On August 6, Brittany Fonteno, President/CEO of *Planned Parenthood Arizona, Inc.* gave an excellent presentation for the United Women in Faith unit meeting. She highlighted the many services provided at the Arizona Health Center locations. Besides pregnancy/family planning, they offer routine yearly exams, Birth Control, STD diagnosis and treatment, and consultation on gender identity, sexual orientation and relationships. They do provide some services for men as well. The agency offers so much more than most people are aware! Because of the Supreme Court Decision and Arizona Attorney General follow up statement, Planned Parenthood has placed a hold on abortions in Arizona to protect the doctors, and other health care providers.

Those present were totally engaged and asked many questions following the formal address. Of particular interest during this election year are the actions of Planned Parenthood Advocates of Arizona, who are active at the State Capitol, and the existence of a list of endorsed candidates available on the Planned

Pastor's Corner

Wednesday musings...

First, I would like to thank all of you for your concern about the church finances. We had better income in August than we've been having. It doesn't solve our problems, but every bit helps. I pray it can continue.

Second, I walked into my house Sunday after church to the sound of Simon and Garfunkel:

So I'll continue to continue to pretend My life will never end And flowers never bend with the rainfall



That song sums up the meeting we had after church. We had about 30 people stay and discuss safety issues on campus. On the other hand, about 30 left and didn't stay. And so many seemed to be missing from worship that day. What does this say about us? Are we just continuing to continue, never addressing the fact that churches are closing right and left since COVID? Attendance is down across many denominations. And we have the added problem that we have not taken care of our property properly since before COVID, let alone during and after. Lack of pruning is destroying all our trees this year. Lack of air conditioners has ruined numerous supplies for our kids' programs. How long are we going to pretend our life as a congregation will never end?

Money is not the problem. Leadership is. Leadership that is courageous. Leadership that is seeking God. If we are doing God's will, God will provide. When I went to seminary I hung up a sign that said:

The Spirit of God will never lead you where the Grace of God cannot keep you.

Our job is to walk in the Spirit and Grace of God. Then the money will come. So will more people. But we need about 20 people to become leaders or to return to leadership. The few leaders we have are working hard and have been very faithful. We have tried not to fearmonger and scream "we need more money" or "we need more people." Rather, we have looked for positive actions we can take. But this group is few and tired.

If we are to find new sources of income after losing Terros and its building; if we are to make new connections with our neighbors; if we are to grow rather than die; we need fresh ideas and excited people. We could change to a single board governance so we didn't need so many people in leadership. Nor would we need so many meetings, which would be a blessing to our busy people. We could take a sum of money out of the Foundation to fix up our campus and hire out new positions around online ministry needs. We could make the hard decision to risk everything for our future. Isn't it time, wouldn't Jesus approve, if we adopted the vision that says:

"Life should not be a journey to the grave with the intention of arriving safely in an attractive and well preserved body, but rather skid in sideways, chocolate in one hand, wine in the other, body thoroughly used up, totally worn out and screaming "WOO HOO what a ride!"



Sustainable alert

A 2020 report from Can Manufacturers Institute shows that more than 80% of aluminum cans are turned back into beverage containers compared to 59% of glass bottles and 13% of plastic bottles. Recycling aluminum requires just 5% of the energy required for such work. Atlanta-based Novelis, the largest aluminum company in the world, plans to far exceed the 80 billion cans it already recycles every year. This is good news for the planet. A rate of 90% would eliminate 1.3 million tons of landfill materials and reduce CO 2 emissions by 12.1 million metric tons This leads to cleaner cities where people enjoy better health and a shared sense of purpose. And it has economic benefits.

CHILDRENS' MINISTRY

What a fun time we've had learning about Noah building an ark and all he had to do to obey God. As Noah built an ark, we learned how to build an igloo! I talked to the kids about how the ice blocks are used, and how it is important to get the sides just right to build a sturdy house. We used egg cartons to build our igloo.

Our topic during the month of August has been kindness. The children have joined in the discussions, and shared with me the outcomes when they went back to their classrooms on Mondays. We made a treasure box, added the names of all of their classmates, and then drew a name out each day. The task was to focus on one child at a time to be kind to. They are still talking about showing kindness in their schools.

In September we will be teaching the story of the vine and the branches. We will be joining with the rest of the church in this study, as Pastor Galene is doing a sermon series on John 15:1-8. We will use the teachings from Children's Moment, as well as stories and crafts in class, as we learn to be disciples of Jesus.


