- Joanne called the meeting to order at 11:45 a.m.

Introductions and Agency Updates

- I'm Joanne Fiser, Executive Director of the Yuma County Anti-Drug Coalition and representing our Yuma County Mental Health Coalition, today, I am excited to share with you that last month's meeting minutes will go out to you via email, and we are going to go ahead and get started, since we have a packed room to share our updates. Please remember the updates are 60 seconds for each person. Please share your name and the agency that you're here representing and any updates that you have.
 - Ryan Butcher, Yuma County Public Health District - Some updates on some of the programs over at the Health District, our overdose data to action Grant was just renewed for this fiscal year, so there were some rumblings, maybe it wasn't going to happen, but down to the wire, it is back. So we have several strategies, working with a lot of partners in the room. We have working on one for information regarding jail re-entry for detainees, some in the labor and delivery department, and just some other ones with the anti-drug coalition. So a lot of cool stuff that will be happening there. We do have bags that will be, if you guys are familiar with the naloxone distribution program before, we have these medication deactivation pouches that were kind of ideal for our elderly that have opioids in the home that they want to get rid of, so they're not stockpiled in the cabinets things like that. So those were discontinued, but now they're coming back. So we don't have them yet, but that will be an item that you'll be able to order again soon, and that's all I have for right now.
 - Shelley Mellon, YCADC / YCMHC Chair – Welcome everyone. Yes, congratulations. I'm going to do an update after so we can get around to everyone and just again, reiterating the importance of just getting to hear out going in our minutes, and then to be able to connect. And that. Work at the end as well. So these updates are huge for our coalition. So thank you for sharing.
 - Pepper with RL Jones – nothing new to report.
 - Beverly Cade, NAACP – I'm the president of the local NAACP chapter, and this month, we're having a fashion show at the MLK building, and it's gonna take place on September the 26th and everybody's invited.
 - Dave King, Principal, Vista High School - Not a ton of updates since last month. Do you want to make you guys aware we do have a why VISTA community event coming up on October 1. It's a carnival themed events. The idea is to draw prospective families to VISTA also share what's going on at Vista. It'd be really awesome if we could get any representation from any of your organizations. If you want to

come and just be a community resource, if you want to put up a carnival game, that'd be cool too. Also great opportunity for you to meet and speak with some of our staff and students if you need any support at any of your events. I love to see our VISTA students involved, whether they're packing pouches and bags for Joanne or come into the scary and safe trunk or treat or any other community event that you guys might be hosting. I'd love to see our kids be a part of it. So please check in with me.

- Jessica Valadez, AZ Liquor License & Control Dept – Jessica Valadez. I am a prevention specialist with the Arizona Department liquor of licenses and control in our education and prevention unit. We are available for any Red Ribbon Week events, Joanne has already booked me for several events, so I will be here in the Yuma area. If anyone needs further assistance or support. I do have cards so you can reach out.
- Keith Francis. I work for Arizona Complete Health as a first responder liaison. As far as updates, I am available to help you guys understand how to access the crisis system. If you guys are wanting that training, I can come to you and to give that training to your staff. I believe I'm going to VISTA this Friday to give that training as well. Some of the students are wanting that so I think that's a cool opportunity for me to be in front of students. I don't get to do that often. And another update is the quarterly data that I share, we are now posting that on the Arizona complete website, and it's going to be automatic, so you guys can filter out for each county zip code, whatever it is that you guys are needing without having to go through me. Thank you guys.
- Dale Dumo, Travis Manion Foundation – Youth Mentorship. I'm a volunteer with the Travis Manion Foundation, TMF, the Yuma chapter leader, also this Saturday's 911 heroes run races, Director for you guys that are aware of it. I retired from the Marine Corps two years ago, but I still work with the Marines. I support MCSU, installation logistics. TMF's mission is to empower veterans and families of fallen heroes to develop character in future generations. We're also supported by plethora of inspired civilians, such as yourselves here if you want, if you're interested in why TMF's model works with better preventing veteran suicide and overall well-being. Please visit Travis manion.org We do holistic fitness, character development with youth mentorship, and then last thing this Saturday for any of your organizations that provide resources, mental health, resources for first responders, law enforcement, military veterans, if you're interested in setting up a booth at the pack at the 911 heroes run, please get with me after Thank you.
- Sarah Johnson, Navy Federal Credit Union - We were invited to be here today. So thank you for that, and we're just here to support the community. Make connections with you guys. If anybody wants any like financial education, we do those types of presentations. So we're just excited to be here. Thank you.
- Brianna Villa, UofA Yuma – I'm the regional engagement manager at the U of A Yuma. No huge updates, but I did want to shout out everybody in this room, because tomorrow is Suicide Prevention Day, and it's really incredible to know that we have this group of community leaders and community advocates for mental health also shout out to Mr. Duma, who just finished his master's, and throughout your program, you studied positive psychology and mental health. So thank you for all your research on that. Hello.

