Looking to Easter...

The main Christian festival of the year, celebrated from its beginning by the early church, Easter seems to have become a poor relation to Christmas in the wider consciousness these days. While Christmas is huge in both Christian and secular circles alike, Easter is a very different case. Although the Easter Bunny, chocolate eggs and egg hunts are increasingly marketed to the public, for most people, Easter Sunday and its bank holidays are welcomed for allowing time away from work or a chance to get away to sunnier climes or wintery ski slopes.

All the more reason to educate our young people about Easter as the most important Christian Festival! In Schools Work, Easter is just as busy, important and consuming of our energy and resources as Christmas! This year we aim to take as many *Easter Cracked* lessons as we did for *Christmas Unwrapped*; and the same goes for our infants lessons, *Sadness to Joy*, and our *Easter Prayer Spaces*. In all of these activities we seek to reconnect the children with the events which took place over 2000 years ago, to give them a sense of the miracles and beliefs surrounding the story, and some insights into the 'Good News' that the Easter story brought to people at the time and which is still celebrated by Christians today.

Christmas Unwrapped



Professor Chris T Mas at Christmas Unwrapped!

"Christmas Unwrapped" is our biggest annual Christmas project, reaching 655 children from 17 different primary schools in 2019. The lesson was taught to pupils in Years 5 and 6 with the aim of 'unwrapping' the Nativity and exploring why the birth of Jesus is so significant. There were lots of fun activities along the way to bring this topic alive, including a rap, quizzes, a visit from 'Professor Chris T Mas' and biscuit decorating.

The children were encouraged to look for clues in the story regarding the Godliness of Jesus and to see that it's not a mere 'fairy story'. Highlights included children asking amazing questions (e.g. what language did the angels speak?) and others leaving the building singing the rap they had learnt!

The team visited 8 different schools reaching over 350 infant pupils with our "Darkness to Light" sessions. We explored the Christmas story interactively with the help of 'Knitivity' characters and our friendly puppets, 'Lucy Light' and 'Frightened Freddie', who helped us to uncover both the light and dark elements of the Christmas story and what this means for us.

Christmas Prayer Spaces

Pupils at two primary schools (Years 5 and 6) and one specialist school were given a peaceful, slower-paced space to enable them to reflect at a deeper level on questions inspired by the Christmas story. By going on a physical journey to different zones they could contemplate the connections with their own life journey.

There were special moments when pupils respectfully shared and listened to one another's thoughts and experiences. The questions they reflected on were:

- What have been difficult/good times in your life?
- What would be good news?
- What are you afraid of and who can help?
- How do you respond to Jesus' birth?
- Who needs light from dark situations?

Secondary School lessons

Fantasy vs Reality: We had the privilege of taking our *Fantasy vs Reality* lessons again last term, looking at the impact and influences of pornography, with year 10 students at Shenfield High School. It has been very encouraging to see how well the lessons have gone and to be able to have some interesting conversations with students. It was also a good opportunity to have our new Schools Workers, Alison, Frances and Holly, view the lessons so that they might help deliver them in the future.



Some students' comments on what they learned in our 'Fantasy vs Reality' lessons:

"That pornography can affect your heart, brain and world."

"That it gives an unrealistic view of love."

"That pornography can mentally affect you."

"It can have a negative impact on a person."

The number of students who thought pornography could be addictive rose from 29% before the lessons to 86% afterwards.

Bullying and Self-Concept: This term, with the help of Holly and Fiona, I am taking some year 7 lessons exploring *Bullying and Self-Concept*. The idea is that the lessons will encourage students to think about how they view themselves and others, and to think about why. It is also a great opportunity to share how, as Christians, we believe each and every person was created by God and is amazing and valued.

New Q&A sessions: Next term we hope to take part in some year 8 classes, answering their questions, from a Christian viewpoint, on varying topics they have been learning about in their Social Sciences classes.

Sex and Relationships: Also next term, we are hoping to continue our *Sex and Relationships* lessons with year 9 students for another year.

It is encouraging to see how valued the lessons are by school staff and how keen they are to have them continue and develop.
