Dr. Alex Kuczynski, Associate Music Director

Dr. Alex Kuczyński holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music (MA and PhD, piano studies in the studio of Rebecca Penneys) and Vassar College (BA in music and cognitive science). A collaborative pianist since the age of twelve, Alex had an early career accompanying in school choirs, music festivals and the church. Under real-time pressure at a young age, he quickly sharpened a diverse set of musical skills including sight reading, sight singing, playing an open score, improvisation, music theory, and the coordination of timing and interpretation while playing with other musicians. In high school, Alex competed in state-wide choral festivals as accompanist and won awards at district, regional and all-state levels in Pennsylvania. He was then employed as staff accompanist at Vassar and Nazareth Colleges

over the course of college and graduate school.

Currently, Alex serves as pianist, organist and music director at Trinity Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Rochester, principal pianist and associate director of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus, staff accompanist for the Geneseo Central School District, and pianist for opera singers, voice studios, and collegiate instrumental soloists. In addition to concert and church accompanying, Alex also serves as pianist and music director for theater groups such as the Off Monroe Players, Rochester Association of Performing Arts, The Lyric Theatre, the Geneseo Community Players and more. Additionally, Alex continues to enjoy performing solo piano music in a range of styles from the 17th - 21st centuries. An expert teacher in both music theory and piano, Alex has served as Visiting Instructor of music theory at Nazareth College and previously as Graduate Instructor at the Eastman School of Music during the length of his graduate studies, where he taught the whole undergraduate music theory and aural musicianship curriculum. Currently, in addition to performing and music directing, Alex teaches about 30 piano students of all ages, providing a solid music education for individual pianists as they reach and exceed their goals and dreams.



Catherine J. Hardesty, CT Sign Language Interpreter

Catherine "Cat" J. Hardesty is a Nationally Certified Interpreter for the Deaf who joined RGMC as the Artistic Interpreter in 1999. She is a freelance Community Interpreter, but her favorite venue is music, especially with RGMC. She lives in Greece with her Life Partner, Robert Slater. Her son Christian and his wife Amber live in Columbus, Ohio where they are both practicing attorneys, and are the proud parents of their daughter Elana Paige!



Wilson Southerland, Artisite & Music Director / Conductor

Wilson is in demand throughout the U.S., Africa, Europe, and the Middle East as pianist, conductor, coach, and educator. He made his conducting debut to high acclaim with Philip Glass's Les Enfants Terribles at North Carolina Opera in 2012 and subsequently made his NYC soon after.

Wilson has traveled the world as a pianist, coach, assistant conductor, and recitalist at opera companies such as Opera Africa in Pretoria, South Africa, the New Israeli Opera in Tel Aviv, Les Azuriales Opera in France, Si Parla Si Canta in Italy, AIMS-Graz in Austria, and the Royal Opera House in Muscat, Oman. He was one of 24 singer/pianist duos worldwide chosen to compete in the Wigmore Hall International Art Song Competition in London. Stateside, Wilson was a principal coach

at Seattle Opera for 3 seasons, as well as an associate conductor/pianist at Gotham Chamber Opera and Chelsea Opera (NYC), Opera Omaha, Des Moines Metro Opera, Opera Birmingham, Opera Memphis, Spoleto USA, and the Mark Morris Dance Group.

He spends his summers as a principal conductor at The Ohio Light Opera. Wilson holds degrees in piano from Vanderbilt University and The Juilliard School, and he is currently an Assistant Professor of Opera at the Eastman School of Music.

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The Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus (BGMC) idea was conceived in 1999 and auditions were held in May 2001. The first rehearsal began on September 11, 2001, a day of shock and sadness throughout our land. The difficult decision to go forward with the rehearsal, despite the tragedy of that day, proved to have been wise. More than 50 people, many not knowing each other, gathered in an eerie silence. With founding Artistic

Director, Ms. Barbara Wagner, they held hands for the first time in a community circle; anguished murmurs of meditation, grief and prayer followed. They learned the classic American hymn, "How Can I Keep From Singing?," which remains to this day the BGMC's theme song – and a continuing reminder of mutual family togetherness the BGMC always aspires to attain. The BGMC produces a vibrant sound that entertains and enlightens, touching the soul with the power of high-quality vocal music, sung honestly from the hearts of a diverse membership. Performing in a variety of venues throughout Western New York, the BGMC produces music in many styles. Listening to the changing world, the BGMC transforms this dissonance into music to fulfill its mission: delivering stories of the struggles, triumphs, celebrations, and dreams of one community through song. The BGMC softens hearts and minds with the power of this sound, creating a space to foster meaningful dialogue to understand and celebrate all that makes Western New York an exciting and thriving place to live and work.

