General Assembly Report

Every four or five years each Church of Scotland congregation is invited to send their minister and an elder to the General Assembly. This year I represented Muthill and I could either attend in person or online. I chose to attend in person where there were the appropriate covid measures in place.

I imagine the only thing you heard on the news or read about the Assembly this year was the decision to allow Church of Scotland ministers to officiate same sex marriages if they wish. However, there was so much more to the Assembly than this!



On the first day, the Rt Rev lain Greenshields was installed as Moderator and each morning the day began with worship, led by the Moderator - thought provoking insights and wonderful singing!

The work of Presbytery reorganisation is ongoing throughout the country with

current presbyteries merging to form larger presbyteries which will be serviced more locally rather than by staff in Edinburgh. The new Perth Presbytery will be formed by merging the presbyteries of Angus, Dundee, Dunkeld & Meigle, Perth and Stirling and this was approved.

Professor Jason Leitch, the Scottish Government's National Clinical Director, thanked the Church for everything it had done during the pandemic: "Whether you run the tiniest church in Scotland or one of the largest fellowships, the work you've done for those you serve has been absolutely without precedent".

The General Assembly condemned the Russian invasion of Ukraine, calling for an immediate ceasefire and 'just and peaceful solution'. Sunflower seeds, were distributed to commissioners, the sunflower being the Ukrainian national flower. The work of CrossReach, the social care arm of the church, was recognised particularly in dealing with the challenges of the ongoing pandemic. The tireless dedication of the staff working in Christ's name, made the places where they work very special. Gratitude was expressed to those who had supported Crossreach financially.



In recognising chaplaincy work, The Rev Dr Marjory MacLean, convener of the committee, spoke very moving of 'an unforgettable day' when she was serving as a chaplain on a naval vessel in the Mediterranean and they rescued 700 migrants. Rescuing the migrants who were two deep in the inflatables they found that two women had died. The accompanying relatives were distraught but seeing a cross round the neck of one of the relatives, Marjory told us, "I extemporised a prayer, with my young colleague at my shoulder translating as best he could. And then, suddenly, the sorrowing figure took a breath and began to pray; desolate, lamenting prayer, desperate, fast prayer, too fast for the young lieutenant beside me to keep up with the translation. He looked at me in panic, and I waved him away. It didn't matter to me what she was saying; she was praying now her own sorrow and need, and I only needed to keep holding her hands." This is all part of



a day's work for the chaplains of HM Forces.

There were many good news stories of how church members had adapted and served their community during the last two years. Church had organised the delivery of food to those who were vulnerable and in other places the vulnerable received phone calls and Guild members had distributed 'goodie bags'.

In closing, the Lord High Commissioner, Lord Hodge, said that

the week had given him 'a strong sense of the energy and vibrancy of initiatives being taken at a local level' across Scotland.

While we all face change within the church, let's not forget that there's much good work being done in the name of the church and let us continue to do it.

The Father Heart of God

In this summer edition of the magazine, I am recommending another good book, which for many years has escaped my reading despite being an international best seller. It was written by Floyd McClung who was a well-known pastor until his death in 2021. With his wife Sally he undertook important Christian missionary outreach work in Europe, Afghanistan, USA and South Africa and in his service on several continents Floyd met many people who suffer from emotional scars and fears and this books attests to how over and over again the discovery of God as Father - perfectly reliable - brought them freedom and healing. *The Father Heart of God* came to my notice as I am a follower of Pete Greig and his 24-7 Prayer Movement and continue to gain much from the daily devotions provided on line through *Lectio* 365.

I find it a good read firstly because I think it has an appeal for many different audiences such as younger searching adults as well as church families in that various parts have a handbook approach with very practical thoughts and advice. It also highlights the dangers implicit in relationships and how important it is to focus on our relationship with God as the *perfect* Father and not to be led astray by placing our understanding of that on human relationships. God's love must be seen only through Jesus and not in human terms as we live in a fallen world and without God we have no compass. His love is only made understandable and comprehendible though Jesus his life, teachings and example. It is also important to understand that God's heart is broken and this understanding is needed to find answers to hurt, injustice, dishonesty, pride and greed all of which we will encounter at some time in our lives.

In another particularly helpful chapter, Floyd talks about what he calls the "Saul Syndrome" and how one problem in life can lead onto another. "If we do not deal with our emotional hurts in God's way it will lead us to independence, which in turn produces pride. Pride is much more concerned about what people think of us, than what God thinks of us, which results in the fear of man. The fear of man inevitably leads to disobedience". In this sort of scenario, he says, we may still do a lot for God but it is a religion of dead works!



I also like this book as it is what I would call an easy read of about 150 pages which relates us comfortably to scripture whilst focusing largely on our emotional life and the challenges that that can present for us as individuals, Christians and as a Church family and how our attitudes, reactions and life can be transformed if we seek to develop that deep understanding of God's perfect love.

