Change Of Time

Sunday will, however, be held after the short village laying of wreaths at the War Memorial at 11am.






Message From Iain Paton

Dear Friends at Muthill,

As you may know, the Presbytery appointed me a few months ago to be the Interim Moderator at Muthill with Trinity Gask & Kinkell Churches in succession to Rev. Mairi Perkins. Having been retired from full-time ministry



now for quite some time, I suspect that I would normally have suggested that someone else take on a role like this, but as I have been conducting some of the services since Klaus Buwert left, and feel that I have got to know many in the congregations over the last year or so, I was happy to accept the appointment. I do hope that I can do it justice. I do have another role as the Assistant Minister at Auchterarder Parish Church, but that is, officially, one day each week, so should leave plenty of time for Muthill.

Much of the role of the interim moderator is administrative and involves chairing the Kirk Session, representing the congregation at Presbytery, and ensuring that the services continue as planned. All quite straightforward until Alex Mitchell took unwell. I then realised that not only did Alex organise the services, but conducted the worship himself in about 60% of them. What a huge level of service both Alex and Elizabeth give to the congregation. Hopefully, Alex will receive his surgery soon, but there is likely to be quite a long recovery period before he can get back to his accustomed role in the Church. Meantime, it is good to see them both attending services as often as it is possible for them to manage.

One of the early tasks which came my way was the closure of Trinity Gask and KInkell Church at the beginning of September. A sincere 'thank you' to the good folk at Muthill who came to support Trinity Gask friends at



the closing service. Please do hold the members of the congregation there in your prayers at this time. Losing one's church is something that can affect people deeply as I know from personal experience. It is a great joy to see some of the former members there joining the congregation at Muthill and I do hope that you will be ready to give them a very warm welcome if they take that up. We are, after all, part of the one Christian family. The closure of that Church opened up the possibility of changing the time of the Muthill morning service, and it was decided at the recent meeting of the congregation that with effect fromSunday 22nd October the Sunday morning service will be at 10.00am. This is mentioned elsewhere in the magazine. As from Sunday 22nd October- so don't be late!

As to the future of the congregation at Muthill, that needs thought and prayer. There is a future, though, of that there is no doubt. It is up to us to discern what it is, knowing that it will affect other congregations besides our own one. I am a firm believer that God's guiding hand is firmly in situations like ours and that if we walk in His Spirit, the way will become clear. 'If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit' says Paul in his Letter to the Galatians. So, my friends, let us live the Christian life confidently, looking to a bright and exciting future, as part of a church congregation that works for the good of others and ultimately, for the glory of God!

Join In The Fellowship (Autumn 2023)

Muthill Parish Church has a variety of groups through which you can gain new friends, enjoy fellowship and increase your understanding of the Christian Faith. You do not have to wait to be invited. Just tell someone of your interest and you will made very welcome. A brief coffee after the Sunday worship service may be the right way to start this process, and certainly joining one of the following groups will definitely make you feel a stronger part of the church family.

House Groups:

There is a list of House Groups associated with Muthill and Crieff available on the noticeboard and on the leaflet stand in the church lobby. There are two village ones, namely The Bible Class is held on every Tuesday morning at 11am in the Bruce Hall of the Church. The second is House Group 2 which meets fortnightly at 7pm in the evening at Sandy Hutchison's house in the village. The Crieff house groups are on the list with names of whom to contact. There are also Inter-Church Gatherings, Christians Together, held twice a year in St Columba's Church, Crieff. Leaflets on these worship gatherings are distributed in church before the date and are certainly worth attending as they are very uplifting.

The Guild:

We have our own Guild in Muthill Parish Church which is part of the Church of Scotland's Guild which, with over 15,000 members, remains one of the largest voluntary organisations in the country. Its motto is "Whose we are and Whom we serve". The Guild welcomes both men and women who accept its aim: that the Church of Scotland Guild is a movement within the Church of Scotland which invites and encourages both women and men to commit their lives to Jesus Christ and enables them to express their faith in worship, prayer, and action. Home meetings are held in the Bruce Hall on a Wednesday afternoon starting at 2.30pm. There is a separate item in this edition of the magazine on the autumn programme for 2023.

