Are you as struck as I am by the simplicity of this? What if everything we need to do grow deeper and more faithful to the call to bring love and hope to the world can be summed up in these three things rather than volumes of religious rules?

During the month of August, we will be looking at these concepts. We will take each one and ask ourselves these three questions:

What does that mean for me?

What does that mean for my community?

What does that mean for the world?

What we learn during our lives is not just meant for us, despite what we might have been told. Our gifts, talents, and love are meant to be used for the betterment of the world around us, and we must be good stewards of what we have been given.

For example, doing no harm can also mean treating ourselves kindly so that we can be who God created us to be for the world's benefit.

Opportunities!


There are several ways for someone to participate on the worship team here at Cross in the Desert. Here are a few that require very little time commitment.

Trustees Report

The board of trustees has been hard at work this month. We had to have some repairs done on some of our A/C Units. Did you know that there are 17 A/C Units on our campus? There has been record breaking heat this summer, and some of the units have been struggling to keep us cool. We are actively searching for a company to provide preventative maintenance for the units on campus.

Our copier contract lease was expiring, and research was done to select a provider who would give us the best product for our needs. We signed a contract with Toshiba for a new 5 year lease, and our new copier was delivered on July 17th. Please contact the office if you use the copier and would like training on the new machine.

Thank you for bearing with us, and volunteering your help, as we searched for a new janitorial service. We have engaged TJ Pro Cleaners, and they will be starting on August 8th. They specialize in cleaning churches and come highly recommended by North Scottsdale UMC and Paradise Valley UMC. Cleaning will be done on Tuesdays.

We are still experiencing leaks in the irrigation system. The big leak near the patio has been repaired, but we have noticed smaller leaks. If you see a leak, please notify the office or one of the trustees.

We are running lower than planned on our income/giving, but we have also been running lower on expenses primarily due to the loss of our janitorial services and adjustments to our plans for staffing. Those latter adjustments have meant that the congregation and existing staff have had to pull extra duty, but efforts are underway to get some of those addressed soon.

I've been reworking the budget for the second half of the year due to Pastor Gina only being ¾ time and making some slight downward adjustments to expected income/giving. Assuming we have no significant, unexpected changes to giving or to expenses and with the additional help we've had from Conference and Foundation, we're looking to break even for the rest of the year. That still leaves us not paying anything on Apportionment. We are planning to have another Luminarias event this year where the proceeds will go toward Apportionment.

We have signed a Letter of Intent with Global Minds Preschool. We're busy emptying out the Guthrie Building so they can begin work. Our current expectation is that the monthly lease will bring in \$4500/month or \$54,000/year. However, they estimate they will have expenses of about \$49,000 which we intend to pay back to them through a 50% rent reduction until that is paid back to them.

Thanks, again, for your prayers and financial support. I really feel like we're starting to see some light at the end of the tunnel from where we've been. If you have any questions or ideas, please feel free to contact me.