The Slide


As I watch

Muthill in Bloom - Sterling Community Service

Much is written about the decline of community spirit these days. Throughout history people have lived in small tight-knit communities but today we have moved to a much more isolated way of life. Public



surveys confirm that the majority of people in the UK are concerned that we are turning into an urbanised, work obsessed nation of out of town supermarket shoppers. Reports shows that many are concerned about loss of countryside and green spaces and the loss of amenities including post offices. There is also a growing concern about old people losing their dignity and parents spending too little time with families. Undoubtedly, more travelling

away from home to work, and the ever increasing focus on and promotion of personal interests has added to these trends. In smaller communities this decline can be further aggravated by the transient nature of a significant percentage of the population.

In fighting such trends, any smaller community, I would suggest, needs to be able to develop a sense of unity of purpose using all available talent and skills by preserving and enhancing what is good and worthwhile whilst looking to and planning positively for the future. Whatever is done, where success can be seen, there is usually evidence of enthusiastic resident participation and community groups working closely together.

Muthill village inevitably is vulnerable to some of these trends of modern community life and yet there are also examples of good work going on to enhance the community. One such action group, *Muthill in Bloom*, deserves praise for beautifying the public areas of our village, particularly at this time of the year. It provides an example that needs to be recognised and lauded!

Established in the 1990s through a nationwide initiative to beautify Scotland, *Muthill in Bloom* was formed alongside some 52 other local action groups aimed at "taking pride in Perthshire". Its leaders have included Lily Crawford, Margaret Melville and now Susan Crawford, each of whom by all



accounts has given great service. Over the years there have been awards in competitions such as a silver gilt award in *Britain in Bloom* and repeated *Best Village* awards in Perthshire. Such awards give pride and recognition to the village but sadly I have learned that the number of volunteers that do all the work has declined over the years despite requests for more help

I am sure that we have all admired the work done by Susan and her helpers as they have planted, nurtured and weeded a multitude of tubs and floral





containers around the village resulting in an amazing colourful display in all sections of the village. Yet it is probably not well known that this has been achieved with inadequate resources and equipment for the task. We live in a time of increasingly tight Council budgets and it may not be known that during this time that *Muthill in Bloom* along with its local contractors has extended its role to take on some care of our two cemeteries in Muthill tidying them up of self-seeding shrubs and bushes and planting spring flowers. This is all in addition to the year round maintenance of the many tubs, hanging baskets and the floral cart which greets you on entering the village from Crieff.

How can we as residents come together and help? Firstly supporting the annual fund raising sale and the Christmas mail delivery service is a good start as these are the group's primary sources of income. Giving a little time to watering or weeding, if you are able, would also be greatly appreciated. Just contact Susan to enquire how this is best done, and if you are able to give a gift, the group needs a new buggy to transport water around the village and some of the other more major works during the growing season. It is easy to contact the group and keep up to date with its plans and needs through the *Muthill in Bloom* website on Facebook.

Our first meeting will be in Muthill on Wednesday, 12th October at 2.30pm







Muthill House Group 2

After including a listing of our network of House Groups in the last edition of The Bridge, I am pleased to report that a further new group is being set up in Muthill village. Because of excellent material available from the Bible Society aimed at understanding the books of the Bible as part of one big story, we will start by using their latest Bible Course compiled by Dr Andrew Ollerton (Author, Lecturer and Pastor). It aims to show participants how events, books and characters fit together and uses video and handbook accompaniment to promote discussion and learning.

We will be starting the House Group with 6-8 sessions from this course. There are one or two spaces available for this new group (or indeed simply initially for the Bible Course). Streamlining National Kirk Structure

As the Church continues to go through radical reform in response to falling membership and falling income and continues to reassess the best way to shape its presence in the 2020s with all that means for mission and outreach, it is helpful to have a background understanding of the form of Government under which we work in order to understand how things are developing at parish level such as in Muthill.

The Church of Scotland is firstly the national church. This was recognised by Parliament in 1690 when Parliament restored Presbyterianism in Scotland and this is guaranteed under the 1707 Act of Union between Scotland and England. In matters of doctrine, government, discipline and worship the Church in Scotland is, however, free of State interference. One of the results of this is that the Queen is not the supreme governor of the Church of Scotland as she is in the Church of England. She has a right to attend the General Assembly but not to take part in its deliberations. Hence the Lord High Commissioner who personally represents her in her absence.

The Presbyterian system of government means that no one person or group has more influence or say in the Church. The Church does not have one person who acts as head of faith as that role is the Lord's or God's. Its supreme role of faith and life is through the teachings of the Bible. The day to day government is organised on the basis of a series of Courts which derive from the period 1560-1690. Each of these courts has committees which may include other members of the church and at national level full time employees.

At local level, namely at parish or congregational level, the court is the *Kirk Session*. The Kirk Session oversees the work of the congregation and parish and consists of appointed elders presided over by the Minister.

