Property Update

Church

The new aluminium access ladder within the belfry is complete which means that access to the tower roof can now be gained safely although it must be said that the roof hatch requires a feat of dexterity best accomplished by those of more tender years.

Having provided safe access to the tower roof it was therefore possible to prevail upon Tullibardine Smithy to fix the reinforcing steel demanded by the structural engineer during the course of an inspection some years ago. This was required to ensure the stability of the south west pinnacle. I am pleased to be able to report that this work has now been satisfactorily completed.

Please be aware that this does not remove the need to try to avoid spending too much time close to church walls especially when it is windy.

As many will know, we are also currently having problems with the water system and the outflow from the church. The Kirk Session has approved the engagement of an independent contractor to help solve the best way forward. It is likely that we will need a new septic tank and new pipework. In the meantime arrangements are being made to have a portaloo available in the grounds to the back of the church. We apologise to all users of the Church and Bruce Hall for any inconvenience caused. Every effort is being made to arrange an appropriate and sound solution as quickly as possible.

Manse

The external paintwork and associated joinery repairs are underway. This is long overdue due to COVID restrictions and weather conditions.

Plaster repairs to the lounge ceiling have been completed and the Kirk Session has approved that tenders also be obtained for redecoration of the room.

Kirk Session Supports Linkage

The Kirk Session met in April and May to consider the Interim Plan prepared by the Planning and Development Committee of Perth Presbytery. This new Plan is required to address the decision taken at the Church's General Assembly to reduce ministerial allocation across the country in every Presbytery and to divest of church buildings where mission status has confirmed that this is necessary. Perth Presbytery's Interim Plan, after consultation with individual churches is completed, will become an agreed Presbytery Plan before the end of 2022 and submitted to General Assembly.

In the case of our link charge, Trinity Gask and Kinkell, it is already known that the Interim Plan has recommended closure and so the Kirk Session there has decided in advance of any closure to dissolve the congregation and leave the central Church of Scotland to decide on the future of the building. This decision has been forwarded to Presbytery and is currently being processed.

For Muthill Parish Church, the interim plan proposes that the church will remain an active place of Christian presence in Muthill and ministerial cover will be provided either through a proposed union or linkage with Ardoch and Blackford churches. The plan also states that Ardoch and Blackford should unite with one of these churches being closed. The resulting level of proposed ministerial cover will be 0.5 FTE between the three parishes. This compares with 0.7 FTE when Rev. Klaus Buwert was in post. For the other grouping in our network, namely Auchterarder and Aberuthven, it is proposed under the Plan, will have 1FTE.

Muthill Kirk Session has, therefore, been clarifying with Presbytery representatives and considering what is the right way forward for Muthill, and at its meeting on 3rd May, it finally decided that it would to confirm to Presbytery that its preferred option is to accept the proposal of a linkage with Ardoch-Blackford.

Presbytery had also suggested that a further option might be considered of a wider network involving Comrie, Crieff and mid Strathearn. On this, it is understood that the prevailing view of incumbent ministers across the area is that linking at parish level within the individual networks outlined is the preferred first step forward at this stage. Muthill Kirk Session has



also accepted this position. Once all consultations are complete and the Plan is finally approved, detailed discussions will be held with individual churches on implementation and timing. In the case of Muthill, with their being a current vacancy and, as we will have to await the outcome of the union proposal for Ardoch and Blackford proposal, the current interim arrangements will continue for the foreseeable future.

God On Mute

Some readers may remember that I recommended a book by Pete Greig on *How to Pray*, which I found helpful to my personal prayer life. I would now like to recommend another by the same author which covers the difficult issue of unanswered prayer.



The experience of God's silence to prayer particularly in the midst of suffering can be very testing to one's faith. This elephant in the room is rarely addressed, but in Pete Greig's book, God on Mute* there is an in-depth analysis, accompanied by a poignant personal account, which offers

us a way forward when our prayers go dark. As one commentator has said, "Don't lose your faith, don't abandon your prayers, read this book", and Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, goes even further to state it is a Christian classic.

I guess what I like about this book is that it reminds us that life was never intended to be easy and at times for most of us it can be hard. However, whilst suffering may lead to questioning the image of an all loving and all powerful God, we should not forget that Jesus too had unanswered prayers through the four days of his betrayal, death, burial and resurrection. The book goes into some detail on Jesus prayers and how they should be interpreted.

Greig reminds us that Jesus was a man of sorrows and we should not confuse hope and dreams with reality of life. Miracles by definition are rare and it is not for us to query why and when God interjects. Life is never intended as easy and the more we can place suffering in balance with other good things in our lives, the more we will see suffering in a Christian context. God still hates suffering but cannot always intervene if the world is to maintain its balance and we must remember that we still live in the period between Fall and Redemption.