- Linda Elliot Nelson, Arizona Town Hall. There are a number of community town halls happening around the state that focus on workforce development. I also want to say that I find these meetings very inspiring. So thank you for everything that you do.
- Nydia Herrera, Arizona at Work - I'm the Executive Director and the two updates I wanted to share with everyone is that Arizona work is also partnering with the DS Arizona at work, there's two divisions within Arizona work. They will be having a long first law enforcement and first responder hiring event on September 18, from nine to 12 at the Martin Luther King Center, as well as we're having our annual Yuma community job and Education Fair along with the building a dream collaboration that will be October 8 at the AWC Shawnee center, from nine to 12. I have a flyer. Have a few flyers, if anybody's interested. We are actually looking for employers that are hiring, especially for our annual job fair. We want those employers to be present, so individuals that are looking for work can get that assistance of what types of jobs are out there. So thank you.
- Jesus Reyes, and I'm from the healing journey. As of recently, we started a program called peer mentor. So we're doing peer mentoring from the ages of six to 30. It's all just comes with the program for therapy. It's weird, trauma support. We are also doing a Christmas event for anyone, for any of our clients who wants to show up and just hang out with us, because we think that we are no less than the people that we support. Thank you.
- Beto with Charlie Heath, - Intensive outpatient program serving kiddos and adults. No major updates at this time, but really cool to be here with everybody, seeing everybody together and just thank you for everybody that's welcomed me into the group. This is my fifth meeting here, and everybody's been super welcoming and wanting to learn more about our program and setting up meetings and everything outside. So now thank you everybody for the help and wishing everybody a great month of September. Thank you.
- Ray Moreno, Horizon Health and Wellness. I'm the Outreach Coordinator. We're a healthcare integrator, outpatient some of the services that we provide mental health, mental health, substance abuse, psychiatry, pharmacy, all ages and stages, Monday through Friday, eight to seven. Thank you.
- Elvis Kost, YCEH - A local coalition 10 homeless coordinator, we offer services and assistance to people that are homeless. And the update is that Thursday, the 11th, at 9am we have our BI monthly meeting at one City Plaza. Hope to see you guys there.
- Ruben Ornelas, Crossroads Mission, we have no updates right now.
- Timothy Collins, Transitional Living Center and recovery.
- Bernice Ortiz, TLCR. I have two updates. One of the updates that I have is tomorrow is our bi weekly meeting that we have for our Halloween planning event that we have coming up on October 31 it will be taking place at Carver Park. We are very excited and looking forward to collaborating and inviting all agencies that want to participate and set up a booth. We will meet tomorrow at 11am we can. We will be doing it in person at the Turtle Bay cafe or via zoom. So if you guys want to link, please reach out to

me afterwards. And another update that I had is that this year, we're going to be kicking off something new. We have a lot of parents that come out of jail and lose absolutely everything, and it's really hard for them to build up everything again, especially when they have children. So we are going to begin a toy drive. If any agency here is willing to allow us to set a box at your guys's agency, we would highly appreciate it. It doesn't have to be anything big. We've already started collecting what we can just little toys, anything, just to give those parents that feel like they can't do anything, give them some type of sense of hope that they can provide something for their kiddos. So if you guys are willing to do that for us, that would be awesome. Please let me know afterwards. Thank you.