The Singing Group

This enthusiastic group meets every Thursday evening at 7pm under the leadership of Elizabeth Boyd in the Church for just over one hour and enjoys learning new songs, religious and otherwise. There are around 10-15 in the



group so it can be a lot of fun! The Group has now prepared a repertoire for performances at Wardside House for the Elderly in the village and a date for some Christmas Carol Singing has already been set with them for 14th December.

Book Club:

A new book club is being established in the autumn 2023 and will meet monthly in one of the church rooms of a morning over coffee. Anyone interested in reading fiction, biographies etc. will be welcome to join. Books will be selected by members of the group. Leaflets on the Group and its starting date will be available on the Church noticeboard in October.

Soup and Sandwich Lunch:

This community outreach is held every Wednesday meeting at 12.30pm. It is a great way for getting to know people in the village and normally attracts around 30 folk. So come along and bring your friends. There is a suggested donation of £3. People attending the lunch can attend from 11am onwards when coffee/tea is available. It is held in the Bruce Hall.

Mens Group:

A new Men's Group, Muthill Men, is to be launched in November 2023. It will start as a coffee chat and catch-up group meeting in the Upper Room lounge of the Church on Wednesdays between 11.00-12.30 hrs so that attendees can then join the soup and sandwich lunch at 12.30 hrs should they wish. After a trial period the group members will be consulted on whether they wish it to morph into something more than chat and fellowship.

Scripture Union and Family Services

These are organised by the Youth Education Committee of the Church and details of their activities are included regularly in The Bridge. Scripture Union meetings are held on a Monday during school term time and family services are held monthly on Sundays before normal church worship. With the time of regular church worship services on a Sunday changing from 11.30am to 10.00 hours arrangements for the family services are under review.



A Poignant Celebration - Closure Of/ Trinity Gask Church

The closing service at Trinity Gask Church on 3rd September, 2023 was an important occasion, whilst being one tinged both with sadness for many present as well as joyfulness for the great service that had been given on that site since 1576.



The worship was conducted by Rev. Iain Paton, our Interim Moderator, with Rev. John Ferguson, Presbytery Clerk from Perth Presbytery providing a message on behalf of Presbytery. There was also a message from Rev. Alex Mitchell a regular preacher of late there, which was read by Helen-May Bayne, Session Clerk of Muthill Parish Church. in his absence due to ill

health. The readings were done by Jean Dawson and Alan Miller from Trinity Gask Church, both Elders of that Kirk.

The day was blessed with wonderful weather. The sanctuary was beautifully adorned with flowers. There was touches of tradition with a piper playing in the graveyard and the use of the old offering ladles and most importantly, the kirk pews were packed with a congregation of remaining members of Trinity Gask and friends drawn by past association and from members of Muthill Parish church their linked church family.

In a sensitive and uplifting way, lain led the worship warmly noting the great service that generations from the church had given over the years and saying that it was right we acknowledge this and celebrate it. Using the text "New wine is for fresh wineskins" (St. Mark 2, verse 22) with



Jesus' message on the importance of new wineskins, he reminded the assembled congregation that new times demanded new ways and not to be overpowered by the loss of this church building. The work of the church was in people and not buildings and it should go on in a triumphant manner through the continuing dedicated work of the remaining congregation



working in the new churches that they selected. This overall message was beautifully echoed in the lyrics of the hymns chosen for the service and in the accompanying prayers and messages. Despite the solemnity of the occasion, the singing was lustily given and it must be recorded that it was an uplifting event with a right focus on the future endeavours of the Church. As if underlining this at the conclusion of the formal

worship the congregation was provided with refreshment and wonderful home-baking served by the ladies of the church and there was lots of warm catching up.



A special mention must be made of Jean Dawson, Session Clerk of Trinity Gask, who rightly received a bouquet of flowers for her great service prior to the commencement of the service. It was preceded by warm words of appreciation from Jean Ann Scott Miller. Our thoughts too lie with the other Elders and members of Trinity Gask who will be going through a period of difficult emotions as they seek a new spiritual home. We thank God for the service of Trinity Gask and wish them joyful and meaningful continued service in His name.



Church Finances 2023



All of us are aware of how our household finances have changed in recent years and not for the better. 

The Guild



New Outreaches

A survey conducted as part of the village consultation on proposals for a new village Community Centre and Muthill Community Action Plan 2024-2028 contained an interesting response from new residents in our



village. Whilst they were generally positive about the village, they can find it difficult to integrate.

