
Memorial Day - a lost lament

Six hundred years before the birth of Jesus, in response to Exile in Babylon, Jeremiah wrote, "A voice is heard in Ramah, lamentation and bitter weeping. Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more" (Jeremiah 31:15).

These same words would appear again in <u>Matthew's</u> <u>Gospel</u> after Herod sent in troops to slaughter children in Bethlehem in hope of killing Jesus. They are the lament of a nation whose children have been killed. They are the cries of mothers whose children have died way before their time.



All too often young people are sent into the front lines of battle. Thousands of miles away, back home parents worry. When news of fighting comes on the news, they find an uneasiness that refuses to be put to rest. In the back of their minds they wonder, "Will my child come home alive?" There are few reunions happier than those of families reunited after time away at war. There are few sorrows deeper than when there is a knock on the door and someone says your son or daughter will not be coming home at all. We expect our children to stand at our graves as we are returned to the earth. We do not expect to mourn at their graves as they are lowered into the ground.

The church may be one place left where real voice can be given to the pain that people suffer and the grief to which Memorial Day points.

Memorial Day started out as a way of decorating the graves of fallen soldiers after the Civil War - a way of remembering that with war comes death. Officially declared a national holiday in 1971, Memorial Day was a big deal in many communities. Everything was closed. There was a parade and the Scouts, school bands and community groups all marched through the community and out to the cemetery on the edge of town. The fact that the parade ended with a program, a 21-gun salute and the sounding of "Taps" at the cemetery added a sense of solemnity to the occasion. The parade was as much a procession to the graveyard as it was a parade of its own.

Today, Memorial Day is most often viewed as the unofficial start of summer. It is a day for picnics, boating and other outdoor activities. People look forward to it with a lot of anticipation since, for many, it is the first three-day weekend in a few months. Plus, it is the first one where people across the country can count on warm weather and a chance to spend an extra day off outside since last Labor Day. Sadly, most people barely notice that it is a day about death and the cost of war.

Throughout centuries of history, the Bible gave voice to <u>the laments</u> of people whose children had died as the collateral damage of the decisions of others. Grounded in Scripture, the church may be one place left where real voice can be given to the pain that people suffer and the grief to which Memorial Day points.

It may not be a religious holiday or a day that has any significance in the church year. But Memorial Day is a day of lost laments. It has fallen through the cracks of boating and picnics. The church is called to reflect, remember and pray that the last graves of the fallen have been filled. It is unlikely to be true. But as God's people, Memorial Day's lament calls the church to pray that it might be so one day soon.

Mothering God: A Reflection on Mother's Day in Worship

Mothering God, you gave me birth in the bright morning of this world. Creator, source of ev'ry breath, you are my rain, my wind, my sun. "Mothering God, you gave me birth," *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, 735



When I gave birth to our daughter Cecilia, I was still in seminary and serving as the youth director at St. John's Lutheran Church in Zanesville, Ohio. Needless to say, it was a full and challenging time as my husband Zeb and I balanced our jobs, my education, and our halting, on-the-job education in parenting. One of the clearest things I remember is the exhaustion. In the first months of Ceci's life, I was convinced I'd never sleep again.

Thankfully, our St. John's community was a great source of strength and support for us. The parishioners delighted in Cecilia's birth and helped us in countless ways, from simply holding her during worship to bringing us meals and offering to babysit. The congregation nurtured us through this time of transition, and we will be forever thankful for such a gift.

Still, St. John's is not unique in this regard. Many churches do a wonderful job of welcoming and supporting families. As Mother's Day nears, congregations are once again preparing to bless and honor the mothers in their midst. Because I've served five different churches, I've seen mothers recognized in worship in various ways. I have even heard entire sermons devoted to Mother's Day, though there is nothing in the lessons to warrant such preaching.

It is critical to be aware that Mother's Day is not joyful for everyone. Remember the diverse and complex life stories of your people. The couples struggling with infertility. The children and adults whose mothers have died tragically. Those who have been hurt by or have strained relationships with their mothers. Women who cannot or chose not to have children, but have been endlessly told by contemporary culture that only motherhood can truly fulfill them. Families with two fathers. Women struggling with post-partum depression.

All of this is complicated by our cultural determination to "romanticize" motherhood, which makes it difficult for mothers to talk openly about their challenges without feeling ashamed. In other words, if we fail to be thoughtful in our worship planning, a variety of women, men, and children might feel hurt or excluded when we intend exactly the opposite.

Yet: The commandments tell us to honor our parents, and the desire to bless mothers is good and Christ-like. It is an impulse that springs from a place of love. If we ignore it altogether in worship on the grounds that it is a secular holiday and not part of our liturgical calendar, then we risk conveying the implicit message that reasons for celebration in people's everyday lives don't matter to the church; we risk conveying the harmful belief that the Christian faith is disconnected from the world beyond our sanctuary walls.

This year, then, as we celebrate Christ's resurrection on the seventh Sunday of Easter consider how your congregation might recognize mothers in ways that are sensitive, inclusive, and faithful to your context. Perhaps this means focusing more on the *act* of mothering, or lifting up Biblical images of our mothering God (see Isaiah 49.14-16 and 66:13, or Luke 13:34). The petition for mothers in the Prayers of Intercession is also appropriate and poignant (Sundays and Seasons, Sunday May 13, 2018). Above all, pray that everyone who gathers for worship on this day will encounter Jesus' unfailing, all-embracing love.