- Carol Smith, COY & Nurse Educator at Onvida for the pediatrics and NICU departments. No big updates for me, but my request is this, if your organizations or or entities have any volunteer opportunities, I like to encourage myself, the mayor and the city council of Yuma, to come in and see all the important work that you guys do, and really get a hands on, feel and get to know all of you. So please reach out to me if those opportunities arise. I think it's important for us to get out and meet you guys and see what you do. Thank you.
- Sergeant Phoebus, Yuma Police Department - I'm pleased to announce that we have a co responder mental health team now, and we're also partnering up with the Yuma Fire Department. We're going to get a paramedic to go in there with us and help the community.
- Ernesto Prieto, San Luis Police Department - This is my first meeting out here. Thank you for the invite, though, here to learn and hopefully make more contacts so we could help and assist our community in San Luis.
- David Reynolds, Vista High School social worker - I have no updates.
- Abel Garcia, Allo Fiber – no major updates at this point.
- Lee Parks, Community Medical Services - We're the medical assistant treatment services for opioid addictions. And no updates.
- Melissa Stores Gila Ridge High School School Social Worker - Definitely update is a lot of love and shout out to all the men in the room, with it being suicide awareness month, I think it's just important to mention that men have some of the highest suicide rates because we aren't talking to each other. So I do believe it does start with us. So a lot of love to y'all and definitely, definitely encouraging y'all and us to connect, especially when it comes to how we're doing and when it comes to the work that we do. Recently, had a really brave friend tell me that he didn't know what we would do if we hung out and didn't go to a bar or didn't go to watch a game. And so, you know, I really, really appreciated him sharing that with me, because I think it's important to mention that sometimes we don't know how to connect, and it's okay to just say that. And so a lot of love to all you men out there who do this amazing work.
- Matthew Papin, Victory Outreach in Yuma - I'm the director for the men's home right here at We have availability for the men's home and the women's home, so we're out here serving the community. If you guys run across anybody who needs help, you know we're a discipleship program, and it's changed many

people's lives, right? We have this year, we're going to have four graduates that are finishing completely the home, and they're going to go on to either go back to their family or start to work here and still be connected with us, so that I'm grateful for that. Thank you.

- Alfonso Martin, Campesino sin Fronteras and also with the South Yuma County entry localization over there in San Luis and Somerton Gaston. Update is we'll be hosting a kickball tournament on October 25 over there in Somerton, if anybody is interested in forming a team of participants or having a resource booth, or also being a food vendor in the event, as you guys are welcome to get the contact information come to me and ask for information to register, and that's all the updates from my side. Thank you.
- Jordin Aguliar, Onvida Health Behavioral Health Dept - For those of you who may not know, Onvida does have an inpatient mental health behavior or behavioral health inpatient unit. It's really intended for that stabilization, as well as getting whoever comes to us back on their feet, especially when it comes to a mental health crisis, as as the gentleman mentioned earlier, you know, especially when it comes to men, sometimes they don't have that support. And our unit is strictly voluntary, so it's really encouraging that family member, that friend, that coworker, to come to us and just have that someone who can talk to them and walk them through what it might look like of, you know, getting back on their feet, whether that's with us or our step down program, which is the intensive outpatient program. We do only serve adults 18 and older, but that does not exclude older adults. So we are working with the facilities here who do serve older adults, because we can help provide that same stabilization for older adults. They often get overlooked, especially when it comes to the nursing homes in the assisted facilities here in Yuma, but if anyone has any questions about either service, you're more than welcome to come talk to me. Thank you.
- Jessica Hubbard, Castle Dome Middle School Counselor
- Sarah Bales, Health Services for Yuma School District One, I'm the director. We've been very busy so far this year. We started school on August 4. We do have 18 elementary schools and a preschool program. So we do touch a lot of lives in the community, not just the children, but parents. So a few updates for us this year, in October, we do have 10 new staff members in my department this year, and thanks to the support of our local Yuma County Health District, we will all be fully certified in Mental Health First Aid, which is the first year ever that we'll all have that certification as a team. So that's really exciting. And then again, with the support of them, we also immunized over 250 community members this summer in preparation for school, and I am happy to report that year over year, immunization compliance is much improved so far this year over last year.
- Jen Hulbert, Yuma County Public Health District– As Ryan mentioned, we have our overdose data to action grant, and we just entered our new fiscal year. And with that being said, each time there is an agency update. From now on, I'll be sharing a resource too. So that's going to be my main focus today. It's going to be centered more on the private business sector. There is a link that Joanne will be sending out to the toolkit, and what it is, it's the opioid use disorder toolkit. What it has is it gives a very comprehensive approach for businesses to tackle this complex issue, where it has resources for the leadership, along with sample policies too, that they can look at so they can incorporate whether it is