Dr. Robert Strauss, BGMC ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Dr. Robert Strauss has been praised for his sensitive, intelligent interpretation, his attention to musical and textual nuance, and his versatile tenor voice. An avid recitalist, he has presented the programs Chamber Music of Benjamin Britten, Seasons in Song and The Recital That Dare Not Speak Its Name with Eastman School of Music emeritus faculty member Benton Hess. On the stage, he has sung Pedrillo in Die Entführung aus dem Serail, Peter Quint (The Turn of the Screw), Tony (West Side Story), as well as



Federico in L'amico Fritz, with the Centro Studi İtaliani Opera Festival in Urbania, Italy. In February 2016, he sang Bastianello the Younger in the premiere of the orchestrated version of John Musto's Bastianello. Strauss has also appeared as one of the tenor soloists in Rossini's Messa di Gloria in the composer's hometown of Pesaro. He has toured Italy performing opera scenes and arias from the standard Italian operatic literature with the Centro Studi Italiani Opera Festival. Having served on the voice faculty of the Fredonia School of Music since 2007, Strauss is also a member of the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS), serving on the Executive Board for the Central New York-Finger Lakes Chapter first as Auditions Chair then Vice-President, and currently as President. He holds degrees from SUNY Fredonia, UNC-Greensboro, and earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Performance and Literature from West Virginia University and serves on the voice faculty at SUNY Fredonia.

Thomas Warfield is an international performing artist born in Rochester, NY and has lived in 6 countries. He's performed on stage, television and film, in more than 100 cities worldwide; as a singer, dancer, actor, model, composer, choreographer, director, producer, educator, activist and poet... Performing at the Metropolitan Opera,'The Yard' on Martha's Vineyard, a circus in Japan, 3 U.S. prisons, with Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Utah Symphony, Gateways Orchestra, a Command

Performance for Queen Elizabeth in London, and an east-coast tour of his original project *AstroDance* - combining dance and astrophysics funded by the National Science Foundation. This FLI he makes his debut with the Boston Symphony. He's founder/artistic director of 33yr old PeaceArt, a global peace organization.

For 25yrs Thomas Warfield has been Director of Dance at the Rochester Institute of Technology. He was a National Coalition Building Institute trainer facilitating workshops on racism and conflict resolution. He is the recipient of numerous awards including: NYS Commendation Award, Eastman School of Music Centennial Award, US Congressional Recognition Award, United Nations Peace Award, American Ethical Union Award, Empire State Pride Agenda LGBTQ Champion Award, Off-Off Broadway Award and awarded honorary citizen of Macau. He's served on many boards: City of Rochester AC3 (chair), Arts in the Loop, World Dance Alliance (Hong Kong), ARTWalk (president), Rochester Arts Council, Young Audiences, Greentopia, Rochester City Ballet, Gateways Music Festival, Rochester Area Community Foundation, Rochester Fringe Festival, Rochester Chamber Orchestra, NYS Association of Teaching Artists, NY Dance Festival, Garth Fagan Dance, RPO and former president of the Wm. Warfield Scholarship Fund.

His Global Poem In Praise of Peace has garnered global recognition in letters from composer Leonard Bernstein and Mother Teresa and hundreds of others. Mr. Warfield's first solo album, Celebrate the Moment, has sold throughout the world and can be found on itunes.com and Spotify.



The Rochette's Origin Story

In the summer of 1986 members of RGMC saw and fell in love with the Emerald City Stompers, a tap-dancing troupe from Seattle. The fledgling RGMC had flown to Minneapolis to attend the second Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses (GALA) festival, and there discovered not only beautiful choral singing, but dance!

Upon returning from Minneapolis the chorus decided that Rochester needed a dance troupe too! Telephone calls started to Jerry Algoser who recommended Cayla Allen as a potential choreographer, and she said YES for the next 20 years! It was decided that the initial troupe would be limited to 8 dancers and auditions were held. The first Rochettes were David Merrit, Michael Holden, David Knoll, David Skinner, Randy Wiscomb, Charles Weber, Chuck Lundeen and bruce d. mcClung who is credited with naming the "Rochettes" in homage to the Radio City Rockettes!

With the first Rochette troupe assembled, the first performance would be SIX WEEKS later for a debut at a GALA exchange concert in Detroit, Michigan! From there the Rochettes would go on to dance in cities stretched across the map from Seattle to Tampa, from Montreal to Toronto, from Chicago to Jones Pond Campground!

For many years the Rochettes sang while tap dancing. Remember "On the Good Ship Lollipop" in Shirley Temple drag? That's a good example of what the Rochettes brought to many concerts. Some would say the dancers were "lavender lovelies" providing a relief valve during more serious concerts. Others have said of our dance, "It was another vulgar spectacle." We can own both of those descriptors as we've chosen to celebrate our bodies and experiences as gay men through dance.

What seems a distant, though important part of our history is that the RGMC and the Rochettes were born during the beginning of the AIDS crisis. Standing up and singing for and dancing for our lives was a reality. With gay men, lovers, and friends dying around us, it was imperative that we bring beauty and laughter and dignity into our shared lives and into the public sphere.

For nearly 40 years the Rochettes have taken to the stage, often in colorful costumes, with as many as 15 dancers and as few as five. To date 73 men have stepped into dance shoes as a Rochette and all have been shaped by dedicated choreographers like Cayla Allen, Ericka Atkinson, and Jamie Lee Proteus. In dance studios across Rochester, our choreographers have taken us from basic tap to jazz squares to hip hop - all on a count of 8 - and we are grateful!

We find ourselves in the year 2023 and again (or still) we are singing and dancing for our lives; this time in the face of legislation aimed at erasing our identity and denying our trans siblings healthcare. As long as we have breath and can count to 8, we won't stop dancing for the inclusion of, and celebration of our LGBTQ+ lives. **Thank you, Rochester, for your support all along the way.**
