


## Thinking of the Spirit of Easter

In the last edition of the Bridge, I recommended a biblical scholar and writer I like very much because her books are short, not over theological and relatively easy to digest. I also like them because they give me greater clarity on the key pillars of my faith. The Lent book which I highlighted last time I value as I find Lent a difficult period to approach, and I have certainly found that it has made me reflect more deeply on issues of life and faith. The difficulty, however, is that if you are like me you can arrive at Easter Day at which point you stop thinking and reflecting and carry on as before. As the cover page of Paula Gooder's Easter book on "The Risen Existence" claims, all too often this results in our celebration of Easter, the high point of the church's year with the resurrection, being an anti-climax.

I want to recommend this further book of Paula's as it helpfully takes you on a journey from Easter to Ascension Day and Pentecost exploring the themes of Easter, in the four Gospels, Acts and the Epistles and encourages you to think more deeply and seriously about what the resurrection means for you and for the way in which you live your life today. In the epilogue to the book, Paula recounts a question her daughter asked, namely, "How does Jesus make us real?" "Does he draw us first and then colour us in?" I love this query for, as Paula states, after reading the book, you will for sure agree that this is a wonderful description of the resurrection life. First Jesus draws us, both in the sense of drawing us to him but also in the sense of recreating and refiguring us anew into a Christ-like existence; he then proceeds to colour us in. Our continued life is the way in which he







On that journey depicted in the book, Paula reflects on the differences that Mark, Mathew,

Luke and John place in their accounts of the death, resurrection, ascension of Jesus and the

coming of the Holy Spirit and points out that

whilst they are separate events they are closely interwoven and should not be separated too far from each other. And from the Epistles she concludes that it is not possible to say that the resurrection of Christ is a historical event which has little or no impact of our lives today. Christ's risen existence should transform us and our lives and the only response is to live differently. to live lives infused by resurrection values of reconciliation, freedom and hope. And finally, on the Ascension and Pentecost, she explores how the Ascension opens up a space which required the disciples to act and how the coming of the Holy Spirit gave them the ability to do so. She concludes that the Spirit continues to explode into our lives just as it did with the early disciples, and must transform us and help us to be the people that God wants us to be.

Another good read which doesn't overpower but which gives meaningful guidance as to where we should stand as Christians in regard to the Spirit of Easter!



## Facing the Future in Faith

Whatever the final Church structure we find ourselves in after the Presbytery consults and decides on its interim proposals, it is more than likely that we are moving towards wider groupings of churches and team ministry in one shape or another. In some ways this sounds daunting and unnerving as we have been accustomed for so many years to the concept of a parish and having our own minister. And we all know that change, in whatever form, is never an entirely comfortable experience and the older we get the more we find this difficult to accept. I would, therefore, like to share helpful historical perspective given by Dr John Young, Liberton Kirk, Edinburgh.

"When the Gospel was first brought to Scotland by St Ninian and then by St Columba and the monks of Iona, their strategy was a simple one. They went to a place of God's leading, and there they established a centre for



was regular worship, teaching, training and service to the local people. The community would, in turn, then send out missionaries of its own to establish 'satellite' mission stations. And

so the cycle would repeat itself, resulting in... a community of congregations who saw themselves linked to each other, where ministry was shared and everyone did mission together. This organic way of doing church (not that different from that of the early Christians) was very successful. It resulted in the Gospel spreading throughout Scotland, through England and across Northern Europe. One of the reasons for its success was that it was well



suited to the 'pre- Christian era' they were living in, where nothing was taken for granted and everything was dependent on God's guidance and provisioning.

During the 'Christian era' that followed, our model of mission changed. The church became a well organised institution, with centralised structures and clear rules, divisions and roles of leadership. This became the Church of Scotland that we are familiar with today and it is an organisation that has worked well down through the centuries.

One of the main reasons for its success, however, has been that we could rely on Christianity being the recognised religion of Scottish Society. In our lifetime, however, a big change has been taking place. With the rise of secularism, we now find ourselves living in a 'post-Christian era', where our faith is becoming marginalised and our church no longer has a place at the table. With this change has come the recognition that the model of mission we are familiar with is no longer working so well, and we need to find a new way of doing things. The Church has considered and consulted on this over the past year and proposals have been prepared.

In many ways what is exciting about this is that it seems to be going back to the model that was so successful in the 'pre-Christian era'. Rather than individual congregations standing alone, there is a move towards bigger congregations supporting smaller ones within a local area. Instead of being different parishes with clear boundaries and our own ministers leading us we are being asked to consider becoming one united parish. In other words, that we become...a community of congregations linked to each other, where ministry is shared and we all do mission together. This model may sound very new, but it is actually very old and most modern thinkers in the wider Church of Scotland feel it is one more suited to a 'post-Christian' Society".

We need to pray for the Presbytery of Perth and our local churches in Strathearn as we continue to explore what this might mean for us in the years to come.