It is part of Muthill Parish Church's mission statement that it aims to be at the heart and soul of the village. The regular Wednesday's soup and sandwich lunches during the autumn, winter and spring seasons are an

important and successful initiative to engage and serve our village but perhaps this can go much wider. Consideration of appointing some form family/youth worker in the absence of an incumbent minister is one avenue of thought that the Kirk Session is pursuing as we need to solve the problem of a shortage of younger families in the congregation and the verve they generally bring with them. For those seeking more fellowship and faith learning opportunities our Guild and the House Groups already provide a ready welcome for those who feel part of the church family. Beyond this, however, there may be people of peace who may want to enquire further and, therefore, creating comfortable opportunities for such people to do so remains important.

Two initiatives in this area that we are currently exploring are the idea of a Book Club and a Men's Club or Gathering. Neither of these ideas are new. Muthill used to have an active book club and men's gatherings in different forms have been tried. Auchterarder and Comrie have active Men's Sheds. We are seeing the Book Club as a monthly get-together and Men's group as a weekly gathering initially focusing on fellowship and chat but possibly morphing into something bigger and bolder if enthusiasm can be engendered. Both outreaches will involve canvassing of potential audiences, then experimentation and they will certainly require enthusiasm and active support from within the church family. Whether they succeed, time will tell but at the very least they will present feedback



on which we can more easily develop our mission and outreaches into the community.

The Kirk Session have given their approval and work is already proceeding with a view to launching both during this autumn 2023. If you want to help in the organisation or simply come along then please let it be known. Your village contacts of people who might be interested in participating could be very important. Further details publicising the plans are contained in separate adverts in this magazine.



The new Men's Group at Muthill Parish Church, Muthill Men, will start meeting in the Upper Room of the Church building every week from Wednesday 15th November, 2023 at 11am.

The Group will initially meet simply for fellowship over coffee/ tea and then those who wish can join the Soup and Sandwich lunch downstairs in the Bruce Hall at 12.30pm.

Once the group has settled into regular meetings it will consider whether it will want to do other activities such as moving towards a Men's Shed concept. In the meantime, why not come along for a chat and get to know fellow Muthill village men.

God And The Arts

Michael Burgess continues his look at great works of art. You can see more images described by googling 'wall paintings of Pompeii'. The one below is taken from the Naples National Archaeological Museum.

'He gave us eyes to see them': Wall Painting of Pompeii



Each edition we have explored how art celebrates the wonder of our world – the seasons, the elements, animals and fish, flowers and fruit. They manifest the glory of God the creator. Irenaeus, the 2nd century theologian, went further and wrote that 'the glory of God is a living person.' He was echoing Psalm 8: 'What are human beings that you are mindful of them...you have crowned them and put all things under their feet.' Yes, the universe teaches of God

the creator, but in becoming one of us, the Son of God has put human beings above all Creation.

The nobility of that vision is captured in this 1st century wall painting from Pompeii showing Neo and his wife. They lived at a time when St Paul was preaching and the gospels were being written. We don't know if those events made an impact on their lives. But we do know that St Paul was executed around AD67, and just twelve years later this couple were victims of the eruption of Mount Vesuvius.

Their almond-shaped eyes are like windows into their souls. We sense the beauty, but also the fragility. They tell us that life is a gift to be cherished precisely because it is so easily taken from us. Neo's intense eyes look at us, while his wife looks beyond into the distance. She has the eyes of hopes and dreams that were cruelly shattered by the volcano.

Living men and women, like this couple, are tokens of the wonder of creation, but they also tell us of the transience of that very gift of life. 'Where can we place our hope?' we ask ourselves. The feasts of All Saints and All Souls tell us that the end of life here is a door opening into a greater glory and a brighter light. There is wonder and beauty in life here, and with the eyes of faith we can look beyond to glimpse the wonder of eternity.








Understanding Romans

In the last edition of the magazine, I highlighted the availability of a new course on Paul's Letter to the Romans, and now I am able to report on the accompanying book which goes with the course and which I decided to purchase after viewing some of the videos that go with the course. I have got to say that this has helped me considerably as I have to admit that



I have always found some passages of in Paul's Letter difficult. Even with Bible commentaries I have often found myself confused and unable to get a clear picture of what Paul is meaning and how I should relate it to my own life.

