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Pastor's Corner

What does Easter mean to you?

As kids, we think of Easter baskets, colored eggs, treats of various kinds. Maybe most kids got chocolate bunnies, but we go large filled eggs, like you can get from Sees. We often got new clothes to wear to church. There is a picture of me as a little girl in a hat, and maybe even gloves. As I got older, I still loved dressing up for Easter, wearing hats, and maybe having brunch or such. But Easter also was about resurrection and new life. But I couldn't wear a hat because it looked odd in the choir loft. And brunch? There were usually too many worship services to have time to make it to brunch.

Now, I am a pastor, and Easter means a lot of work and getting up early for an early morning service. I worry about how to make Holy Week services flow into meaningful Easter worship. I worry about the effects of Holy Week on the office staff and musicians. But I also know there is more to Easter than that. Now I understand the Easter is not just a day, but a season that follows Christ's death and resurrection, where Jesus gives us one more chance to realize the importance of what has happened.

Do you realize how many Easter songs are in the hymnal? I have often divided them up and begun each worship service with one of them, even the ones most people don't know. Did you know the Old Testament lesson is replaced with lessons from the Book of Acts. Some years, I make sure to read every one. Since the Easter season ends with Pentecost and the creation of the Church, I am also fond of doing Creeds and Statements of Faith, preparing people for that great celebration.

This year, I find myself wondering if there is a symbol that accurately represents Easter. Most people don't know the difference between a crucifix and the empty cross, so the cross doesn't seem like a good symbol for Easter. The empty tomb sounds appropriate, but it is difficult to represent in pictures and symbols. Flowers, especially from bulbs, baby animals, even eggs all can all to mind new life, but seem very secular. What should we do to make Easter and its season come alive for ourselves and for those outside the church?

Perhaps there is no one good symbol for Easter, so maybe I should quit looking for it. There is a saying, "growth is the only evidence of life." Since Easter is about life, maybe the only real way of showing people Easter is by living lives of growth, courage, and joy. Maybe we represent Easter best when we come through hard and deadly times into a world we still believe holds beauty, hope and love. Maybe, just maybe, the best way of celebrating Easter is by living every day as fully as possible, and letting others find Easter in us.



For the first time in a few years our January Income was close to Budgeted Income. We have switched to using a monthly basis for giving instead of using a per Sunday basis – i.e. ignoring whether it is a 4-Sunday or 5-Sunday month. The last couple of years, January giving was poor even for a 4-Sunday month even though they were 5-Sunday months. So, 2023 seemed to be off to a better start, but now it looks like February has caught that January effect. I certainly hope that March looks much better and gets us back on course.

We were originally looking at a deficit of \$45,000 for the year. If March does not look better, it's going to have a significant impact on us. We are continuing to adjust our costs as the year progresses, and we are making some progress there. At the same time, we are looking to add other sources of revenue to help with this shortfall. We are not in a unique position. Many other churches are dealing with the same challenges we are. As we noted before, we are participating in the Church Cartography Project, and we have fortunately been approached by a Pre-school that is interested in leasing space from us. This is not a done deal, but this is exactly the kind of thing that the Church Cartography effort is all about.

Today, Pastor Galene and I met with the Pastor and another staff member/church member at Cross Roads United Methodist Church. We are hoping we can continue to share ideas to mutual benefit.

I again appreciate that many of you have remained faithful in your giving. Thanks, again, for your prayers and financial support. If you have any questions or ideas, please feel free to contact me.

Cross in the Desert is Working Towards Partnering with Global Minds Preschool

Recently, Cross in the Desert was contacted by Adam Maynard of Global Minds Preschool and Academy. Global Minds is located in Scottsdale and teaches young children Mandarin and Spanish, since it is easier for children to learn foreign languages. They are ready to expand to another location and have asked to rent Guthrie.

There are many spaces available for preschools and daycares, but not many with good playground space. This is what led Adam to look at churches, finally leading him to Cross in the Desert. While Guthrie is an older building, our playground space is modern and needs little modification besides fencing more appropriate for a modern preschool. Meanwhile, Guthrie itself is a well designed building, though it is in need of maintenance and some modifications.

Global Minds is willing to make necessary improvements for compliance with current preschool rules, as long as we are willing to apply the cost of those improvements towards their rent. This would delay income to the church, but once improvement costs are paid back, the church would receive an estimated \$4,000 per month. Details and inspections are still being worked out.

If you hear of workdays to clean out Guthrie and the Fellowship Hall, this is so we can make space in Fellowship Hall for our children, until Guthrie is ready for children to return there. Once the preschool passes inspection, we can share the space, using it on Saturday and Sunday, while the preschool uses it during the week.

Please pray for both Cross in the Desert and Global Minds as we work towards hosting open houses over the summer, with the grand opening the beginning of August.
