

## **New Lending Closet for Durable Medical Equipment Coming Soon**

Have you noticed all the walkers, wheelchairs, etc. that seem to sprout up around our campus? Do you have similar equipment at your home that you no longer need? Have you or a loved one experienced a need for temporary use of some sort of medical equipment but didn't have what you needed?

To help our church members, as well as community members, a new lending closet is being set up to coordinate both the lending and receipt of donations of medical equipment. Maintaining a lending closet of medical equipment not only provides for unmet needs, but it helps care for our planet by giving new life to items that can be safely shared with others. Donated equipment should be clean and in good working condition. The following items are appropriate for donation:

Wheelchairs

Walkers

Canes

Crutches

**Knee-rollers** 

**Walking Boots** 

**Shower Chairs** 

**Toilet Risers** 

Other items may be accepted on a case-by-case basis

We ask that donations NOT be left at the church without approval of the lending closet coordinator. Each potential donation will be assessed to ensure it is clean, safe, and an item that is likely to be of use. The lending closet coordinator or designee will be available approximately once a quarter following worship to receive and assess potential donations. The first date for receiving donations will be June 22<sup>nd</sup> following worship. So, start checking your closet for items you have been planning to donate to the church and bring them on June 22<sup>nd</sup>.

By mid-June, Individuals may access the lending closet, located in the church office area, and check out needed items by completing the borrowers sheet found in the closet. When the borrower is finished with the item, they should return it to the lending closet to the designated return area. The coordinator will assess and clean each returned item to ensure it is ready for use again.

In addition to loaning equipment from the lending closet, wheelchairs will be staged in strategic locations around campus for use in emergencies. These wheelchairs will be identified as non-loaners and a staging area for them will be indicated with a small sign. Wheelchairs should remain in the designated locations and should not be moved unless needed for an emergency.


## June 1 is Orange Bag Pickup Sunday

Join us at Mission u as we learn about "Practicing Hope Together". This theme will explore the hope that emerged within a small community of followers after the resurrection of Jesus that changed the world. Out of so much confusion and fear following the crucifixion of Jesus, grew a "Resurrection People" steeped in hope who began living out their faith in powerful ways.

How do we understand hope as followers of Christ? Is it merely optimism despite what we witness all around us or is it something deeper than that? This theme begins with the resurrection appearances of Jesus to explore how these people were changed and the actions that followed (Acts). What does it mean to be "resurrection people" in the 21st century, and what can we learn and apply to our own lives from the accounts of people who encountered Jesus after his resurrection? This study will explore what it means to have hope in God even when things seem to be falling apart.

The Adult Study is – Practicing Hope by Tabatha Holle – The curriculum will explore hope, particularly when hope seems hard to find. The curriculum asks questions such as: What is hope in the face of neofascism? What is hope in a time of genocide? How do we imagine a future for the next generation as our planet grows hotter by the season? What tools do we have to face these hard realities? How does Christ teach us to embody hope when our backs are against the wall?

This study's purpose is to allow all of our communities to cultivate hope that is honest about our current conditions (refugia), hope that is restorative when everything feels urgent (rest), and hope that is possible even when we transgress (repair).

Phoenix, AZ—The Desert Southwest Conference of The United Methodist Church, Phoenix Art Museum, and Phoenix Theatre Company announce a landmark collaboration to embark on a 99-year lease of the existing Central United Methodist Church property located at 1875 North Central Avenue in Phoenix. The partnership, now entering its final negotiations, will ensure the preservation of the historic church property located adjacent to the shared cultural campus occupied by the Theatre Company and Museum while providing for an opportunity to expand parking availability for cultural patrons and to expand the historic cultural campus at the northeast corner of Central Avenue and McDowell Road. The long-term lease provides for the care of the church sanctuary to remain accessible to the community, and enables the Theatre Company and Museum to revitalize the property to expand cultural offerings in the region. The Conference, Theatre Company, and Museum have retained the services of Gensler to create a strategic vision for the future of the campus. The three organizations will communicate more extensive details regarding future plans for the campus in the coming months.

"The planned lease creates a foundation for generational impact, allowing for programming, performance, education, and public engagement that will uplift the spirits of creativity and inclusivity for decades to come," said Vincent VanVleet, executive director of Phoenix Theatre Company. "This lease cements our collective vision for a vibrant, collaborative arts campus that not only honors the legacy of the space but also ignites new opportunities for creativity, accessibility and shared community. It's a rare and powerful moment to build something today that will serve generations tomorrow."

"This extraordinary partnership allows us to shape a cultural ecosystem where art, performance, and the city's spiritual heritage intersect. This collaboration represents and reflects our deep belief that collaboration is essential to sustaining and enriching the cultural fabric of Phoenix, while ensuring a meaningful and positive visitor experience and increasing access to visitors from across the county and beyond," said Jeremy Mikolajczak, the Sybil Harrington Director and CEO of Phoenix Art Museum.

The Central United Methodist Church has been a neighbor to the Phoenix Civic Center, the campus that includes Phoenix Theatre Company, Phoenix Art Museum, and previously, Central Library. The Civic Center was made possible through the donation of 6.5 acres located at Central and McDowell by Marie Bartlett Heard and Dwight B. Heard, who envisioned a civic center that would serve as the cultural heart of the growing city. Phoenix Theatre Company, originally Phoenix Little Theatre, was founded in 1920, and moved to its present location in 1924. The Phoenix Civic Center municipal cultural complex was first established in its current form in 1951 with the opening of Phoenix Theatre Company's mainstage theatre. Phoenix Art Museum completed construction and first opened on the site in 1959. The history of the Central United Methodist Church spans across three centuries. The first Protestant church in Phoenix, the congregation first met under mesquite trees along the Salt River, before moving to a building in 1904, an expanded campus near Downtown Phoenix in 1926, and finally to its present home since 1950. In 2024, the congregation concluded its service, following the official vote of closure by the Desert Southwest Annual Conference. Since that time, the Desert Southwest Conference has explored a new path forward to preserve the campus's rich heritage, and to utilize the campus to continue to enrich the lives of its community. The result of those efforts culminates in the announcement of this forthcoming partnership.

"This partnership is a reflection of what's possible when faith, arts, and community come together," said Rev. Rachel Gilmore, Director of New and Vital Faith for the Desert Southwest Conference. "It honors the legacy of Central United Methodist Church while reimagining its future as a sacred and creative gathering place for generations to come."