going to be more of that substance use related, also involving Naloxone too. One of the number one questions I get when I provide the trainings is I am nervous to have this on my site. I don't know about liability issues. Well, this walks you through it and gives you those Step by Step Check off lists. So that's wonderful. Aside from that, it also increases on the benefits to package for HR as well, to provide those resources it has it will connect you directly to third party such as the CDC, ADHS, SAMHSA, for resources, well for educational. It has webinars for employees too. And it is state specific. It is all centered around Arizona, and you can customize it however you would like, whether it's your business side all the way compared to your company culture, so it can align with your values too. Of course, as I said, it's going to be Miss Joanne will be sending it out, and you can come see me after the meeting as well. Thank you.

- Maricela Hodges, National Community Health Partners, where we provide support for veterans within our community, for suicide prevention. Today I brought in a few flyers. They're placed right behind Reyes. If Reyes, you can raise your hand. They're behind him on the table. And what we're asking because this month is suicide prevention and awareness month, we're asking all agencies and our community to allow us to post flyers. This gives out information to the veteran if they're going through any type of mental health crisis, that there is hope and there is an agency that's willing to help them out. Just so you guys all know we also will be participating at the 911 heroes run this weekend, so I highly encourage everybody to go, stop by show support, if you can't booth at the event, and even come by our booth and say hi to us. If anybody has any questions or would like more information, please get with me afterwards. I didn't bring any business cards. But I have seen a few faces here, and some of you guys have attended some of our trainings too. So I also wanted to put out that we also offer those trainings for suicide prevention for free within our community. So if that's something your agency or your organization would like to co host with nchp, we would be happy to get with you and coordinate and get that situated and get going. Thank you.
- Victoria Gonzalez, YCSO and YCJJC – As far as we had, we did have a big influx last month of inmates being booked in a lot with drug charges and mental health charges. I remember talking a little bit about that last month, and thankfully, we're back down to regular numbers, still higher numbers, but still regular numbers. So all the efforts that you all took to get release planning is taken care of probation violations, taken care of we really appreciate the support and help with that as. Well, we are continuing to work on our mental health collaboration with YPD, with the Public Health Department, to try to see what we can do about inmates being booked in under mental health situations. So we're going to continue to work on that, and for the rest of the year, I think that's going to be our main goal. Next year, we'll be focusing more on like what Ryan had mentioned the jail re entry program, so I will be reaching out to you all again for some more assistance and support with that. So thank you.
- Robert Amola, Yuma County Sheriff's Office, detention Bureau, Lieutenant there pretty much what she said, we're working together with everything to try and make sure we do a positive impact on the community.
- Amy Zia, MCAS with our substance assessment counseling services. - We provide services for active duty service members, not just our Marines. A little misconception out there in our community, as well as our spouses, retirees, veterans are on case by case scenario, depending on availability. With our our

counseling services, there are staffing availability. We've just primarily been getting ready for, you know, river bin week and our trunk or treating that on base. Other than that, just looking forward to, hopefully within the next quarter or so, to get more active in our community, both myself and Virgil, my counterpart there.

- Brian Quig, Homeland Security Investigations - I'm the Assistant Special Agent in Charge for and we deal with federal law enforcement in the Yuma area.
- Lauren Spurlock, Yuma Union High School District - Specifically, I oversee the mastery of the arts program, and so I don't have any news. I'm really just here to learn and see how potentially there could be some work that our students do in this because I'm very interested in how our students could get involved in this type of work. So thank you for having me here.
- Oswaldo Rodriguez, YCJJC – No updates for now either, but I'm very much appreciated for the invitation and the opportunity.

- Ben Reno, USBP - I'm a critical incident response canine handler.
- Candace Brown, Marine Corps Air Station. NEMA –I'm the school liaison officer at.