At District level the court is a *Presbytery*. Presbyteries consist of all the ministers of the district together with an equal number of elders along with members of the diaconate (a form of ordained ministry usually working in a complimentary role at parish level or in industry). There are currently over 40 Presbyteries covering Scotland, England and internationally.





At national level, the *General Assembly* is the highest court of the Church, which currently has around 400 ministers, 400 elders and members of the diaconate representing Presbyteries.

The day to day policy making and practical decision making of the Church at all levels is conducted through forums, committees, councils and departments. Two more recent forums are the *Faith Impact Forum* and the *Faith Nurture Forum*. The former Impact Forum seeks to support and enable the Church, congregations and Presbyteries to engage with local, national and international issues whilst the Nurture Forum supports recruitment, education and on-going training of ministers, deacons and many others. This latter forum is also involved in Presbytery planning and new ways of delivering church across Scotland.

Below these there are numerous advisory committees including audit, architecture and ecumenical relations, service-giving councils such as Social Care (Crossreach) and finally departments such as General Trustees, Human Resources, Law, Pensions not forgetting The Guild which is on its own.

The above sets out the structure in which the church operates. The number of Presbyteries is in the process of being reduced through the merging of Presbyteries and includes our own one of Perth which will soon include Angus, Dundee, Dunkeld and Meigle, Perth and Stirling. The 2022 General Assembly also approved that the work of the Faith Nurture and Faith Impact Forums be brought together under a single Active Faith Leadership Team with four main programmes, namely Mission, People and Training, Public Life and Global Justice & Resource & Presence.

It is undoubtedly a time of difficult painful decision making and restructuring for the Church but, as Lord Hodge, the Queen's representative, said at the

end of this year's General Assembly seeing the Kirk in action had reassured him that along with challenges there were new opportunities ahead.

Supporting Our Local Foodbank - The Crieff Foodbank

The foodbank in Crieff was founded several years ago by two ladies from Crieff Baptist church with the aim of 'sharing God's love by providing free food supplies to those in the community who are struggling to make ends meet'. Initially the foodbank was housed in part of the Logos Youth Centre but over time they required more room to extend their services so the foodbank moved to the King's Centre (formerly the treatment room in the 'old health centre') in King's Street, Crieff in 2019.



Initially part of the Trussell Trust, the foodbank is now an independent foodbank but runs on lines similar to other local foodbanks. People may be referred by various groups or individuals, social workers, the housing department, GPs, and other charitable organisations such as CATH and CAP.

Often however, people simply self-refer, either by phoning the foodbank number or turning up at the door. The foodbank is open

Monday and Friday mornings from 10 till 12 and on Wednesday afternoons from 1.30 till 3.30. Anyone who is in need is welcomed and valued. If someone needs to use the foodbank regularly, the volunteers seek to point them to other agencies which can provide longer term support.

Volunteers come from most of the local churches or from those happy to accept the Christian ethos of the foodbank and serve once or twice a month.

The foodbank receives donations from collection points at the COOP in



Crieff, Methven PO, and St Fillan's village store as well as from individuals and churches.

Our grateful thanks to the folks in Muthill church for the resumption of donations into the box in the foyer and to Joe for highlighting on the notice board items particularly needed each month. These are always gladly received.

I guess that many readers have experienced parts of the Edinburgh Festivals over the years, and this year, its 75thanniversary, promises an amazing galaxy of cultural talent and experience. Formed in the shadow of World War 2, the first festivals sought to use culture as a healing balm to bring peoples and nations together in celebration of our common humanity and help "the flowering of the human spirit".



This year continues this founding aim but is brought up to date with the publication of a new Vision 2030 aimed at future proofing Edinburgh as a world-leading festival city so that it can be at the forefront of leading positive change. Vision 2030 is rooted in both the festivals' own sense of their role and purpose as well as taking account of common ground with public policy and the plans and interest of stakeholders at all levels of the festivals' work. Amongst the festivals running throughout August are the following:



The **Edinburgh International Festival** returns to its regular theatres and concert halls this summer, with 14 venues due to host 87 events and 160 performances of opera, theatre, dance and classical and contemporary music. It is Fergus Linehan's final year as Festival Director, before Nicola Benedetti takes the reins in 2023, and it is proving to be one of strong content.

The 2022 **Edinburgh Festival Fringe** is as always unique with something for everyone. After two years away, there is a bottleneck of performers bursting to perform, ranging from newbies trying to break through stardom and actual stars roadtesting their new tours. This year will have 3,171 shows from 58 countries. There is literally a plethora of performances for all types of audiences from children to adults and the key themes this year will include Gender and Gender identity, LGBTQ+, Mental Health, Neurodiversity, Disability, Feminism. Lockdown, Migration, Politics and Works for children. As ever there is a strong presence of comedy promising to have you howling with laughter but also there are also many different types of shows including dance, theatre, music and art.

The **Edinburgh Art Festival** is the platform for the visual arts at the heart of Edinburgh's August festivals, bringing together the capital's leading galleries, museums and artist-run spaces in a city-wide celebration of the very best in visual art.
