Letter from the Artistic Director

On behalf of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus, welcome to Yuletide Radiance: From Darkness to Light! This year, we celebrate the holidays through the celestial event of the winter solstice and the journey of light through the darkest time of the year in our hemisphere. The ancient midwinter festival of Yule, celebrating the return of the sun's light after the shortest day of the year, is reflected in our program through music of light as it crosses variegated winter scenes and intersects with our treasured holidays, traditions, and emotions. As we meditate on the concept of Yule, we feel ourselves enveloped in the primal forces of nature, gravity, and the tides—and stand in awe of the scale of these universal forces and time itself. Yet as small as our hearts are in comparison to these forces, we burn with a life and light so beautiful and so wonderful, it cannot be matched by the darkness.

We couldn't be more delighted to share our celestial journey with you today—our friends, supporters, and allies. We are also delighted to be joined by some special guests including the Flower City Pride Band, our favorite wizard of percussion, Ryan Russell (and his sidekick Spirit), and of course our very own groups the Teddy Bears, VersiTone, and the Rochettes, as well as so many talented soloists and instrumentalists within the RGMC. From the bottom of our hearts, thank you for joining and celebrating with us, and we hope you love the show!

In our first set, we open with two carols on the theme of Yule and winter: "Winter Processional," a modern composition in an ancient style, and "Welcome Yule," an ancient carol in a modern style that contains ancient modalities, scales, and text. We then traverse a serene winter scene of dazzling light reflecting off of snow, auroras in the sky, and the sound of sparrows greeting the new season in "Glow," before rejoicing with a gospel tune about Christmas, "Here Comes the Light," which also contains the traditional spiritual "My Lord, What a Morning." We then reflect on the significance of light and the burning of Chanukah candles in "Eight Days of Lights." Finally, we close our first set with the regal and atmospheric Christmas song "Do You Hear What I Hear?"

Our second set continues our journey of light by opening with the joyous "Ding! Dong! Merrily on High," which contains a rousing four-hand piano accompaniment and trailing choral melismas. We then switch gears to sing some classic jazz in the 1950s Christmas tune "Cool Yule," made famous by Louis Armstrong, followed by "Cold Moon," which paints the dark and the cold as omnipresent forces and the light as the life which burns within us in the face

of harsh realities. This is followed by a song of parting, "Omnia Sol" ("the sun warms everything"), which we dedicate to two treasured and recently dearly departed members of our RGMC family, Ron Herman and Daniel Reeder. Finally, we sing "Merry Everything" to celebrate the plurality of holidays surrounding the solstice and the transcendence of human connection and love over specific traditions, before we are gone in a "Ray of Light."

Dr. Alex Kuczynski, Artistic Director

Dr. Alex Kuczyński holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music (MA and PhD, piano studies in the studio of Rebecca Penneys) and Vassar College (BA in music and cognitive science). A collaborative pianist since the age of twelve, Alex had an early career accompanying in school choirs, music festivals and the church. Under real-time pressure at a young age, he quickly sharpened a diverse set of musical skills including sight reading, sight singing, playing an open score, improvisation, music theory, and the coordination of timing and interpretation while playing with other musicians. In high school, Alex competed in state-wide choral festivals as accompanist and won awards at district, regional and all-state levels in Pennsylvania. He was then employed as staff accompanist at Vassar and Nazareth Colleges

over the course of college and graduate school.

Currently, Alex serves as pianist, organist and music director at Trinity Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Rochester, artistic director of the Rochester Gay Men's Chorus, staff accompanist for the Geneseo Central School District, and pianist for opera singers, voice studios, and collegiate instrumental soloists. In addition to concert and church accompanying, Alex also serves as pianist and music director for theater groups such as the Off Monroe Players, Rochester Association of Performing Arts, The Lyric Theatre, the Geneseo Community Players and more. Additionally, Alex continues to enjoy performing solo piano music in a range of styles from the 17th - 21st centuries. An expert teacher in both music theory and piano, Alex has served as Visiting Instructor of music theory at Nazareth College and previously as Graduate Instructor at the Eastman School of Music during the length of his graduate studies, where he taught the whole undergraduate music theory and aural musicianship curriculum. Currently, in addition to performing and music directing, Alex teaches about 30 piano students of all ages, providing a solid music education for individual pianists as they reach and exceed their goals and dreams.



Bob Dietch, Principal Pianist

A local career musician, many will remember Bob behind the piano at Tara, where he entertained regularly for the majority of its 30-year run in downtown Rochester.

He is an alumnus of SUNY Fredonia School of Music, where he was degreed cum laude in their highly selective Sound Recording Technology program, and inducted into Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society.

Over the years, Bob has enjoyed music-directing and performing for a variety of private and community events, schools, and theatre groups including Blackfriars, Geva, RAPA, OFC Creations, Greater Rochester Repertory Company, Downstairs Cabaret, Rochester Children's

Theatre, East Rochester and Fairport High Schools. He was honored by the Theatre Association of New York State with an Excellence in Vocal Direction award for his work on ETC's Falsettos.

Bob is the longtime collaborative pianist for West Irondequoit Central School District's Choral Music program, the Traveling Cabaret and Temple Emanu-El.

Catherine "Cat" J. Hardesty is a Nationally Certified Interpreter for the Deaf who joined RGMC as the Artistic Interpreter in 1999. 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

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
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