With this new book by Dr Andrew Ollerton, I can at last say I am so much clearer and I must commend him for his way of breaking down the Letter into manageable steps to understand. We are always recommended to read the Bible in its original context and then ask the question "what does it mean to me in today's world?". Ollerton's analysis is excellent, especially for the simpler enquirer.

I particularly like his non-academic approach and his use of frequent illustrations from life today. With this I more readily discovered that many passages that I had found difficult in the past were much easier to comprehend and relate to my own life.

Well known commentators always say that Romans is probably the best exposition of the Christian Faith as Paul had profound experience from his own conversion and was clearly an amazing guy with great insight. He is also probably the strongest Christian missionary of all time. There are also so many similarities in the Roman culture of Paul's day with today's western culture and how, without strength of faith, we can so easily succumb to



becoming what Ollerton describes as "cultural tourists" rather evangelists like Paul seeking for change. This, let's face it, is surely one reason why the church is declining today. Ollerton's analysis brings this clearly to the fore and I love the questions he leaves you with at the end of each section which really test how much you have taken in and understood.

If you get the chance to obtain the book, which is available from the Bible Society, I hope that you find the same as I have. It is so good to find a modern Christian writer of his standing who uses commentary from his own life and faith to provide a way through Paul's Letter in such an easily understandable and convincing way.

I should further add in conclusion that having read Romans as House Group 2, resorting to read it alongside The Message translation, we are about to use the Bible Society course as a further means of properly understanding this important Letter. If you think you might like to join us then please speak to me or Elainey Wallace. Even if we have started the study with its video sessions by the time you read this, we will be able to provide you with copies to catch up. We meet fortnightly on a Tuesday evenings and have a lot of fun and fellowship as well as hopefully deepening our understanding of our faith.

God And The Sciences

This series is written by Dr Ruth M Bancewicz, who is Church Engagement Director at The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion in Cambridge. Ruth writes on the positive relationship between Science and Christian faith.

God of the mountains, God of the valleys



Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand. Who marked off its dimensions? Surely you know! Who stretched a measuring line across it? On what were its footings set, or who laid its cornerstone ... The earth takes shape like clay under a seal; its features stand out like those of a garment... Have you journeyed to the springs of the sea or walked in the recesses of the deep? (Job 38:4–7, 14, 16)

These verses from the biblical book of Job focus on the Earth, from the top of the highest mountains to the deepest valleys of the sea floor. Job used to have a very comfortable life, but lost everything: health, children, and much of his property. He can see no obvious reason for this terrible turn of events, so he demands an answer from God, asking "What have I done to You...? Why have You made me your target?"

There is no direct reply to Job's question, but instead a long conversation with his friends who assume (wrongly) that he must be being punished for doing something very bad. When God finally speaks, He draws Job's attention to his surroundings. The sun, moon and stars, the immensity of land and sea, the creatures that inhabit them, and the processes that produce weather are a wonderful display of God's creative power. God is the origin and sustainer of all these things, and they are far beyond anything humankind could produce, fully understand or imagine — even today.

The things we do know about the processes described in Job can help us appreciate how marvellous they are. Mountains are produced by the movement of the Earth's rocky crust over great periods of time. Erosion by weathering or glaciers then grinds down those rocks to produce the mineral component of soil.




Considering the wider perspective of creation can help restore our sense of who we are, who God is, and where we fit into His purposes. God speaks to Job in the midst of his suffering, lifting his eyes to the power and creativity of his Maker. Only after this theology lesson are Job's practical needs addressed. What will life be like for us over the coming months? A constant check on our own thinking – reminding ourselves of the bigger picture of God's plans and purposes – might be just what we need to help us keep going.

