Editorial

The Scotsman newspaper recently published an article about the Church of Scotland's empty churches causing a troublesome legacy and stating that around a third of its churches would be closing "as congregations dwindle to nothingness". The article, written by a non-churchgoer, was not a pleasant read. Equally so were the reactions on social media with many reflecting that we are in a post Christian era and we have to accept that



churches are unnecessary. Reading such comments hits home hard when you are a believer and a member of the Church of Scotland but they undoubtedly reflect a widespread view in society towards religions and places of worship. There were, of course, some positive defences of the Church amongst the reactions with one or two commentators citing the fact there was growth in some churches with a more evangelical agenda. It is

sad that our national church is portrayed often as demoralised and seen as over-traditional. Certainly, for many of us within the Church, resources do seem over-extended because of its national status, its various tiers of government and a need perhaps for more inspiring leadership.

However, while adverse comments are always uncomfortable to read, what needs to be remembered is that it is the people of the church, the church family, that ultimately counts and not the buildings. Let's not forget that in Jesus' time there were only house churches like we have house groups today. With many church buildings, inherited from the past century or earlier by today's modern congregations, probably the right way forward is to make them more flexible and more integrated with their communities. This makes sense financially wherever it is possible but my feeling is that this will only work for the growth of the church if the message of Christianity is at the same time promoted outwards in more engaging ways. That is where our minds and talents must be focused!


Message From Our Interim Moderator

Dear friends,

Leader: The Lord is risen.

Response: The Lord is risen indeed. Halleluiah!

The declaration and response above constitute the traditional call to worship of the Christian Church on Easter Day, which has been used over many centuries. We used it here at Muthill on Easter Sunday when we also decorated an empty Cross with flowers. The Cross is empty, to signify that Jesus is not there; He is risen. The flowers suggest a message of new life after His death on the Cross and hope for the future, These symbolic actions have been around since about the 6th century and it is good to keep the traditions alive. We are now past, Easter, of course, and the theme of the services over the next few weeks will be on resurrection and new life. Within the cycle of the Christian Year, there are ups and downs, times of trial and sorrow, and also times of uplift and joy. We are in one of the latter



There were a number of Sundays before Easter when there was an appeal during the intimations for friends who attend church at Muthill to make sure that they have their name on our church membership list. On Friday 8th March, Lou Fellingham held a 2-hour concert in the church known as P's and G's, Edinburgh. This was a great experience and a chance to hear the latest music that she and her husband have written together for their new album called 'Never Stop Loving'.

The following day 3 of us from Muthill Parish Church attended a one-day conference for women in the same amazing venue. This event was hosted by the Scottish Bible Society.

P's and G's (St Paul's and St George's Church) is an old church which has been modernised in a sympathetic way to conserve the older more beautiful features, whilst allowing for modern seating and options for holding events such as this. The day was sold out and attended by



hundreds of women of all ages.

The day started with praise in the form of prayer and singing a good mixture of Lou's songs, modern Christian songs and old favourite hymns. It was great to find that we could pick up and learn the new songs quickly. There is always something awesome about hearing voices lifted to the Lord in unison, and the singing was remarkable.

This time was followed by a thoughtful and inspirational address by Lou which she based on the theme of Endurance, linked to Scriptural readings from Hebrews 12 and Philippians 3. Cath Madavan was next, an inspirational speaker who has written several books such as

speaker who has written several books such as 'Digging for Diamonds', 'Why less means more', 'Irrepressible' and 'Living on purpose', who is also a pastor's wife. She shared her testimony with

on purpose', who is also a pastor's wife. She shared her testimony with warmth and wit, making us laugh and draw breath in equal measure. There was fellowship around coffee and lunch where women bumped into

old friends throughout the day, and there were opportunities to explore the stalls around Compassion UK, the Scottish Bible Society and their 'Bibles for Bairns' campaign which we hope and pray to write about at a

later date in 'The Bridge'.



In the afternoon we started with a one hour singing session lead by one of the Kingdom Choir gospel singers called Ayanna Grey Mitchell. She is a gifted singer and teacher, who managed to teach the hundreds of women there 2 new songs in 3-part harmonies-no words provided! It was an incredible feat which ended in beautiful praise. A question-and-answer session happened next. which was engaging entertaining, delving into testimony, faith journeys and motivational lived

experiences. One example was Ayanna sharing her performance in the Kingdom Choir, from its lowly origins of meeting in a home to sing for themselves whilst supporting each other through the usual highs and lows of life, to performing for Megan and Harry's wedding in Windsor.

The conference ended with a one-hour session of praise...lots of singing, almost raising the roof at times, and prayer for each other and our different churches. It was a precious opportunity to step back from daily life and focus on God for a whole day.

You can find out more about Lou's music, website and Facebook Page. She and her husband host a half session called *Worship Wednesdays* from 8.30 to 9am every Wednesday on Facebook and Youtube -these are live praise sessions which can be watched back later on too.

