#### **Message From The Manse**

Dear friends,

This will be my last contribution to the Bridge before my retirement.

I think I may have written, in my first contribution, about the appropriateness of the name of our magazine, in a number of connections.

Bridges are important crossing points over rivers.

There are 7 between Crieff and where the Earn joins the Tay and flows into the sea. But between these bridges it would be very difficult and dangerous to cross the river, especially after rain. Without them, you might just be a few yards from the land on the other side of the river but have very little in common.



The picture in our logo is of the bridge at Kinkell. That bridge connects our congregations. The linkage has been in force since 1984. We are two very different parishes, on different sides of the Earn, but thanks to the bridge, the stone one, and the magazine which symbolises our togetherness, and

not forgetting other ways which have bridged the geographical distance, we have been very supportive of each other over these years. Our relationship is important to us.

The image of the Bridge also makes a powerful theological point. One of the evangelistic tracts which has been on the go for a long time depicts



human beings and God on two different sides of a deep chasm. He is pure and holy and all loving. We are sinful and fallen and cut off from our maker because of that. Just like we would be drowned trying to cross the Earn when it is in full spate, there is no way we can cross over to God

As many will know Life and Work is the official magazine of the Church of Scotland. It is published monthly and in a history covering 140 years it has very much become the voice of the Church.



#### **Church Finances**




The annual accounts were submitted and approved by the Kirk Session at their meeting on 1st February.

Sandy Birnie, the Finance Convener gave an encouraging report indicating that the church was currently in a sound position. The accounts will now be transformed into the required OSCR format and a short explanation on the overall accounts and the status of the church

finances will be given in the next edition of the magazine. There will also be a report to the congregation.

As for the retiring collections conducted over recent months, the collection on Remembrance Sunday for Poppy Scotland raised £270 whilst the collection from the Watchnight Christmas Eve Service for SANDS raised £214.

The Christmas disbursements from the Burtinshaw legacy to assist with fuel support and the distribution of food to some 115 recipients this year went smoothly under the direction of James Thomson and his team. Sad to say, Charles Bruce who organises the Crieff part of the gift distribution has decided to stepdown. A much appreciated thanks to all involved for this importance outreach from the Church.





#### **Thinking of Lent**

Lent this year will start on March 4<sup>th</sup> and will run until 14<sup>th</sup> April with Good Friday on 15<sup>th</sup> and Easter on 17<sup>th</sup> April. Like all seasons in our religious calendar, this has significance as a period for personal reflection for those who like to approach this season by reviewing their faith and their closeness to God. I would like to recommend an excellent book by Paula Gooder to assist you. It is entitled "Let Me Go There - The Spirit of Lent" and is easily obtainable through Amazon or any religious bookseller. It is also a great book to study in a group setting.

Paula Gooder is a leading biblical scholar and one of today's most popular writers on spirituality. This book on Lent is part of a series of engaging reflections which includes Advent and Easter. With all her writing, I find that it has helped me a lot in understanding the meaning of different religious seasons and how I should approach them. Indeed, as is stated in the book, learning the lessons of the seasons helps us to celebrate them better.



Lent is often characterised in common parlance as a period of resisting temptation by giving something up is in order to hone our skills in the resistance of temptation that we may well need when a greater and more powerful temptation crosses our path. So chocolate or drinks often are chosen as items to give up for the period of Lent. This may be a good way to learn to be content with

who we are and what we have, But the much deeper question for all Christians is whether the account of Jesus' own temptations set out in the Bible give us a model for this.


What I like about Paula Gooder's writing is that in all her books she does not thrust learning at you and does not provide answers. In the book on Lent, she takes you on a journey of exploration into the wilderness of Lent

and shows you that while the desert can be a place of fear and desolation you should try to experience it not as a season of restriction but one of open spaciousness in which to learn new lessons, grow in faith and one in which you should give God the chance to meet you in new ways. She does this by reflecting on some of the key events in the life of God's people that occurred in the wilderness as a way of preparing you to enter more fully into the experience of Jesus' forty days and nights at the very beginning of his ministry and to hear afresh again the call to his disciples that followed on. Through these stories we get a deeper understanding of God's nature and a picture of the character and cost of discipleship and importantly a pattern for living as followers of Jesus in today's world.

It is not a long book running to just over 120 pages and is available also as an E-book. Like all her reflections it is a helpful guide to what I have always found a difficult season to which to respond effectively.

Trees, however, are only part of the solution. Other changes have to be made to reduce global  $CO_2$  emissions and an effective response lies in the hands of world politicians. But we do need to plant more trees, quickly.



