HOMESLESSNESS VETERANS

As of 2023, the percentage of homeless veterans in the U.S. increased by 7.4% compared to the previous year. On a single night in January 2023, 35,574 veterans were experiencing homelessness. Despite this increase, veteran homelessness has declined by 52% since 2010 due to ongoing efforts to provide housing and support.

There are many inspiring stories of homeless veterans overcoming challenges and finding stability. Here are a few examples:

- **Veterans Village in Houston**: A nonprofit transformed a former hotel into an apartment complex for homeless veterans, providing housing and support. One veteran, Orlando Camacho, shared how the program saved his life, giving him a place to live and the resources to rebuild.
- Cooking Skills for Independence: In Gloucester, a program teaches homeless veterans essential cooking skills, helping them regain independence and confidence. Many veterans in the program struggled to get hot meals before, and now they are learning to prepare nutritious food.
- Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans: This organization has helped thousands of veterans find housing and stability. However, proposed budget cuts could threaten these efforts, potentially increasing veteran homeless in the state.

Each of these stories highlights the resilience of veterans and the importance

of community support in helping them rebuild their lives.

• Volunteers of America Veterans Services – Provides emergency shel-

ter and housing assistance for veterans in need.

- **Hope Connections** Works to create safe, affordable housing for those experiencing homelessness, including veterans.
- **Shreveport-Bossier Rescue Mission** Offers shelter, meals, and recovery programs for homeless individuals, including veterans.
- **Elle Foundation** Provides supportive services for veterans and their families, helping them transition out of homelessness.
- **Shreveport Vet Center** Offers counseling, mental health support, and connections to VA resources for veterans.
- VA Shreveport Health Care Provides specialized care for homeless veterans, including housing assistance, job training, and addiction recovery programs.

These organizations are working to ensure that veterans receive the help they need to regain stability and independence.
