






The Prayer Team would like for you to join us in prayer from Labor Day to Election Day.

Dinner & Dialogue

The final Dinner & Dialogue of the 2024 season was held on October 24 with a very timely topic -Maintaining Your Peace During Election Season. The presenters were Dawn Farmer and Sharon Hornbeck. Dawn Farmer is a pastor at Desert Springs Bible Church with over 20 years of ministry experience. She holds a Master's in Marriage and Family Therapy, with specialized training in trauma care. Dawn has a heart for helping people navigate conflict, manage stress, and strengthen their emotional resilience. Through a blend of biblical wisdom and practical tools. she guides individuals with compassion and insight. Whether in a church setting or through therapy, Dawn encourages a gentle approach—beginning with selfcompassion and awareness, and leading to practical steps that can be woven into everyday life. Sharon Hornbeck is a a certified Spiritual Director who provides trauma informed and diversity sensitive care for her directees as the journey toward a closer relationship with God.

Since we all have felt the effects of this year's very divisive campaign through countless ads, texts, emails, etc, we were all grateful to have the opportunity to process our feelings. Dawn and Sharon presented a few meditations and centering methods to relieve the anxiety and fears surrounding the election process.



Our own Pastor Gina is the chairperson of the WARM committee of the Desert Southwest Conference! WARM means WELCOMING, AFFIRMING, RECONCILING MINISTRIES. She represented the DSC at the Phoenix Pride Festival October 19th and 20th at Steele Indian School Park.





Desert Southwest Conference News

The Clergy & Lay Leadership Development team will host this Leadership Talk via Zoom, featuring *Bishop Karen Oliveto*, on **November 11, 2024**, at **7 p.m.** (MST) Arizona time.

Karen Oliveto is a retired bishop in The United Methodist Church. She has served in local church and campus ministries in rural and urban settings in NY and California. She holds a BA, MPhil, and PhD from Drew University and MDiv from the Pacific School of Religion, where she also served as Associate Dean of Academic Affairs and adjunct professor of United Methodist Studies. She has also taught as an adjunct professor at Brite, Drew, Iliff, and Yale.

She has written several books, including Talking About Homosexuality (co-authored with Kelly Turney and Tracy West) (Pilgrim Press: 2005), Our Strangely Warmed Hearts (Abingdon: 2018), and Together at the Table (Westminster John Knox, 2018).

Prior to her election as bishop, Oliveto was the lead pastor at the 12,000 member Glide Memorial Church in San Francisco. At that time, she was the only woman serving as lead pastor in any of the top 100 membership churches in the UMC. She is also the first openly lgbtq+ person to be elected to the episcopacy. She currently resides with her wife in Nova Scotia, Canada.

Her talk will address:

What is prophetic leadership? What is required of one who seeks to move a community to embrace prophetic ministries that produce personal and communal transformation while challenging unjust powers and principalities? How does one encourage a congregation to "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God"?

One cannot be an effective prophetic leader without a pastoral heart that gets close enough to those entrusted to one's care to be disturbed by the forces of death that keep people enslaved. Likewise, if one has deep pastoral engagements, one will be compelled to ease the suffering of those whose lives are impacted by unjust forces.

A prophetic leader is a person of faith who feels a deep call to be prophetic in a particular situation, time and place; understands the biblical prophetic tradition; insightfully analyzes the present situation; imagines and projects possible futures; and seeks shalom and justice in the congregation and community of which they are a part. This webinar will assist participants as they explore their prophetic voice and pastoral heart.
