

We are off to a good start in our Together We Can Capital Campaign with over \$125,000 received, approved, and pledged which is 58% of our goal, and we've still not heard from most of you.

Please consider giving what you can whenever you can even if you don't feel you can commit to a pledge. One-time gifts or just giving a little when you are able will make a difference. Just \$25/week through October, November, and December would be \$325 which with the matching grant would become \$650.

Pledging obviously gives us a better forecast, though. Pledging and giving \$100/month from October 2024 through December 2026 becomes \$2700 and with the matching grant becomes \$3000. Every little bit really does help! You can also start your pledge in the future. Some have said they can't commit anything this year but could for 2025 and 2026. You can indicate that on your pledge form.




The Prayer Team would like for you to join us in prayer from Labor Day to Election Day.

LET'S TALK ABOUT JESUS....

MATT. 14:3-4 For Herod had laid hold of John and bound him and put him in prison for the sake of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife. For John had said to him, "It is not lawful for you to have her."

John was thrown into prison and ultimately beheaded because he said something Herod didn't like. Would we be that brave today? Or are we afraid to speak the truth so as not to offend anyone or are we so weak that we bow to political correctness?

Granted, our culture has changed a great deal since John's time. It's changed a great deal in our own lifetime. Think of all the things that have changed in the last 100 years or 50 years or even 25 years.

But, there is one thing that never changes. - **GOD -** God's word is as true now as it was in John's time. God declared universal values to the world and He desires all people to follow them.

In the Scriptures there are 7 issues that God says are important and therefore since they are important to him then they best be important to us. Although, there is probably something here to offend everyone, here we go-Sanctity of Life; Sexual values; Holiness of marriage; Caring for the poor/needy; Religious liberty; Strangers in the land; Creation-care - being good stewards. So, what do you think? Are these just political issues for Christians to avoid? Will Christians be crashing the party to speak the truth about these issues?

October 6, 1774: I met those of our society who have votes in the ensuing election, and advised them

- 1. To vote, without fee or reward, for the person they judged most worthy
 - 2. To speak no evil of the person they voted against, and
- 3. To take care their spirits were not sharpened against those that voted on the other side.

Can you imagine how pleasant elections would be, if we all followed Wesley's advice?

Oh, glorious and gracious God, we need your guidance and wisdom. Our country and its people are hurting and scared. Help us to take seriously what you take seriously. Help us to put personal feelings aside and follow you in all things. May we be strong and speak the truth according to your word. Oh, mighty God, bless America. Amen.



Apportionment giving is based upon the desire to meet the needs of God's family NOT just in our neighborhoods, but around the world. Apportionments are also based on our need to give in order to be spiritually healthy, complete children of God.

We send the Apportionment funds out of our blessing that Christ might be known in transformative ways. Apportionments provide avenues for giving so that we can be strong local

churches & annual conferences and a strong connection throughout the world as we seek to be in mission and ministry together. The funds demonstrate our connectedness to one another, to God and to the body of Christ.

Apportionments are the way that congregations are connected to the conference and the world. Apportionments are used to fund the global mission and witness of our church, to help provide the necessary structure to respond in moments of crisis locally, nationally, internationally, and to develop and nurture the leaders we need today and tomorrow.

The basic idea behind apportionments is that local congregations send some of the money they collect to accomplish things that are either beyond their ability to do as individual congregations or that can be done more effectively or efficiently together. Apportionments allow the church to produce goods and services funded by all for the benefit of all – collective goods.

Apportionments denote an understanding that the purpose of the church is not just to care for its own members but also to reach out beyond itself to engage with the world, to minister to the world, to be in mission to the world.

Apportionments are not to be considered "special gifts," but rather, they are similar to our tithes that we give to our local church.

Connectional Giving demonstrates our connectedness to one another, to God and to the body of Christ. The connections of the church are more than institutions; the connections are the means God uses to convey grace to the world. It is one of the founding ideas that the United Methodist Church was built upon. Participating in connectional giving helps us to be in mission with people and congregations around the world - giving every church, regardless of size, a larger mission footprint.

When we give, we have the power and potential of a scale of impact that no single church could have on its own.

Apportionments allow us to do together what no church, district, or annual conference could do alone.

With over 12 million members working in 136 countries, The United Methodist Church's global reach is made possible through these 7 funds: <u>World Service Fund</u>, <u>Episcopal Fund</u>, <u>Ministerial Education Fund</u>, <u>Black College Funds</u>, <u>General Administration Fund</u>, <u>Africa University Fund</u> and <u>Interdenominational Cooperation Fund</u>.

<u>The Advance for Christ and His Church</u> (The Advance) is the United Methodist program for designated mission giving and serves as the leading conduit that allows churches, individuals and organizations to support missionaries and projects throughout the world in order to strengthen and sustain one another.

How would John Wesley vote?

<u>The United Methodist Board of Church and Society</u> isn't trying to tell you who to vote for, but the folks there definitely want you to think it over carefully, with the help of information they are providing about United Methodist values.

On Nov. 5, Americans will elect a president, as well as some members of Congress and state legislatures, governors in 11 states and judgeships. There also are ballot measures to consider.

"(Church and Society's) mission is not to take positions on any election," said the Rev. Kendal L. McBroom, director of civil and human rights at the denomination's advocacy agency. "United Methodists are more than welcome to become better acquainted with the Social Principles and juxtapose those with the campaign platforms.

"Individuals (should) make their vote from their conscience and faith, holding to the fact their votes are, in fact, sacred."

The board released its <u>Voter Toolkit: "Sacred Votes — A Guide to Election Participation, Justice and Social Transformation"</u> on Sept. 4, with tips on how United Methodists can do their civic duty in line with the denomination's priorities as set forth in its Social Principles. The toolkit was compiled by Church and Society, the <u>Baltimore-Washington Conference</u> and <u>United Methodist Strengthening the Black Church for the 21st Century</u>

John Wesley, Methodism's founder, spoke out against the exploitation of poor people, slavery and other abuses. While the Social Principles are not church law, they are intended to represent "the prayerful and earnest efforts of the General Conference to speak to issues in the contemporary world from a sound biblical and theological foundation that is in keeping with the best of our United Methodist traditions," according to the preface in the document adopted by the 2024 General Conference in Charlotte, North Carolina.

"We share the stances that the church has voted on and adapted — be that criminal justice, reparations, education reform, civic engagement and all of those things," McBroom said.

Other issues addressed include urging the government to effectively tackle poverty, climate change, physical and mental health care, addiction, war and promotion of civil and human rights.

It is illegal under IRS rules for the church to endorse specific candidates.
