From The Pulpit

Embracing Christ's Blueprint: A Path to Uniting Leadership and Humanity

Today, we explore a blueprint for leadership that brings people together rather than tears them apart. One Sunday afternoon I visited a member of my congregation in the hospital, and because of her medications, she didn't recognize me. I figured out later that she thought I was her wayward nephew. After our greeting I told her I had just come from church, and she said, "You went to church!" And then, without missing a heartbeat, she said, "You know I don't like the new pastor as much as I do the old pastor."

This parishioner followed the accepted blueprint for leadership that inevitably compares one leader with another based on expectations of what that leader is supposed to do. The same was true for the original followers of Christ. When the bad guys killed their leader on the cross, they took his life and shredded their blueprint for leadership based on their expectations.

To appreciate Christ's wisdom on leadership we must doubt the current map of leadership tearing us apart. Our current blueprint must produce winners and losers. This is the story of human history. One group battles another, led by someone they believe will give them what they want. Our ugly history repeats itself because of our views on leadership.

So, what makes Christ different? Our leadership map promises to fix our external situation. Leaders manipulate us with promises to restore a mythical past or lead us into a problem-free future. We then polarize over these contrasting blueprints.

Christ is more interested in addressing our internal situation. He is asking us, "What is your blueprint doing to your humanity?" Both political parties today claim that Christ is on their side, but neither allows Christ to claim them. Would Christ support the hate we see coming from the red blueprint or the blue blueprint? Christ's wisdom offers us a better humanity, not the endless recycling of divisive blueprints that make us ugly on the inside.

But does it work in the real world? Gandhi, Mandela, and Martin Luther King Jr. made it work because they followed the blueprint of Christ, who commanded us to love our enemies. Shirley Chisholm, a black presidential candidate from Brooklyn, New York, made a choice to show love to her enemy, paralyzed by an assassination attempt. He was the racist Alabama Governor George Wallace, whose blueprint said, "segregation now, segregation tomorrow, segregation forever!" She visited him in the hospital and showed him compassion. This encounter changed him, and he abandoned his prior segregation strategy. He had a new blueprint and a better humanity that made a difference in the world. May we adopt the blueprint of a better humanity.