Citing experiences from his own life and many others, the author reminds us that prayers to be answered have to be honest and trusting. There is little comfort in anger and no hope in doubt. We need to surrender to God's Will accepting that our faith will have different forms as we progress through

Honouring Trinity Gask and Kinkell



As many will have read in the last edition of The Bridge, the Kirk Session at Trinity Gask and Kinkell has decided to dissolve the congregation rather than face union and closure under the proposed Presbytery Plan. When this happens, this sadly will mark the end of our linkage and for Trinity Gask and Kinkell the end of a congregation. Whilst remaining members will always be warmly welcomed at Muthill Parish Church, we commiserate with what will be an emotional loss. It therefore, seemed appropriate to publish the following short history from church archives as a mark of respect.

The name Trinity Gask and Kinkell tells us it was a union of two congregations. Kinkell, was a parish on the other side of the Earn. The church building was built in 1782.

It replaced an older one dedicated to St Bean, the ruins of which can still be




seen across the road from it. St Bean lived in the area in the first half of the 10th century. Kinkell Church was closed in 1984 and is now a private house beside the road. In that year the united church was also linked with Muthill Parish Church.

The Church of St Bean and the

Church of the Holy Trinity were in existence about 1200 AD. In that year the Earl of Strathearn gave the Church of St Bean at Kinkell as an endowment to the Abbey of Inchaffray. A few years later he added to the endowment the Church of the Holy Trinity at Gask. After the Reformation both Parishes were in existence and each had a Minister, but in 1639 they were united under the Minister of Trinity Gask. For some years St Bean's Church continued to be used for worship - but ultimately it fell into ruins.

The Trinity Gask building goes back to 1770 but was likely built on the site



of an earlier church. Down the hill from the church is a well. now overgrown, which may have marked a holy site and the reason for building a church here. Still within living memory the water of that well was used for baptising infants. A feature of note in the Church is the Daniel Cottier stained glass window. Cottier was born in Glasgow and was buried in New York in 1891. Few of his works can be seen in UK, but he was venerated in America, Canada, Australia and is said to have influenced the

likes of Van Gogh, Louis Comfort Tiffany and William Morris.

There is an old rhyme about Kinkell:

"Was there e'er sic a parish, a parish: Was there e'er sic a parish as that o' Kinkell? They've hangit the minister, drowned the precentor, Dang Doon the steeple, and drucken the bell"

The rhyme, which gives rise to the reputation of "the terrible parish" refers to the Rev Richard Duncan, deposed in February 1682 and hanged in June that year "for murdering an infant begotten by him with his servant maid, it being found buried under his own hearth-stone." He protested his innocence to the end. A reprieve arrived in Crieff but it was 20 minutes too late.

The precentor led the worship in those days before organs. The services at Trinity Gask and Kinkell took place on alternate Sundays. On one occasion he was crossing the river Earn on the ferry (before the bridge was built) from Trinity Gask to the service at Kinkell, and he drowned.

When Kinkell Church was rebuilt in the 18th century it had no steeple, so the bell wasn't needed and ended up in Cockpen Church, outside Edinburgh where it is still rung every Sunday.

Not to be outdone by Kinkell, a former minister of Trinity Gask, Rev Dr John Kemp, left in 1779 to be minister at the Tolbooth in Edinburgh, where he became the minister of Clarinda the woman who stole Robert Burns' heart (at least for a month, until he broke off their relationship to marry Jean Armour shortly afterwards). John Kemp had apparently written to her in no uncertain terms that her affair with Burns must end, she being a married woman. Burns saw his letter, and attacked it as "puritanic scrawl" and him as "the half-inch soul of an unfeeling, cold-blooded, pitiful presbyterian bigot, (who) cannot forgive anything above his dungeon bosom and foggy head."

Christian Aid Report

Thanks again go to Alison Hockley our Christian Aid organiser and to everyone who contributed to this year's Christian Aid appeal. The Bridge is pleased to report that through donations for refreshments after church and the envelopes scheme, Muthill Parish Church raised £661 this year.



Christian Aid is the official relief and development agency of 41 Christian churches in the UK and Ireland, and works to support sustainable development, eradicate poverty, support civil society and provide disaster relief in South America, the Caribbean, Africa and Asia

Funds raised during Christian Aid Week will help the charity continue its work, for example buying water taps for a community garden or building storerooms to store and preserve food.

In rural Zimbabwe, seven out of ten women rely on farming to earn a living and provide for their families. But with no rain, women can't grow enough food for their children. In times of drought, many families can only afford to eat one bowl of porridge a day.

Jessica Mwedzi lives in Chadanyika village, Mutoko District in the northeast of the country. She explains, "One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening."

She adds: "My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. It pains me to send them to bed hungry".

Through local partners, Christian Aid helps the most at-risk communities in Mutoko and Mudzi districts prepare for and adapt to the changing climate, empowering vulnerable communities to grow drought-resistant crops, build storerooms to preserve food for the dry months and learn new skills for alternative employment.
