Letter From The Interim Artistic Director

"Let's get loud! Turn the music up to hear that sound. Let's get loud! Ain't nobody gotta tell you what you gotta do. If you want to live your life, live it all the way and don't you waste it. Every feeling, every beat can be so very sweet, you gotta taste it. Life's a party make it hot, dance don't ever stop, whatever rhythm. Every minute, every day, take them all the way, you gotta live them. Let's get loud!"

On behalf of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus, welcome everyone to "RGMC: Live In Color!" It's no secret that music with roots in BIPOC communities has overwhelmingly determined the course of collective musical evolution around the world. Today's concert is meant to be a rousing celebration of such music, and particularly the way in which BIPOC artists have shaped our lives and experiences collectively. As with any theme, "Live In Color" can only be a selective representation of music written and/or performed by BIPOC artists and cultures. While we wish we could sing a song from every background and every tradition, such a feat would be impossible in the short time we have together. Fortunately, with such distinguished guests as Ryan Russell on drums, Terry Keach on cello, Bob Parsons on flute, the ECMS Gamelan Ensemble, as well as our own Rochettes, VersiTone, Teddy Bears, and chorus-member instrumentalists, we have quite the variety to put on today! A kaleidoscopic concert both in terms of musical styles and traditions.

The chorus repertoire in particular consists of several American popular songs from recent decades, with an emphasis on songs written and championed by African American and Latinx American artists. These are all songs with which RGMC singers feel a strong connection. Whether it be the respect and love for oneself reflected in Whitney Houston's "The Greatest Love Of All;" or the love we feel for those who have passed away in Janet Jackson's "Together Again;" or the zest for living every moment of life to the fullest, as seen in "Vivir Mi Vida" and "Let's Get Loud;" or the humorous over-the-top attitude and self-confidence enshrined in Lizzo's "Juice;" or the reminder in Shakira's "Try Everything" that nobody is perfect, and to succeed one must fail and try again — these songs all inspire us in our lives in one way or another. But not limited to popular music, we also sing a recent classical choral work by African American composer Reginal Wright entitled "Invictus," which portrays the profound awakening of an individual to the realization that they are the master of their fate. We are also thrilled to perform a traditional Lakota Sioux Spiritual entitled Wankantanhan Hotan'Inpe ("From above, they are making their voices heard") — one of a limited selection of traditional Native American works available in published arrangement in western music notation by two-spirit Lakota composer Linthicum-Blackhorse.

The RGMC is also especially grateful to be joined by the ECMS Gamelan Ensemble in today's concert, in which we will all be whisked away to the island of Bali with the percussive sounds of

traditional Indonesian gamelan music. If you have not heard such music before – and certainly even if you have – you are in for a rare and wonderful experience.

Thank you always for your continued support of the RGMC. Without further ado – LET'S GET LOUD!

Dr. Alex Kuczynski, Interim Artistic Director

Dr. Alex Kuczyński holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music (MA and PhD, piano studies in the studio of Rebecca Penneys) and Vassar College (BA in music and cognitive science). A collaborative pianist since the age of twelve, Alex had an early career accompanying in school choirs, music festivals and the church. Under real-time pressure at a young age, he quickly sharpened a diverse set of musical skills including sight reading, sight singing, playing an open score, improvisation, music theory, and the coordination of timing and interpretation while playing with other musicians. In high school, Alex competed in state-wide choral festivals as accompanist and won awards at district, regional and all-state levels in Pennsylvania. He was then employed as staff accompanist at Vassar and Nazareth Colleges

over the course of college and graduate school.

Currently, Alex serves as pianist, organist and music director at Trinity Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Rochester, interim artistic director of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus, staff accompanist for the Geneseo Central School District, and pianist for opera singers, voice studios, and collegiate instrumental soloists. In addition to concert and church accompanying, Alex also serves as pianist and music director for theater groups such as the Off Monroe Players, Rochester Association of Performing Arts, The Lyric Theatre, the Geneseo Community Players and more. Additionally, Alex continues to enjoy performing solo piano music in a range of styles from the 17th - 21st centuries. An expert teacher in both music theory and piano, Alex has served as Visiting Instructor of music theory at Nazareth College and previously as Graduate Instructor at the Eastman School of Music during the length of his graduate studies, where he taught the whole undergraduate music theory and aural musicianship curriculum. Currently, in addition to performing and music directing, Alex teaches about 30 piano students of all ages, providing a solid music education for individual pianists as they reach and exceed their goals and dreams.



Bob Dietch, Principal Pianist

A local career musician, many will remember Bob behind the piano at Tara, where he entertained regularly for the majority of its 30-year run in downtown Rochester.

He is an alumnus of SUNY Fredonia School of Music, where he was degreed cum laude in their highly selective Sound Recording Technology program, and inducted into Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society.

Over the years, Bob has enjoyed music-directing and performing for a variety of private and community events, schools, and theatre groups including Blackfriars, Geva, RAPA, OFC Creations, Greater Rochester Repertory Company, Downstairs Cabaret, Rochester Children's

Theatre, East Rochester and Fairport High Schools. He was honored by the Theatre Association of New York State with an Excellence in Vocal Direction award for his work on ETC's Falsettos.

Bob is the longtime collaborative pianist for West Irondequoit Central School District's Choral Music program, the Traveling Cabaret and Temple Emanu-El.

Gamelan at the Eastman School of Music

Gamelan at Eastman, as in Bali, is a communal effort. Our members include Eastman students, faculty, and staff, as well as many members of the Rochester community. The music is learned through the oral/aural tradition without the use of notation, and therefore requires the players to work together closely for long periods of time. The result is a sense of group unity and pride as the audience hears the music and witnesses the collective efforts of the ensemble.

Since 1993, Eastman Gamelan has provided students and members of the Rochester community the privilege to learn music from two very different Balinese gamelan ensembles: Gamelan Lila Muni (Heavenly Sound) and Gamelan Sanjiwani (Life Force). Gamelan Lila Muni is an ancient fourtone gamelan angklung which traditionally performs music for rituals and ceremonies. Gamelan Sangi Wani, of the five-tone gamelan gong kebyar, is an ensemble developed in the 20th century associated with youthful exuberance and characterized by explosive changes in tempo and dynamics.

Eastman's gamelan ensembles perform throughout the northeastern United States and in Canada in programs of traditional and contemporary Balinese music, present interactive workshops for audiences of all ages, and engage in creative collaborations with Western musicians and composers. In recent years, we have collaborated with Bobby McFerrin and the Paul Winter Consort, and have premiered new compositions by composers Wayne Vitale, Robert Morris, Jennifer Fontana Graham, Daniel Ianantuono, John Orfe, and Payton McDonald, including a number of Eastman student composers.

New members are welcomed into the Eastman gamelan ensembles each year, regardless of musical experience.
