




## You Never Know!

# A quick bit of Maths!

At the time of writing, we have just completed a series of 9 assemblies at 2 local secondary schools, speaking with around 2,000 young people in all. A quick mathematical calculation reveals that 15 minutes of 2,000 people's time equates to 30,000 minutes - that's 500 hours! What an awesome privilege and responsibility it is to be entrusted with such a huge amount of these young people's time! And what a great challenge we have to try to make it worth their while by presenting an engaging message to provoke deep reflection, whilst being from a Christian perspective and being accessible to everyone! In our assemblies for secondary schools this term we are inviting students to reflect on questions including 'Are you developing an attitude of gratitude?' and 'Could God be closer than you think?'



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# 'Caterpillars'

Our 'Caterpillars' group has run this term at a primary school with 4 year one children. We have explored our feelings and how we fit in and connect with the people around us. To help us with our thinking, we have read the Bible story of the Prodigal Son and had a special story of the Prodigal Son and flad a sposting struggles sometimes we play a game with the pupil and visitor - Tricky, the wolf (a puppet!) # Pupil Support



# LifeSpace



### Being an Associate Worker



## Prayer Spaces

This half term has been a bumper one for our 'prayer spaces' in schools! It has been wonderful seeing pupils explore spirituality. In primary schools, we ran a whole-school 2-day prayer space with State.

Our weekly Wonder Space In our Prayerfully Learning Together research project, we have led 3 outside sessions with Year 5, 1 outside session with Year 6 and 3 focus groups reflecting on prayer. Themes covered included: Peace and Conflict, God in our daily life, How connected do you feel to God?

We've had some great comments from pupils, including: "It was relaxing and made me feel connected to God.", "My experience reminded me of how lucky I am to be alive!" and questions such as: Why do we die? God, what is it like to be in charge of the world? Are you real? And I wonder what God is doing right now.

# Finance Update from the Treasurer & Trustees

The Trust, as always, is extremely grateful and thankful to all individuals, churches and charitable trusts for their continued generous support of BSCWT.

The accounts for the 2023/2024 financial year are complete and a copy is available on request.

To the end of August, regular income was £24,478 and expenditure was £57,464 giving a deficit of £32,986. The deficit is covered by previous legacies and one-off larger donations.

Now we have started a new academic year we are excited for new opportunities that allow us to communicate with young people in our local schools. However, in order to ensure that our invaluable work endures and expands, we continue to be dependent on donations from both individuals and churches. If you are a UK tax payer, you may be able to make your donations go further by allowing us to claim gift aid. The charity would receive 25p for every £1 that you give.
