Moving Mountains

On behalf of the Trustees and staff of BSCWT, I would like to thank you for the way in which you have generously supported our appeal for new donations since my article in our Summer Term Newsletter.

In my recent letter to supporters, I summarised giving to the appeal at the end of August as representing 135 new donors of £25 per month over three years, which equates to 68% of our target. Writing now in October, I can report that we have received some further additional giving in September, although at a lower level.



So, we are two thirds of the way! Or, alternatively, we are looking at reducing the current scope of our work by 30% from September 2026. Inevitably this will mean fewer staff offering fewer activities in fewer schools, with fewer children coming into contact with the love of God and Bible truths. Our Trustees have met with staff to look at the options for the future shape of the

Trust, but these are difficult decisions. All additional giving will be reviewed by the Trustees at the end of December 2025.

Please continue to support staff and Trustees in your prayers. We BSCWT and others.

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Spaces for Prayer & Wonder

'Prayer Spaces in Schools' explore spirituality from a broadly Christian perspective, in accessible and creative ways which differ with each situation, age group and school.

Our whole-school prayer space with St Mary's recently took place in church over two days, each class engaging with four zones during their thirty minute

visit. This year's theme, 'Meeting Jesus', reflects on Jesus bringing help, friendship, forgiveness and peace using stories of people who met Him. It was adapted for St Thomas' School, using their Prayer Garden and Year 6 Prayer Garden Assistants on team.

St Martin's School is a

weekly voluntary club, providing reflective zones to wander around at lunchtime. It has covered topics such as 'back to school,' 'dealing with mean people' and 'how does God get your attention?', and has just launched 'Wonder Space Bags' which are take-away prayer bags to encourage calm and deep thinking.

'Caterpillars'

This term, Evie and I are running a 6-week 'Caterpillars' course with a small group of children at a local infants school. The course is about growing through change, with the aim of building confidence, self-esteem, resilience, relational skills and emotional regulation / and understanding.



The course is built around the Biblical story of the Lost Son (see Luke 15) and involves games, chatting, craft and the opportunity to express feelings. Tricky, a wolf puppet, is an integral part of the group, encouraging the children to join in and express their opinions as well as reinforcing the theme of each session. We are very much looking forward to the final session, when one of our Associate Workers, Angela, will visit the group with Tricky's puppet friends!


Being an Associate Worker

Last term, our team had the privilege of taking 25 'It's Your Move' lessons with over 850 Year 6 pupils. These lessons provide space for the pupils to consider the changes, challenges and choices which may lie ahead as

they move to secondary school. Local churches sponsor books (published by Scripture Union) which are given to each pupil, as an additional source of advice and help. Thank you to all our Associate Workers who help run these lessons and to the churches for providing the books. We always receive encouraging feedback from the schools.