To help reach the UK government's 2050 target to become carbon net zero — that's removing as much carbon as we're producing — we need more trees. The reality is we need to increase the UK's woodland cover from the current 13% to at least 19%. Quite a task but not if cities, towns

and villages across the land take the challenge seriously. Funding for projects is even available through The National Lottery.



If we are privileged to have a private garden then the responsibility falls on us to consider enhancing appropriately what is already there. The Woodland Trust and the Royal Horticultural Society give good online advice and both recommend that this should be done

preferably in the dormant season between October/November and March/ April as this is less likely to cause damage to the root system. They also have excellent videos on how to prepare holes in different terrains and how they should be large enough to contain the roots and provide protection against frost and vermin.

Muthill Village, as a significant presence in the Strathearn valley and the Church likewise, within the village community, should be part of this important effort and who is against adding to the green beauty of our village as part of a national initiative.

#### Planting a Tree for the Platinum Jubilee

We are all being encouraged to green the planet and one of the main projects of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee year, 2022, is to encourage everyone to get involved either individually or through local group initiative.

Many of us are already trying to live a more carbon neutral life. Goals for this can include:

I day a week dairy free Lowering red meat intake Shopping local Cycling to work Planting a tree



Trees, as well as reducing carbon pollution in the atmosphere also provide habitats for wildlife and are, therefore, very important to greening the planet. If tree planting is undertaken on a larger scale they provide new forest and woodland

which can be enjoyed by future generations. They can also enhance our gardens and the local amenity.

To set these facts in the context of the climate emergency, trees are the ultimate carbon capture and storage machines. Like great carbon sinks, woods and forests absorb atmospheric carbon and lock it up for centuries. They do this through photosynthesis.

The entire woodland ecosystem plays a huge role in locking up carbon, including the living wood, roots, leaves, deadwood, surrounding soils and its associated vegetation.

#### **Kirk Session Implements Change**



Many members of the congregation will know the Kirk Session has been grappling for some time with a shortage of Elders and has been concerned as to how this might be impacting on pastoral care as well as other functions of running the church. There are several reasons behind this, one being that we are a small congregation with limited resources and, with society changing, the view of the congregation towards the District Elder and home visiting has also undergone change.

To assist in tackling this issue, a consultation was held with the wider congregation at the end of October 2021 and then, at their December meeting, the Kirk Session considered the matter at length reviewing the results of the Congregational consultation and guidance available from the central Church of Scotland.

Taking into account the shortage of Elder numbers, the size of the congregation and the fact that remaining Elders are having increasingly to multi task, the Kirk Session approved a radical plan which will adjust the expectations placed on existing Elders, streamline the communication systems used by the church and hopefully have a resulting beneficial impact on the delivery of pastoral care and other matters relating to the running of the church.



Central to this approach the Kirk Session has accepted that it must concentrate on core membership and attempt to strengthen it rather than deploying our limited resources on the total number of the congregation that appears on the Kirk Roll. This will involve approaching all members and adherents on the nature of association that they want with the church and it is hoped that by obtaining people's preferences, it will then be possible to clarify priorities for the Church and the Eldership. This in turn should enable communication and pastoral care to be streamlined. The Kirk Session also feels that the changes should be put in place before Klaus' retirement in the middle of March as the Church will be in interim arrangements for some time whilst the Presbytery Plan is finalised, approved and the vacancy at Muthill can then be considered.

This strategy, which has been unveiled, will involve a review of the Kirk Roll as a first step. In the meantime, Elders' districts will be discontinued whilst preserving arrangements for individual contact where this is valued and meaningful. It is also planned to use the role of Conveners to take more care of the day to day running of the church. Further, by reducing



Kirk Session meetings to a bi-monthly basis, it is hoped that this will increasingly enable the Kirk Session to concentrate on discipleship and mission. Communication with members and adherents will also be adjusted to take greater account of modern available technology whilst still ensuring that proper provision is made for the elderly and

housebound. One example of this which active members will know is that the Church now has a new Audio Visual system for church worship services and this will soon also be used to stream live services to the elderly and housebound.

The Kirk Session has also approved the introduction of House Groups and will shortly start one in Crieff and one in Muthill in the hope that this will expand. Host homes for such groups and their meetings have already been found and leaders will be appointed shortly. It is hoped by this introduction active members of the congregation will have the opportunity to increase their fellowship as well as being able to share and explore their faith in a more intimate setting.
