Random Thoughts During Easter Time

During the Easter season, we in the church celebrate new life. However, do you realize new life is another way of saying change? To be honest, I don't always celebrate change/new life. Sometimes I am resentful. How about you?

I think it was 2008 that the pastor of Prescott Valley UMC reported they couldn't pay her salary. She had to be moved and it appeared the Annual Conference was going to close the church. Church members pleaded for a chance at life. The bishop appointed a retired pastor there $\frac{1}{4}$ time. Today, they not only have a full time pastor, they have two retired pastors volunteering right alongside the regular members, keeping the church vital. Bet you didn't know both retired pastors served CITD: Rev. Gary Simons – 1978 – 1982, and Rev. Mel Munchinsky – 2008 – 2013.

When people who aren't attending the church right now ask if Cross in the Desert is going to close, is dying, or some other such anxious thoughts, respond: "Like people, I suppose all churches eventually die, but that day is not today! Come join us!"

The brief version:

Early Fall 2013: I fell down an up escalator, breaking a vertebrae and rupturing two disks in my lower back.

Late Spring 2014: my husband lost his job, the entire division terminated.

Spring 2015 – August 2015: One son in a major accident with medical and legal consequences.

However, husband found job that summer. I tried to quit holding my breath.

May 2016: Asked for renewal leave in September. Approved by SPRC, but not by DS.

2018: move to Yuma. Couldn't sell house.

2019: move within Yuma. Finally sold house in Surprise at a loss.

2020: move to Phoenix during COVID. It was like we all lost our church family. I couldn't go to the hospital, to homes, do memorials, etc. I couldn't preach to real people.

So, after dealing with all this stuff, after being in ministry since August 1997, after wondering if I will ever feel normal again, I am finally taking a renewal leave. It is time for me to discover my next new life. I will be gone from April 26th until June 7th. I want to travel, go to museums, sit and listen to ocean waves, or the wind in the forest. Then, I look forward to seeing you all again with a smile on my face and a lightness in my step.



March was an improvement over February, but it was still under plan. It does look like Easter has April off to a good start so we will hopefully see improvement in April. We have reduced staffing expenses to some degree, and we have asked the Foundation for some additional help to make ends meet. As we noted before, we have fortunately been approached by a Pre-school that is interested in leasing space from us. This is not a done deal, but it is continuing to progress, just more slowly than both sides would like. If it does happen, this will certainly help us in the long run, but it will be somewhat of a transition as an initially reduced lease will be likely to compensate them for the initial investment.

S stands for surrender

Where do we go to ask for help? Asking God in prayer is powerful. In asking others, choose people who will listen and not judge and only offer advice or help when asked.



Desert Southwest Conference News

Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ!

With this letter, I hereby call the regular session of the Desert Southwest Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church to meet on June 15-17, 2023, in a hybrid format: in person at the Mesa Convention Center or online. Information is now available at https://dscumc.org/annual-conference. I especially call your attention to the due dates for registration and other submissions and invite you to please abide by these to aid in the continuing work of planning the conference and prevent undue stress on our staff and volunteers. I trust you will do this as beloved members of our covenant community.

Our theme this year is **#WeAre: Wrestling, Engaging, Rising**, based on the story of Jacob in Genesis 32 and 33, and the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus in Luke 22-24. To say that the past year was difficult is an understatement, for we have been in an extended, extremely challenging season that spans more than three years.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to be with us, and while we are slowly coming out of it, we are certainly grappling with its long-term effects in multiple facets of our personal and communal lives.

- Systemic racism and white supremacy continue to plague our society and our church and harm our BIPOC siblings.
- While scheduled for May 2024 after numerous postponements, the continued delay in holding the 2020 General Conference continues to bring harm to our LGBTQIA+ siblings.
- The disaffiliation of churches from our ranks and the misinformation and disinformation that has accompanied some of these conversations has adversely affected our connection and our witness.

As a result of these and other concerns, our church is splintering, and our relationships are frayed and falling apart. Many are feeling isolated, disconnected, and alone. Trust towards each other is low. And so, our theme is a prayer and a declaration that **we are**, as a covenant community of faith, coming together to continue **wrestling** with our current realities and concerns in order to begin **engaging** in conversations that will lead to healing and wholeness so that we may together be on a path towards **rising** to face the new day that God invites us all to with hope and joy!

I am so excited to be with all of you for what will be my first ever annual conference session to preside at as bishop and my first with you! May the Holy Spirit work in our minds and our hearts, even now, as we prepare for this important work of holy conferencing.
