#### Chasing a Mirage or Soaking in a Miracle

In *The Twilight Zone* episode "A Nice Place to Visit," petty criminal Rocky Valentine dies and wakes up in a luxurious afterlife where he gets everything he wants. He wins every jackpot at the casino, and every woman finds him desirable. At first, he revels in his newfound "heaven." But as time passes, Rocky realizes that winning the roulette wheel every time is meaningless. There's no challenge, no joy—just an endless void. When he asks to go to "the other place," his guide reveals the twist: he's already in hell, where endless gratification is his eternal punishment.

Rocky's story is a warning. Chasing external satisfaction—things that promise happiness but can never deliver—leaves us empty. It's a vivid reminder that true fulfillment doesn't come from chasing the next big win but from something deeper.

We've been reflecting on the Lord's Prayer and have found that the reward of prayer is always present, always available. The reward is not some future prize; it's the

presence of God in the **now.** This raises an interesting question: If we already have the thing we most need—the presence of God—why pray at all? Where is the challenge in that?

Last week, we got a clue. When we say, "Our Father," we aren't just praying for ourselves. We are bringing others into this experience of God's presence. Prayer is not about adding to our emptiness; it's about sharing from the fullness we've already received. And so, the most important thing we can ask for is not a specific request but an **awareness** of God's presence, here and now.

Before making any requests in prayer, take a moment to fill up with God's presence. Jesus said to go into your room, shut the door, and pray to your Father in secret. Find a quiet space, take a few deep breaths, and focus on this simple truth: "God, you are here. And that is enough." Rest in that awareness, letting God's love fill you. Then, when you pray, pray from fullness—not emptiness—and let your prayer invite others into that same overflowing grace.

The problem is, like Rocky, we often leave the spring of living water to chase the end of the rainbow. We want the forbidden fruit. We want to be God rather than enjoy God. But the Lord's Prayer calls us back to the spring. It's not about asking God to fill our bank account; it's about staying connected to the overflowing spring that's always available in God's presence.

The Lord's prayer is like a chain, with each link connected to the next. The first link is our own personal experience of God's presence: "Hallowed be your name." Without this foundation, the prayer becomes a series of disconnected requests—things we chase but never truly find. We risk finding ourselves in hell in the pursuit of heaven.

The next link, after "hallowed be your name," is "your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." There can be no heaven on earth without experiencing God in the now. Without this awareness, we become like Rocky, chasing illusions that lead to emptiness. But when we live in the presence of God, the Kingdom comes alive—on earth, as it is in heaven.

#### A Message from the Nominating Committee

Our Congregation Annual Meeting is coming up on February 2 and we need YOU. There are a number of ways we can serve our church. The following areas that will need to be filled at the annual meeting are:

#### Congregation Council

We need three more people to fill upcoming vacancies. This is a 2-year term (2025-2026). The Council meets once a month and basically handles the business of the church. The Council reviews the financial reports and deals with any old and new business.

#### Altar Guild

We need three more people to fill upcoming vacancies. This is a 3-year term (2025-2027). Three years might sound like a big commitment, but since the Altar Guild has 12 members, each person serves one month per year. The Altar Guild prepares the worship space for worship each week. The duties include changing the paraments and banners to the proper colors for the church season (white, blue, purple, green, red), setting up the Table of the Lord for communion, filling the candles with oil and trimming the wicks, posting the hymn numbers listed in the weekly bulletin, watering the plants, etc. We will train you and help you whenever you need assistance.

#### **Audit Committee**

We need one person to fill this 3-year term (2025-2027). The Audit Committee meets once a year to audit year-end financial reports of various committees.

#### Synod Assembly

We need two people to fill this 1-year term (2025). This requires attendance at the Synod Assembly which is usually held in May. Some years it is "in person" and other years it is "on line". We are not sure what 2025 is going to be, but we should know at our annual meeting. The Synod Assembly is a great way to meet fellow members in our Synod and learn what's happening in the Synod and churchwide.

#### Nominating Committee

We need two people to fill this 2-year term (2025-2026). The Nominating Committee tries to find willing members of the church to serve on the Council, Altar Guild, Audit Committee, Synod Assembly and Nominating Committee prior to the Congregation Annual Meeting.

May the Holy Spirit open our hearts to hear where God is calling us to serve in His church.

#### What are the 12 days of Christmas?

Christmas, according to the liturgical calendar, isn't just a day, but a season. Many Christians know the song "The Twelve Days of Christmas" or recall that Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* is about the last night of Christmas. But what defines the Christmas season?

The 12 days of Christmas are a reversal of the season of <u>Advent</u>. Traditionally, Christians have fasted during Advent as we await the celebration of the birth of our Savior. The period from Christmas Day to the day before Epiphany (the celebration of the magi visiting Jesus, the baptism of Jesus and the beginning of his earthly ministry) is a period of daily feasting. This is surprising, given the reason for celebrating several of the days.

The first day of Christmas, the Feast of the Nativity, is obvious enough as a reason to celebrate. The Messiah has been born into the world! The next day, however, is the feast of St. Stephan, the first Christian martyr, who was killed under the authority of Saul of Tarsus/Paul (Acts 8:1). The emotional whiplash of celebrating the birth of the Savior and then the next day celebrating the life and martyrdom of the first person to die for Christ is stunning. However, tradition calls for a joyful feast to celebrate the faithfulness of Stephen, even unto death.

These 12 days help Christians remember that the life of faith is full of challenges and hardships but also contains plenty of reasons to celebrate as we remember the heroes and heroines of the church, and most importantly, our Lord and Savior.

The next day, the third of the 12, celebrates the life of St. John the Apostle. He was, traditionally, the only disciple who wasn't martyred. Tradition holds that John took care of Mary, the mother of Jesus, made disciples, grew old and finally died a natural death in Ephesus.

The fourth day of Christmas is the most shocking. The Feast of the Holy Innocents commemorates the death of all boys in Bethlehem, aged 2 and under, at the hands of Herod the Great's soldiers (Matthew 2:16-18). Again, we feel the emotional rollercoaster, as we're reminded that the Christian life isn't simply one of sweetness and joy, but also of pain, hardship and injustice. Nevertheless, the fourth day of Christmas is the *Feast* of the Holy Innocents, rather than a fast, because we celebrate the One who has conquered sin and death and doesn't surrender these precious little ones, or any others, to the grave forever.

The following days celebrate Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Becket's resistance to injustice; the holy family; Pope Sylvester, who resisted the Donatist and Arian controversies (in many Germanic-speaking countries, New Year's Eve is still called "Sylvester"); the circumcision of Jesus; St. Basil the Great and St. Gregory Nazianzen, who defended the doctrine of the Trinity; Jesus' presentation and naming in the Jerusalem

temple; the hermitage of St. Simon on the pillar; and even two American saints: Elizabeth Ann Seton and John Neumann.

These 12 days help Christians remember that the life of faith is full of challenges and hardships but also contains plenty of reasons to celebrate as we remember the heroes and heroines of the church, and most importantly, our Lord and Savior.
