



Pastor's Corner

After September 11, 2001, our family chose to defy the terrorists by not being afraid. School trips mostly came to an end as parents and administrators feared more attacks. My middle child lost a trip to



Philadelphia to see Independence Hall. My oldest lost his eighth grade graduation trip to see a show on Broadway. But while I worked on finals, my husband took our children into the heart of Manhattan for holiday fun. When we can't change what has happened, we must choose defiance, we must choose to be certain our actions do not acquiesce to the status quo and the reactions desired by those who wish to hurt us and make us bow down before them. When people want us and others dead, we must choose life, even if the struggle kills us. Consider the people of Ukraine.

As I contemplate the recent shootings of innocent people, especially the children in Uvalde, Texas, I demand defiance. I demand that we quit acting like there is nothing we can do. I demand we quit offering our "thoughts and prayers" and begin offering action. I demand we call upon heaven AND earth to change things. Let us storm the gates of Heaven, yes, and demand God show us how to move forward even as we pray for comfort for the hurting. However, let us not pray for peace, because we need righteous anger to drive us to find ways of ending this senselessness. Also, let us storm the gates of congress and demand changes, not just in legislation, but in how they do business. Face it, if our leaders weren't at each other's throats and accepting of bad behavior, maybe people would stop thinking bad behavior is an acceptable way of dealing with problems and pain. And remember, we elected these people! We don't get to say "I didn't vote for them." We allow the negative campaigns to sway us. Quit reacting emotionally and demand well thought out, positive campaigns! And, I demand we quit saying these murderers are "insane" and that mental health resources are the only way to change things. Mostly, these people aren't "insane". They are angry, selfish, often hurting, always hateful.

We as a country are consumed with blood and fire, gun fire that is. But so are we Christians. However, as Christians we should be looking at the blood of grace, the sacrifice that came with forgiveness so that healing can occur and people can move forward into shalom. And we should be looking at the fire of the Spirit, which moves in mysterious ways to hold us accountable and to heal us with grace. This is the blood and fire of life, not death.

Pentecost is upon once again. Let us pray for a righteous fire of cleansing, healing, and positive change to move among us, energizing us for the work of God.

Re-Launching Cross in the Desert with Extravagant Hospitality

Many churches, including Cross in the Desert, consider one of their greatest qualities to be that they are a "friendly church". Being a friendly church is good. However, do we see ourselves as "friendly" simply because we have established relationships within the church and find our own needs are met through interactions with people with whom we have established relationships over the years? Are we truly welcoming strangers among us?

Flourishing churches go beyond "friendly" and instead practice extravagant aka radical hospitality. What is the difference? Churches who practice radical hospitality go beyond passively warmly welcoming visitors. Instead, they demonstrate a genuine interest in establishing a relationship with persons outside the faith community. This applies not to just individuals who show up on Sunday morning. It means this passion is carried forward with our neighbors, the people in line behind us at the grocery store, the person who serves your meal at a restaurant, and the person who sits in the cubicle next to us at the office. Individuals recognize this type of hospitality as genuine and unexpected. They realize that this person/church really cares about them!

It takes a lot of work and courage to practice extravagant hospitality. It is easier for some people than others. As more and more people come out of their homes after over 2 years of some level of isolation, they are looking for connections and truly meaningful relationships.

While there are many strategies that should be taken to become a church that thrives through radical hospitality, here is ONE simple strategy we all can do: Follow the Rule of Three. Talk only to persons you don't know (or don't know well) for the first three minutes after worship ends. This is when people without connection may choose to leave. If you find this to be outside your comfort zone, step out in faith to introduce yourself and then find someone else they may not know to draw them into the conversation. Together you can easily fill up three minutes welcoming and getting to know someone new!


UNSUSTAINABLE LIVING ALERT

The most significant and straightforward way to make a difference for the world is to plant and care for a tree. Trees contribute to the environment. They take in carbon dioxide and produce oxygen, which improves the air quality and helps the climate. They help prevent ground erosion, filter the air, can give off up to 35% oxygen and help reduce the temperature in the desert. They conserve water, hold back run-off and preserve soil. They return moisture to the air and help form rain clouds. Trees help stabilize the planet's ecosystem and help our health. Trees in the US provide 18.3 billion in annual value of air pollution removal. Of course, some trees are used for the wood and are useful for buildings and other projects. Let us stop putting in cactus and the kind of plants that require a great deal of water and talk to nurseries about the kind of trees best in the desert and which do not require as much water. Trees are very important to our lives so let us consider planting a tree.