#### Men's Clubs




In today's world it seems contrary to prevailing social norms to be writing about the concept of a men's club, but in many churches there is not a suitable outlet for men to meet and talk and do men's things. The Women's Guild is now The Guild and this continues to be a great service organ of the Church of Scotland, but, in most churches

with Guilds there has not been much success in attracting men. There is, therefore, somewhat of a vacuum in terms of meaningful fellowship for men and particularly older men who have time and often valuable experience to give of their time usefully.

In the wider secular world, Men's Sheds have been created to fill this vacuum and, within the Strathearn area, there is a successful Men's Shed based in Comrie at the old Cultybraggan Camp. As its mission states, the Men's Shed





over 18, offering a friendly environment where they can interact with and enjoy their hobbies with other like-minded individuals, teach and learn from each other and offer support to

members' needs. I know a neighbour in Muthill who travels regularly to enjoy its facilities which include equipment and supplies for making things. games or just the opportunity to chat over a cup of tea. It fills an important space in his life and he raves about the facilities and the expertise that is readily available there. It has given him new interest and friendships.

In church settings, similar initiatives have been tried and have been successful in the form of Breakfast Clubs, lunch clubs with speakers, or even in the form of Artisan Clubs which enable men of church to use their skills in providing simple support services to the elderly and housebound of the congregation or the community, such as replacing light bulbs, doing a spot of painting, cleaning or even providing IT tuition to people or providing a repair service for laptops. In one case known to myself it has resulted in the development and maintenance of a landscaped church garden with a wellequipped garden shed, patio and BarBQ facilities.

Where such initiatives exist, the feedback is more often than not that they can be very stimulating of fellowship amongst the men of a congregation and often provide ready opportunities for Christian service within the community just as church cafes increasingly do.

In the case of Muthill could this, be a valuable addition to our congregational life? I wonder what you think?

#### **Towards Team Ministries?**

Perth Presbytery has published its Interim Presbytery Plan and is now out to consultation with individual churches on its content and proposals. It will involve organisational change for all congregations as the Church of Scotland is not only facing a reduction in the number of ministry posts, but it general finances also required it to review the



number of facilities used for worship and mission across the country. As the report states, there needs to be new emphasis on mission and a suitable structure to support it.

Under Presbytery's Interim Plan, Muthill is placed in Network 9 consisting of Auchterarder, Blackford, Ardoch, Aberuthven and Muthill and Trinity Gask & Kinkell, whilst the other part of the Strathearn valley is in Network 8 and covers Crieff, Comrie & Dundurn and Mid Strathearn. Under the proposals in the Interim Report our Network 9 will have 1.5FTE (full time equivalent) ministries (reduced from 2.4FTE), whilst Network 8 will also have 1-5FTE ministries (reduced from 2.7FTE) both to be agreed by the newly formed networks. This, if accepted, will involve the 1FTE (Parish Minister being based at Auchterarder with the 0.5FTE ministry being based at the newly formed linked/united parish of Ardoch and Blackford and Muthill and Trinity Gask & Kinkell.

It is further proposed that under this arrangement, Auchterarder will become the supervising congregation of Aberuthven Mission Church. Ardoch and Blackford will unite with closure of one building and Muthill and Trinity Gask & Kinkell will unite with closure of Trinity Gask & Kinkell. This means that Muthill Church building will continue as a place of active worship. Finally, Ardoch and Blackford will link/unite with Muthill and Trinity Gask & Kinkell. A new team ministry will thus be formed for the newly formed parishes and for ministry resources to be used creatively



within this network.

The one final important proposal contained in the Interim Plan is that the congregations in Networks 8 and 9 also consider the possibility of forming one large network instead of two with an allocation of 3FTE ministries to cover the entire area.

There will be a meeting with Presbytery to further explain the detailed implications of the proposals to Muthill Kirk Session on 6th April.

The Bridge will have more information on these important proposed changes to our structure as and when further information becomes available. There will also be verbal reports at worship services when decisions are taken.

### The Future for Trinity Gask and Kinkell.

The Presbytery of Perth has been asking every congregation to reflect on the plan which was presented recently and explained at the meeting in Perth on 12th February.

The Kirk Session at Trinity Gask and Kinkell discussed it at their last meeting on 22nd February.

The Presbytery suggestion was that Trinity Gask and Kinkell should be united with Muthill and the building closed. This would not necessarily be imminent. The Presbytery wide plan still needs final approval before the end of the year and will then be implemented over the next 5 years.

It was pointed out at the meeting in Perth that buildings that were no longer used but still owned by the congregations would still need to be maintained and insured.

The Kirk Session was well aware of the trend in attendance over a number of years and it is not difficult to project that into the future. That concern prompted Elma and Douglas Crichton a number of years ago to take a letter outlining the situation at the church to every home in the parish. There was a limited response, not nearly enough to secure the future of the congregation.

