Hollywood blockbuster. Let's meet the cast.

A single event on a single day changed the world. It was October 31, 1517. Brother Martin, a monk and a scholar, had struggled for years with his church, the church in Rome. He had been greatly disturbed by an unprecedented indulgence sale. The story has all the makings of a



First, there is the young bishop - too young by church laws - Albert of Mainz. Not only was he bishop over two bishoprics, he desired an additional archbishopric over Mainz. This, too, was against church laws. So Albert appealed to the pope in Rome, Leo X. From the De Medici family, Leo X greedily allowed his tastes to exceed his financial resources. Enter the artists and sculptors, Raphael and Michelangelo.

When Albert of Mainz appealed for a papal dispensation, Leo X was ready to deal. Albert, with the papal blessing, would sell indulgences for past, present, and future sins. All of this sickened the monk Martin Luther. Can we buy our way into heaven? Luther had to speak out.

But why October 31? November 1 held a special place in the church calendar as All Saints' Day. On November 1, 1517, a massive exhibit of newly acquired relics would be on display at Wittenberg, Luther's home city. Pilgrims would come from all over, genuflect before the relics, and take hundreds, if not thousands, of years off time in purgatory. Luther's soul grew even more vexed. None of this seemed right.

Martin Luther, a scholar, took quill in hand, dipped it in his inkwell and penned his Ninety-Five Theses on October 31, 1517. These were intended to spark a debate, to stir some soul-searching among his fellow brothers in the church. The Ninety-Five Theses sparked far more than a debate. The Ninety-Five Theses also revealed the church was far beyond rehabilitation. It needed a reformation. The church - and the world - would never be the same.

One of Luther's Ninety-Five Theses simply declares, "The Church's true treasure is the gospel of Jesus Christ." That alone is the meaning of Reformation Day. The church had lost sight of the gospel because it had long ago papered over the pages of God's Word with layer upon layer of tradition. Mere tradition often brings about systems of works, of earning your way back to God. It was true of the Pharisees, and it was true of medieval Roman Catholicism. Didn't Christ Himself say, "My yoke is easy and My burden is light"? Reformation Day celebrates the joyful beauty of the liberating gospel of Jesus Christ.

What is Reformation Day? It is the day the light of the gospel broke forth out of darkness. It was the day that began the Protestant Reformation. It was a day that led to Martin Luther, John Calvin, John Knox, and many other Reformers helping the church

find its way back to God's Word as the only supreme authority for faith and life and leading the church back to the glorious doctrines of justification by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone. It kindled the fires of missionary endeavors, it led to hymn writing and congregational singing, and it led to the centrality of the sermon and preaching for the people of God. It is the celebration of a theological, ecclesiastical, and cultural transformation.

So we celebrate Reformation Day. This day reminds us to be thankful for our past and to the monk turned Reformer. What's more, this day reminds us of our duty, our obligation, to keep the light of the gospel at the center of all we do.

What is believed to be the first significant anniversary observance in 25 years took successfully place on October 31 at Eden. Ken Bakkum, annivers-ry chairman and his committee, is to be commended for a fine job.

Adding to the occasion was the speaking of Fastor Bob Wilch, Attorney Uno Heggblom, the prescence of 352 worshippers during the day, the historical booklet, and climaxed by a full house of 310 persons at the banquet at Central school. So many people and so much time went into the success of this milestone.

The Methodist WSCS served a delicious meal at the banquet, the rather lengthy program was spiced by a toastmaster art Neiman's pastoral puns. Seven visiting clergymen were present including in good neighborly fashion Fathers Emil Beyer and Robert Matchett of Sacred Heart.

as the Bancroft Dairy building.) H. B. Freeman was the notary public. Those signing the documents of incorporation were Johan Anderson, J. Alfred Anderson, Anton Bjornstad, Axel Carlson, Aaron Ebbeson, John Olson, Oscar E. Olson and John E. Strand.

It was decided that there should be three deacons and three trustees. The first deacons were Oscar E. Olson, Axel E. Carlson and J. Alfred Anderson. The first trustees were Anton Bjornstad, John E. Strand and John Peterson.

The first Sunday church school was officially organized on November 25, 1906. The first superintendent was A. B. Carlson, and the teachers were Oscar E. Olson, Mrs. O. K. Johansson, Axel Carlson, and student A. B. Carlson. On December 16, the new church organ which the Ladies Aid had purchased was dedicated. Alva Karlson, for a sallary of \$100 annually, was the first organist. The dues for members were set at 50 cents per month per couple, or 25 cents a month for single persons. Services were held in the Swedish Baptist Church, located where the new Central School now exists.

The Church Building was Started

A building committee was selected which was composed of John Olson, Axel E. Carlson, J. Alfred Anderson, John E. Strand and Pastor Ekeberg. Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company donated a corner lot, at Onota and Spruce Streets. This generous transaction took place in 1907. The cornerstone service was held on August 25, 1907, with Pastor F. A. Johnson of Galesburg, Illinois, as guest preacher in Swedish and English. A church building measuring 45 ft. by 30 ft. was being planned. A loan of \$2,200 was negotiated by the trustees from The First National Bank on December 16, 1907. The church was built out of cement block. The first service was held on Christmas, 1907, in the new church. Sunday worship in 1907, and some time to follow, was held every other Sunday, and every Thursday evening. The pastor had quarters in the sacristy when he was in Munising. On alternate Sundays he was in Skandia.
