United Methodist Net Zero Campaign Launch

All Christians are called to be stewards of the precious and beautiful world that God created and commissioned to our care. For many years, scientists have warned us that some of the practices of our modern lifestyle are changing and threatening life on our fragile planet. The Board of Global Ministries has been called to provide more funds than ever before for relief from natural disasters, and they created a special division called Earthkeepers to help make the situation known in United Methodist congregations. The hope is that informed individuals and churches can find ways to help decrease their own release of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases into the atmosphere and help slow the global warming that will make drought, super storms, fire, flood and famine ever more devastating and costly.

The Desert Southwest Conference Covenant Council has given our newly re-activated Earth Care Task Force the responsibility of providing an action plan for our Conference to join other Annual Conferences and numerous general agencies of the United Methodist Church in working toward the goal of Net Zero carbon emissions by 2050 in our Conference facilities, homes, and churches. The Desert Southwest Conference Earth Care Task Force is beginning that task by providing all interested laity and clergy information, tools, and encouragement so that we can all work together to build a net zero emissions economy by 2050.

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Pastor's Corner

Recently, I quoted Ann Weems in a sermon as an example of how we have replaced the joy of the Lord with rules.

"What do we want to tell the children? Shhh, sit down. Don't run in the church. Jesus Christ says, comb your hair. Jesus Christ says, sit on your chair. Jesus Christ says, be polite. Jesus says, do everything right!"



How many kids have this impression of church? How many of us have this impression of church? Well, our impressions come from somewhere, so we probably learned these same things when we were a child in church, or from other members if we joined as an adult. What do we *really* want to tell each other?

People who are not physically in church have not been able to see the children during the children's time in church. We have only shown the slide while providing the audio. Some people learn a lot from children's time. But others want to see the kids, be entertained by how cute they are, pat themselves on the back because we have children in church. But for our children's safety, we need to keep their faces off the internet. So, we maintain an open livestream, but we don't show the children. No one wants their child's picture on some predator's computer. We want to tell our children we will keep them safe, so we will be making changes to support this in the next month or so.

What else do we want to tell the children? Miss Connie would like to get some children's Bibles and books for our kids. However, I remember our family's children Bible being scary as all get out. Next to a picture of Jesus on the cross would be the words, "Do you see this man? Is he being hurt? Is he in pain? He is allowing himself to be hurt because of you. He is being hurt because you and I sin. Isn't it wonderful?" Ok, maybe those weren't the exact words, but it is close. I learned at an early age that my actions were killing other people. Great message, huh? So the Bibles we get our children are very important. What seems ok to us, is not necessarily ok to our children. I had a 6th grader without a father decide to leave the church because her Sunday School teacher talked about how without the Father we can't be saved. Language matters. If you want to support Bibles for our children, give The CEB* Deep Blue Kids Bible from Cokesbury. The language is mostly inclusive, using humankind instead of mankind, and other similar language. Or, you can get a NRSV* version of The Adventure Bible or one of the other children's NRSV Bibles. The language is not as inclusive as the CEB, but at least, unlike some translations, our girls won't feel the world was made by a male God for men.

If we want people to feel welcomed and loved here at CITD, we need to be constantly assessing how others view us. The steps above will help our children, and us, as we move forward.



Our Pledge We, the agencies of The United Methodist Church, pledge to **achieve net-zero emissions by 2050 across ministries, facilities, operations, and investments** and to leverage the gifts of our connection putting equity and justice at the center as we build a net-zero emission economy by 2050.

WHAT DOES NET ZERO MEAN?

Put simply, net zero means cutting greenhouse gas emissions to as close to zero as possible, with any remaining emissions re-absorbed from the atmosphere, by oceans and forests.

WHY IS NET ZERO IMPORTANT?

To prevent the worst impacts of climate change and preserve a livable planet, global temperature increase needs to be limited to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels. Currently, the Earth is already about 1.1°C warmer than it was in the late 1800s, and emissions continue to rise. To keep global warming to no more than 1.5°C — as called for in the Paris Agreement — emissions need to be reduced by 45% by 2030 and reach net zero by 2050.

HOW CAN NET ZERO BE ACHIEVED?

Transitioning to a net-zero world will require transforming how we produce, consume, and move about. Replacing polluting coal, gas and oil-fired power with energy from renewable sources, such as wind or solar, would dramatically reduce carbon emissions.