The experience was hugely inspirational, motivational and potentially life-changing. We all hope and pray that when the next event is available that more of us from the church are able to attend and we will do our best to advertise the event well ahead of time.


Let's see if we can beat last year's total and help to really make a difference for those less fortunate than we are.



The Knock-On Effects of Kindness



How many times have you had a conversation about buses recently, and, in particular, about the fact that often no buses come for ages, and then two turn up at once? My sociology lecturer explained this to us once. Apparently it's less to do with bad timetabling, or even laziness on the part of the drivers. The main cause of this mysterious phenomenon, which is very much part of our daily lives, is kindness.

His explanation went something

like this -

- When the first driver see's someone running for their bus, they have a choice to drive on without them or to stop and wait for them to get on board
- If they choose to stop and wait for them, this will add an extra minute to the bus's journey time
- This will mean that, it will arrive at the next stop a minute later, and so another minute's worth passengers will have arrived and be waiting for it
- Processing these additional passengers will also add to the journey time, and, as a result, the number of passengers waiting at subsequent stops will also increase
- Their bus will, therefore, get more and more behind in its schedule
- In the meantime, the driver of the following bus will have less and less passengers to pick up because they now are being picked up more and more by the first bus driver
- The second bus will, therefore, inevitably catch up with the first Of course, if the first driver hadn't chosen to wait a minute for the person running for the bus, none of this would have happened in the first place. The fact that their bus is now late is due to their act of kindness. Kindness is not a bad thing. I often feel that civilization survives, not because of its

rules and regulations, but because of individual acts of kindness.



along Kindness, with love, joy, peace, patience, gentleness and self-control, is one of the 'fruits of the Spirit' (Galatians 5.22). Kindness is also one of the virtues we are encouraged to clothe ourselves with, along with compassion, humility, gentleness, and patience (Colossians 3.12).

Kindness doesn't cost us anything, but it can have a big impact on someone's life, especially if they are having a hard time.

So, let's be kind to our bus

drivers, and especially the ones who's buses are a bit late. Who knows, maybe it will help to make their day.

Muthill Community Transport Group



The future of rural transport is an ever-changing story. For those without the independence of a car for their transport needs, living in a rural community generally means relying on the bus services for all journeys to local amenities. These days our bus services are infrequent, unreliable, and for paying passengers, relatively expensive. There is also a disconnect between services resulting in longer journeys being difficult to plan and accomplish.

Communities across Scotland are beginning to address these problems by providing a local service which fills



in the gaps left by infrequent or withdrawn local services. Kirkmichael and Glenfarg are two notable examples in Perthshire. When the 55 service from Kinross was withdrawn, the Glenfarg community took the bold step to replace it. With a bus borrowed from Perth & Kinross, they started with a team of 15 volunteer drivers. Today, they operate five vehicles – three buses and two 8/9 seaters. Glenfarg Community Transport now employ three paid drivers supported

by a large number of volunteers carrying more than 750 passengers each week. The Kirkmichael operation is much smaller, operating a single vehicle to take community members to village events and to Blairgowrie.

Muthill Community Transport Group has been formed to bring a similar service to our community, starting with a single 8/9 seater vehicle which Perth & Kinross Council hopes to be able to supply to us in the near future. The Group will operate as a registered Scottish Charity (SCIO) organised and operated by volunteers.

There are currently five Trustees who will oversee the management of the Group, and approximately 12 volunteers offering their services as drivers, assistants and organisers. In addition to their application for charity status, the Group has applied for membership of the Community Transport Association which actively promotes and supports many hundreds of similar organisations across the UK.

The Group will provide a transport service specifically to the community of Muthill and the surrounding area. It will not compete with any of the other organisations providing scheduled bus services or taxi services in the area, but will provide a flexible alternative of particular benefit to the less able and less affluent members of our community.

Muthill Community Transport Group is a membership organisation. Anyone wishing to use our services will need to join the Group and pay an annual membership fee of £5. Membership will also be available to other Community Organisations which might wish to use our services for an annual fee of £20. At the discretion of the committee, membership fees may be waived in cases of hardship. A membership card will be issued to each member. No charge will be made for our services, but a small donation towards the running costs of the service would be appreciated.

Members will require to book their seats for transport in advance and it is envisaged that this will be done by telephone to a dedicated number on which you will leave a message stating your name, destination, travel date and time, and any other information necessary. You will receive a return call from that number to confirm availability of transport and pick-up time. All pick-ups and drop-offs will be at or near your home so you must be ready at the agreed time.

The service will be operated to meet the needs of the community and is likely to include transport to/for:

- Medical and other official appointments. Where the appointment is at a hospital in Perth or Dundee, free seats on the vehicle will be available to other members who wish to visit these destinations.
- Direct to specific shopping locations, regularly to Crieff and occasionally to further off destinations.
- Village clubs, organisations, churches and other village events for

those unable to walk there.

