewis "Good Trouble" Voter Awareness March. Leaders, institutions, organizations, and individual persons will lead a Motorcade and March from the Congress Heights Metro Station, 1290 Alabama Avenue, SE and end at the Early Voting site: Entertainment and Sports Arena located on the campus of St. Elizabeth's Hospital, 1100 Oak Street, SE., where a violinist will play a musical tribute to George Floyd, while March participants kneel for 8 minutes and 46 seconds. Then we will vote. This event is designed to restore

African American voter turnout to the historic highs of 2008 and 2012 levels. Voter education, voter awareness, and voter mobilization are foundational to an unprecedented level of voter participation in Washington, D.C.

During what might be considered one of the most challenging times in the history of constitutional democracy, civilians are being asked to come together to raise awareness and celebrate the importance of voting. Future generations depend on us to educate and empower. It is ever more important for ALL of us who bear the burden of missed opportunities, hopelessness, and despair to become partners in raising awareness.

We are calling all the people of Washington, D.C., and surrounding areas to be part of the solution through exercising the right to vote. As we face these unprecedented challenges to our democracy and the right to vote in the Washington, D.C., this March and motorcade will urge all to be a part of the solution and join this Voter Education and outreach effort.

In the 1970s, John Lewis led the Voter Education Project, traveling throughout the South to register Black voters and help elect Black officials to office for the first time since Reconstruction. "Hands that pick cotton," said the group's slogan, "now can pick our public officials." It is in his spirit and in honor of his legacy that we will gather on the first day of early voting.

This march will illustrate one way of coming together as a collective to utilize the power of the vote to promote equality, opportunity and justice. Join us as we work to educate our communities regarding voting rights.