A further public consultation on the proposed new Community Hub has been



Kirk And Community News

St. James Episcopal Church

Stonework renovation is taking place across the road at our neighbouring church of St James from 10th September for a period of six weeks. This is



to ensure the continued safety of pedestrians and to maintain the building's structure. Kirk Session

The Kirk Session met for its regular meeting on 12th September and the following can be reported:

- With the increase of energy costs the cost of church heating and general electricity usage is likely to rise from around £3000 pa to over £8500 pa. To try and reduce this somewhat, the Kirk Session has approved the installation of loft insulation. This work has now been carried out at a cost of £11,850
- The Kirk Session has accepted that we need to work harder on attracting families and youth into the congregation. A subcommittee has, therefore, been set up to further consider ideas for this important mission and will be reporting to the next Kirk Session meeting
- Three new elders are to be appointed and will be ordained on Sunday 7th January, 2023.
- The Church will be working on two new outreaches to supplement the work of the soup and sandwich lunches, namely a Book Club and Men's Group
- Further combined work with St. James Episcopal Church is being explored

In future additions of The Bridge we intend to report developments from that body which are of relevance to Muthill and the Strathearn area. Of interest from this meeting is that Presbytery received and


approved proposals for the establishment of a new Mission Fund, details of which will be sent out soon to all congregations. Awards from the fund are intended to be used for activities with a revenue focus, such as events, equipment, staffing and volunteering costs, training and development. Disbursements will start in 2024.

There was also presentation on "The Pioneering Programme" which is a new programme tried out within the Church of England and designed to reach out to the unchurched. There is now a Pioneering Team within Perth Presbytery and it is hoped that they will be able to help in following up with individual congregations as this programme is further explored.



The Wisdom Pattern – order, disorder, reorder By Richard Rohr, SPCK, £12.99

A universal pattern can be found in all societies and in fact in all of Creation. We see it in the seasons of the year, the stories of Scripture, and even in our own lives.

In *The Wisdom Pattern*, Father Richard Rohr illuminates the way understanding and embracing this pattern can give us hope in difficult times and the courage to push through messiness – and even great chaos – to find a new way of 'being' in the world.

Father Rohr offers reflections in *The Wisdom Pattern* that bring together a deep spirituality with Jungian psychology. They reveal a vision of Christianity that speaks to the heart of 21st century society.




Stick with Love - Rejoicing in Every Tongue, Every Tribe, Every Nation

The Archbishop of York's Advent Book 2023 By Arun Arora, SPCK, £10.99

Martin Luther King famously declared that 'I have decided to stick with love... Hate is too great a burden to bear'. In these luminous daily readings, Arun Arora helps us consider the biblical picture of the Church as the people of God, drawn from every tribe, every tongue, and every nation. Themes of racial justice, hospitality and welcome are explored alongside the stories of saints from across the globe. Beginning with reflections from Isaiah and Revelation, the meditations lead

us on to consider the missionaries, martyrs and mystics who light our Advent way.



Seeing the Light – poems By Kenneth Steven, Canterbury Press Norwich, £10.99

This new poetry collection from Scottish poet Kenneth Steven captures small moments of revelation or epiphanies, which come unexpectedly as gifts amid the ordinary. An uncleared breakfast table, the sight of someone working outdoors, an old photograph, and the features and sounds of the Scottish landscapes that so inspire his work, all become, in the poet's words, portals to a greater reality: "the small moments that make up the whole story".

This is the sudden 'going through the door' into the bigger



world. Many of them are written in the sonnet form, whose brevity and economy of expression mirror the essence of this book, and whose very form turns from the ordinary to the extraordinary in a moment.



One - Being United to Jesus Changes Everything By Clive Bowsher, 10Publishing, £8.49

The 'you will' sayings of Jesus show how the living God works in believers' lives, with implications for beauty, worship, obedience, nearness and intimacy, purpose, heaven, freedom, prayer, and love.

Knowing God isn't a hard problem for us to solve; it's a dazzling and thrilling reality for us to dive into.

You can know and experience in-one-another love with the Son, a love so close that it exceeds all expectations. He reaches out, befriends, comes close, partners, makes alive,

The Manual - getting masculinity right By Al Steward, 10Publishing, £11.04

Understanding what it means to be male has never been more confusing. As more male behaviour is called out for being patriarchal or toxic, how does a man navigate these waters? This book explores many of the issues that men struggle with: what it means to be a healthy son, workmate, friend, single man, husband and father. It works through much of the current debate on masculinity and finds helpful advice from

But most importantly, it works through what the Bible has to say about men, and how being a follower of Jesus is central to living a life the loves and serves others.




Enjoying God - experience the power and love of God in everyday life
