Classical fiction notably has stronger morals, and if not that, then at least the virtuousness and decency of most of these books is enough to recommend them as better options than the predominantly flippant modern fiction (though there are many good authors in this century that are a credit to the literary world).

One major downside when it comes to fiction, though, is addiction. 
