Pastor's Corner

Does the Christmas season excite you, or exhaust you? Are you longing for the traditions of old, or waiting for something new to happen? Are you bored with the entire holiday season of HalloThanksMas?

I had a pastor friend that changed the song during the candle lighting on Christmas Eve from *Silent Night* to *Still, Still, Still.* It created such an uproar you would have thought she had desecrated the sanctuary by killing a live chicken and scattering its blood around. But once upon a time, the entire Christmas Eve service was lit by candles or oil lamps



because there was no electricity, and no one sang *Silent Night* because it hadn't been written yet. Until the 20th century, most churches wouldn't have a guitar in the sanctuary, let alone allow Silent Night to be played on one. So things have changed. Isn't the point of Christmas, the good news of Jesus, that something has changed in our world and we need to allow it to change us?

The story of Jesus' birth is an old one, told many times. We have added other traditions to the mass of Christ, like Christmas trees, special music, Santa Claus, giving gifts. There is nothing wrong with our celebrations, except possibly one thing: are our traditions so structured we are no longer surprised by possibilities and miracles?

A couple years ago I was surprised by the movie "Last Christmas". I took it to be a standard rom-com version of Christmas and so missed the clues of the much better ending. As much as I love and cherish traditions, I want to be surprised more often. I don't want the story of Christmas to become a monotone playing in the background of the season. I want Mary to come tell me what she remembers of her pregnancy, the birth, and those first tiring days. I want to hear Joseph talking about his role in everything. And what did Grandma and Grandpa think of this child? When did they first see him? What happened when they babysat? Tell me the stories, sing me the lullabies. My husband held our newborn son on his arm, head in hand, body draped on his forearm, and stared at him in wonder. I want to see that wonder on Christmas Eve in church.

So, maybe we are more traditional this year than last (no Grinch lurking). But that doesn't mean we shouldn't expect, even desire, a few things to change. I pray each of us finds what we are looking for this season, including calm and rest. And may the wonder of Christmas be yours.

Sustainable alert

A Hopeful Earth, the Women's Bible Study, lists that there are three major temptations that take us away from our faith in God.

CITD Financial Corner

Giving for October and November appear to have rebounded from our low September, but in general our overall inflow of funds is still a concern. As we try to prepare a budget for 2023, our pledges are down from 2022. We are still getting some pledges back. If you've not done so, already, please consider submitting a pledge. Remember that this is really an estimate of giving. We understand that financial situations can change, and if you need to modify your commitment, we totally understand. This really helps us with our planning. We are trying our best to not make drastic cuts, but we are currently looking at a big shortfall in 2023.

We are continuing to work on some additional funding options to help close the gap until we can get things turned around. SPRC applied to the Conference for Equitable Compensation help for 2023, and we believe we will again receive \$10,000 from Conference to apply to Pastor's salary. Foundation is also another source. We are reviewing whether we will qualify for Employee Retention Credits, but our initial look doesn't look too promising for that. We also applied for and were accepted into a new Church Cartographers conference program. This will involve an extensive review of our church and investigate opportunities to increase the participation and support from non-church related groups.

Our Luminarias for All Saints Day project generated \$1458, and we had at least 32 attendees. All proceeds from this went toward paying Conference Apportionment. With these funds and some of the money we received from Foundation, we did pay a month's worth of our Apportionment.

Bishop Grant Hagiya retires 12-31-2022

Greetings in the name and spirit of our Creator and Sustainer! As you may know, Bishop Grant Hagiya will enter the retired relationship on December 31, 2022. Before being elected bishop in 2008, he pastored various congregations in Southern California before his assignment as Los Angeles District Superintendent and the California-Pacific's first Executive Director of Leadership.

He has continued to grow, learn, and teach throughout his tenure as pastor, superintendent, and bishop. He inspires those around him to "take thou authority" and to "try something new" when the old ways no longer work. Leadership and innovation are hallmarks of his ministry. One can see the fruits of it in the number of clergy and laity who have been trained as coaches; in the new partnerships many congregations form to explore the re-purposing of their properties; and in the open-appointment-making processes he leads each year. It is easy to see the fruits his consistency and commitment bring to ministry contexts where he serves. Claremont School of Theology has tapped him to serve as Interim President upon his retirement. That will give him a unique opportunity to continue to live and do his leadership passions for many years.



DSC welcomes Bishop Carlo Rapanut 1-1-2023

The Rev. Carlo A. Rapanut, assistant to the bishop in the Greater Northwest Episcopal Area, has been elected a bishop by The United Methodist Church's Western Jurisdiction. He is the first Filipino American bishop in The United Methodist Church, and the first U.S. bishop who was ordained in a central conference — a United Methodist region outside the U.S. Delegates elected Rapanut, 48, on Nov. 4 at the jurisdiction's



meeting in Salt Lake City. He has been appointed to the Desert Southwest Conference, where his term of service begins Jan. 1, 2023. In the United States, bishops are elected to serve for life.

Rapanut, an elder in the Pacific Northwest Conference, has served as assistant to Bishop Elaine JW Stanovsky in the Greater Northwest Area since 2021. Since 2014 until May this year, he also served as co-dean of the Greater Northwest Area bishop's cabinet and conference superintendent of the Alaska United Methodist Conference. As superintendent, he supervised clergy over Alaska's vast geographical area and helped envision the conference's transition into a mission district in a decolonized and values-driven way. He also was the Alaska Conference's director of connectional ministries from 2014 until becoming assistant to the bishop. In the early days of the pandemic, he led the Greater Northwest Area's COVID Response Team, which helped provide online worship resources and aided churches in securing federal Paycheck Protection Program loans. He previously served as pastor of United Methodist Church of Chugiak, Chugiak, Alaska

Rapanut grew up in Baguio City, Philippines. He has a bachelor's degree in mathematics and a master's degree in management from the University of the Philippines. He also has a Master of Divinity from Wesley Divinity School in Cabanatuan City, Philippines. Before moving to the U.S., he was senior pastor of Baguio City First United Methodist Church and later assistant to now-retired Bishop Benjamin A. Justo. In The United Methodist Church, bishops are ordained elders who are called to "lead and oversee the spiritual and temporal affairs of The United Methodist Church." Bishops, in consultation with district superintendents, are responsible for appointing clergy. They also preside at annual conferences, jurisdictional conferences and General Conference, the denomination's top lawmaking assembly.

Bishop Rapanut is married to wife Radie and has two sons, Titus and Caleb.

"Let us pray that the road ahead would give us beautiful surprises of how God can work among us," Rapanut said.