 Excursions to events outside the village as requested/arranged by Group members or other organisations who are also members of the Group.

The list is not exhaustive and can be extended at the request of members



subject to the approval of the committee. All travel is subject to the availability of the vehicle and a registered volunteer driver. All drivers will be required to undergo basic training and have a clean driving license which will be checked with DVLA every six months.

Where a vulnerable person requires transport in the vehicle, it is recommended that they be accompanied by a carer or friend. The vehicle will be able to transport a

folding wheelchair.

It is anticipated that demand for the service will increase over time, and the Group will hope to expand their activities in line with changing needs.

The Rice Challenge

A further local collaboration will take place next month when Muthill Parish Church and Muthill Primary School will combine to take part in the 90kg Rice Challenge. Organised by *Just Trading Scotland* this challenge is a great community project for schools, churches and other local organisations to work together in tackling current issues including sustainability, free trade, social enterprise and citizenship. So far over 800 organisations have participated in such schemes and Muthill will join that number.

The challenge is to sell 90×1 kg bags of Kilombero rice! This is the amount of rice that would be needed to enable a Malawian famer to pay for a year's basic secondary school education for one child.

In our local scheme we will be establishing a stall for the sale of rice which will be available in the Bruce Hall after Sunday Worship services and at the Wednesday soup and sandwich lunches. Look out for further information on the AV screens at Sunday services.

Volunteers Needed for Church Ground Maintenance

It will soon be the growing season and last year we successfully maintained the church grounds through volunteers from the congregation undertaking some grass cutting and edge trimming. There was a roster which covered the season with those on it undertaking the grass cutting roughly once every 4-5 weeks. The Songs We Sing

I wonder if you have noted the inclusion of more Mission and Junior Praise songs in recent Sunday services in Muthill Parish Church. This, I am told, stems from an after-service meeting in early February of some of the congregation interested in the musical part our worship.



It is difficult to find the right balance of hymns ancient and modern as people love singing hymn songs with which they are familiar and, our congregation being mainly of the older generation, there is undoubtedly a wealth of love for traditional hymn songs. On the other hand, it is certainly true that, for some church attendees particularly the young and future of the church, many older hymns can come across as turgid and lacking in joyful allage celebration. Some too contain words or images which are difficult to

understand. Against this, of course, others will argue that some modern Christian songs are over demonstrative, often repetitive, and some people find that any 'happy-clappy' rhythmic style of singing is not their idea of reverent worship.

I guess I fall between these divisions of reaction. Whilst I can be moved by some traditional hymn songs and melodies often because they hold special memories and fondness for me, I can also be greatly uplifted by the vibrancy and engaging nature of many modern melodies and their lyrics expressed in today's language.

For me, singing in church is a not only the joyful experience of united congregational worship, but, more importantly, it is a very personal expression of faith through song. I am, therefore, never put off by worshippers celebrating by raising their hands in awe of God as their mood or the words urge them to do so. Indeed, I have an admiration for such acts of open expression of personal faith and often wish I had the inclination to do so more myself. However, I do get turned off if I am asked to sing lyrics I do not understand or which are archaic in form. I also feel that many of the

older hymns are best suited for the accompaniment and majesty of a pipe organ, whereas modern Christian songs are more suited to a music group, lead soloists and the flexibility of an electric organ.

CH4, which is still the mainstay of songs for Sunday worship, contains many



examples of language and imagery that are not immediately easy to relate to modern life and therefore they can negatively affect my personal response. Some people will say that is because I do not know my Bible sufficiently well and I would accept that, but to properly engage in worship, I need to understand and believe the words that I am being asked to sing out aloud with others. I guess that is why I am also generally more comfortable with the simpler forms of worship found in Presbyterian churches compared to worship in churches that use prescribed and very elevated liturgy. Worship from the heart too

involves emotion and that abounds with many new Christian songs. Equally I accept that repetition of choruses can intensify feeling and, through that, can encourage self-worship as well as rousing congregational singing. So, where does this leave me in relation to our changing approach to worship and singing in Muthill Parish Church? I guess I like the fact that we are experimenting and I hope that continues. Whether we use a singing

are experimenting and I hope that continues. Whether we use a singing group and electric organ as now, or move, as many churches are, to more individual lead singers accompanied by a range of musical instruments, I am all in favour of anyway that encourages all-age congregational singing. And today, we have such a wonderful range of worship songs, beyond CH4 and Mission Praise, which have gained great popularity from around the world. The more we can attune our approach to worship with popular singing styles which engage with the all-ages, the more I feel we are likely to make it easier for new comers to the worship experience. I also feel that Sunday service stalwarts would only be encouraged by a growing worshipping church family.

Congregational Outing


Keep the date of **Saturday 8th June** free if you want to be part of a summer














The Empty Tomb - A Story of Easter By Brian Sibley, SPCK, £6.99