Unsustainable Living Alert

Most people know the story about the people gathered on the hillside and the 2 loaves and 5 fishes that were gathered up in baskets. Jesus provided food for the people. This article is taken from the book, A Hopeful Earth, studied by the Women's Bible Study at Cross in the Desert. The lesson from Jesus is that as we all share there will be enough. Sometimes though an incident like this horrifying attack and war on the Ukraine can have a large impact on food availability. Between our text and an agriculture trade magazine, we realize that sometimes peoples and countries face hunger and not enough food and other supplies. A report from Eurasia Group and Devry BV shows that wheat production and exports will be reduced by 35% from Ukraine and affect countries such as Africa greatly with starvation. Our authors describe this situation as one of sin-God has created the earth as a place with enough. In our own country, prices will continue to rise and some people will not have enough or even starve. What can we do as Christians? Being very careful with the food we buy and use will help. Planting gardens, even in plastic buckets or other ways will help us reduce the amount we buy. Donating to food banks and ministries that help provide food for people is a major way we can help others so they too can experience a God that provides for everyone. We can pray that this war ends and that all can share as the people did who gathered on the hillside with Jesus.

CITD Financial Corner

As we're all aware, the last couple of years have brought many changes and stresses to all kinds of institutions across the world. Many churches have suffered, and we have not been immune to those pressures. While we have done our best to maintain things on a status quo basis to continue our Christian mission in our community, we've seen declining attendance and giving. This past year our pledges indicated concerns for this year, but we also have many that do not pledge even though they give significantly to the church. We had hoped that as things got more back to normal, we would see a return to better times. Therefore, we budgeted giving to be about the same as the end of last year. Unfortunately, our hopes were not realized.

While our expenses are down from what we budgeted, our giving is down even more. Our expenses have exceeded giving by over \$15,000 year to date. We had some buffer in our General Fund to handle some of that shortfall. The buffer is now depleted. We had also prepared a rainy-day fund in case this time would come. We are now using some of those funds to pay expenses, so we are on borrowed time. In addition, we did not budget and have not paid Apportionment this year. We wanted to let you know that unless we address our giving side, then we will have to take efforts to reduce our expenses.

Thank you for your continued prayers and financial support. If you can contribute to our shortfall, then it would be greatly appreciated. If you have any questions or have ideas to help, please feel free to contact me.

For many years, Cross In The Desert has donated onesies, diapers, hats, socks, burp cloths, blankets, etc. I believe last year, we prepared over 40 layettes, collected diapers and other items. When loaded for delivery, the car only had room for a driver, thanks to our generosity.

Thanks to Jeannine Diller for coordinating this project and creating "baby layettes" in gallon ziplock bags. How can we help? Shop for next to new items at Goodwill and garage sales, create blankets, crochet hats, booties, hand mittens without thumbs, etc. Blankets can be crocheted with a tight stitch or by using flannel and hemming it. One year, someone crocheted edging on the blankets. Watch for Jeannine's day to pack the ziplock bags.

Blankets are usually about 45 inches square, but the need is great, so any size is welcomed. Some of us even make quilt-style baby blankets with flannel fabric scraps.

We deliver these items in early Fall to Tanner AMC Chapel. The Mission Women in their church have the connections to deliver our gifts to reliable agencies, across Arizona, helping many families.

What is 2-1-1 Arizona?

The 2-1-1 Arizona Information and Referral Services program was founded in 1964 as Community Information and Referral Services and incorporated as a private, nonprofit 501 (c)(3) organization in 1979. Solari acquired the program in 2017.

2-1-1 Arizona Information and Referral Service operates 24 hours per day, seven days per week and every day of the year. Live-operator service is available at all times in English and Spanish and assistance is available in other languages via real-time interpreter services.

2-1-1 Arizona operators will help individuals and families find resources that are available to them locally, throughout the state, and provide connections to critical services that can improve – and save – lives, including:

- Supplemental Food and Nutrition Programs
- Shelter and Housing Options
- Utilities Assistance
- Emergency Information and Disaster Relief
- Employment and Education Opportunities
- Services for Veterans
- Healthcare, vaccination and health epidemic information
- Addiction Prevention and Rehabilitation Programs
- Re-entry help for ex-offenders
- Support groups for individuals with mental illnesses or special needs