Reflecting on the Presbytery plan, the situation in the church, and the possible future scenarios, the Kirk Session decided to ask the Presbytery for permission to be dissolved. Every member would then be given their

lines and be invited to join another local church. Many of the members live much nearer churches in Auchterarder, Crieff or Muthill than Trinity Gask. The church would be taken over by the General Trustees who will have responsibility for maintenance, insurance and disposal of the building. Before then, the Kirk Session will be able to determine how to distribute the assets, financial and contents of the church in a fitting way. The parish would be absorbed into neighbouring parishes as the Presbytery redraws boundaries.

We feel this is a mature and realistic response to the situation we face, taking responsibility for our future, before it is imposed on us by any outside body.

It is, of course, a sad day. There has been worship on this site for perhaps over a thousand years, and the present building has been a prominent sight on the hillside for centuries. Many families will see the church as their spiritual home and have many precious memories of significant life events associated with it. For them, the closure of the church will be like a bereavement. Recognising the solemnity of this decision the Kirk Session also had the idea of some kind of event to mark the dissolution.

The next step is that the Presbytery discusses the implications and process with the Kirk Session and if agreed that this is the right way forward it will be incorporated in the Presbytery plan to be presented before the end of the year for implementation as soon as practical thereafter.

A working party is organised as necessary to do heavier maintenance on the hedgerows and paths in the grounds.

# Financial Report





I ended my Financial Report last year with the words... "there is light at the end of the tunnel". A bit premature as it happens, for the tunnel has been much longer than anyone had expected.

Looking at the Extract from the Financial Statements for the past year on the opposite page, you will see that there have been some 'ups and downs'.

Total Ordinary General Income was £41099 compared with £43810 in 2020. This represents a 'down' of some £2711. But, on the other hand, our Total Ordinary General Expenditure fell from £41863 to £38924. This also is a 'down', but in a good way, so it's really an'up'.

These figures translate into a surplus for the year of £2175 (2020: £1947) another 'up' and no mean feat considering the prevailing circumstances.

The past two years have been challenging, to say the least, but the fact that we have come through the period again with a financial surplus proves that we are a viable and sustainable unit of the Church of Scotland. In spite of that, our future looks uncertain and we wait to see what lies ahead; that will be decided by Presbytery... and a much higher Power.

Having said that, now is the time for us to remain strong as a congregation and to demonstrate our support for our church by showing how important it is to us. But there is some good news!

During the past year we have been busy puting our house in order quite literally. We have spent £21000 on major repairs to the church roof and nearly £18000 on a new audio-visual system to improve the quality of our on-line services, thus ensuring that, at home, our building is wind and water-tight, and at the same time reaching out to others further afield.

In the meantime, this expenditure was more than covered by generous donations in the year to our Restoration & Refurbishment Fund, which at the time of writing now stands at a healthy £128237.



## Kirk Session Update



Since our last edition of the magazine, the Kirk Session of Muthill Parish Church has met twice and the following decisions have been taken:

 The Church is entitled to send a commissioner this year to the General Assembly in May. Helen-May Bayne, our Session



 On the subject of the Eldership and Pastoral Care, a review of the Kirk Roll is underway and members of the congregation have already been written to, asking them to clarify what sort of connection they wish with the church. Preliminary meetings are also taking place in regard to establishing house groups. Finally, the Session continues to look for a replacement for Isobel Barratt to coordinate pastoral



- care visiting.
- Elaine Wallace has been appointed as the new Worship and Communication Convener, whilst Liz Mitchell has agreed to be our Scripture Union Ambassador and Alison Hockly will coordinate our Christian Aid support. With PVG approval, Adrian Donaldson will also be joining the Children's Team. Finally, Elizabeth Boyd has also taken over the Singing Group, following Maureen Buwert's departure..
- Rev Mairi Perkins has been appointed as our Interim Moderator in the vacancy caused by Klaus' retirement. Mairi is the minister of the linked charge of Ardoch Parish Church in Braco and Blackford Parish Church. She was welcomed to the Church and led Sunday Worship on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> March.
- On the interim Presbytery Plan, after discussing initial reactions to the Plan, the Kirk Session decided to invite a representative of the Presbytery Development and Planning Committee to meet with the Kirk Session to further discuss and explore the options presented in the Plan. This meeting is likely to take place in April.
- Inez Robinson has indicated her intention to step down from the role of Presbytery Elder. She will be replaced by Graham Donaldson in due course.
- The Accounts for 2020/2021 were presented and approved. They
  have now been lodged with 121 George Street in the required OSCR
  format. General Funds are currently in a healthy State. An article
  on the accounts appears in this edition of the magazine. A Donation
  was also agreed from the Anderson Trust of £1000 to the Church of
  Scotland Ukraine Appeal
- Some property repairs have been done in both the church and the manse. It has been approved that the manse will be let during the vacancy and a new tenant should be in occupation by the end of March. In the church, repairs have been undertaken to some guttering and the water system and a new Ramsay ladder should be installed in the tower by the begining of April.
- The Kirk Session has approved the purchase of a new clavinova for church worship.
- The Kirk Roll stands at 205.
